

- Those not Baptized who would like to learn more about the Catholic religion.
- Those Baptized in another religion who think they might like to become Catholic.
- Those Baptized Catholic but have not been raised in the Faith.

PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 11:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, June 4, 2017 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. CONFIRMATION 411

The ways of celebrating Confirmation vary as much as the Gifts of the Holy Spirit. Some people are Confirmed at the same time they are Baptized. Others celebrate Confirmation in their adolescence after many months of preparation. Baptized members of other Christian communities who want to join the Catholic Church in full communion are Confirmed after their Profession of Faith.

This flexibility can be the source of some confusion. The many occasions for Confirmation can obscure its meaning. Surely Confirmation seals a Candidate with the gift of the Holy Spirit. But the disparities in age, preparation and modes of the celebration of the Sacrament continue to be widespread.

In the early Church, all Baptisms were celebrated in the presence of the Bishop at the principal church of the community, the cathedral. After Baptism, it was the Bishop himself who "sealed" the newly Baptized with Sacred Chrism and prayed for the invocation of the Holy Spirit. When Christian communities grew and spread farther and farther from the cathedral church, Bishops could no longer gather all those to be Baptized in one place. By the fifth century, the presbyters and deacons of smaller Christian communities were allowed to Baptize, but the Bishop alone "confirmed" these Baptisms at a subsequent time.

At the same time, the Church was also welcoming those who had fallen into various heresies and problems back in to the communion of the Church. To ritualize their return to the embrace of the Christian faithful, the Church borrowed two ritual gestures from the Baptismal rite: the imposition of hands and the anointing with chrism. From these beginnings, the Sacrament of Confirmation has come down to us as three separate families of rituals: the first is that of **Initiation:** the Eastern Churches confirm (Chrismate) everyone as soon as they are Baptized, even infants. In the Latin west, it has become the practice to confirm adults and children of catechetical age at Baptism. The second is that of **Maturity:** The Latin Church has long delayed the Confirmation of Catholics Baptized as infants. In the United States, where individual Dioceses set the age for Confirmation, the age of for conferral of the Sacrament of Confirmation ranges anywhere from seven to eighteen. Finally, the Sacrament of Confirmation is used to note **Transference: w**hen a previously Baptized person wishes to join the Catholic Church in full communion, they make a Profession of Faith and are then Confirmed.

Although the meaning of the Sacrament of Confirmation changes slightly within each use, the overall purpose of the Sacrament is to celebrate the Gifts of Holy Spirit in the life of the Church and of the Candidate. Those Gifts help us all to be more faithful witnesses to the Risen Christ.

The Spirit of Grace and Truth

Blessed are you, Lord our God, King of the Universe, for you have graced us with your presence and given us your Spirit, the Spirit of Truth. May 21, 2017 No Longer Orphans

Today's Readings: Acts 8:5–8, 14–17; Psalm 66:1–3, 4–5, 6-7, 16, 20; 1 Peter 3:15–18; John 14:15–21. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples that he will not abandon them as orphans. For three years, they had followed him and trusted that he would show them the Truth. Each of the Twelve relied on Jesus to guide them, to demonstrate the best way to be good, loving, religious people. Now he tells them to demonstrate their love by keeping the Commandments. And he assures them that he will send the Advocate. He tells them that they need to trust what they already know, for within that *knowing*, they will have all that is necessary to live in God's love. Jesus was trying to teach the Apostles the hard lesson that they need to trust what they have learned

and what they have been living. We, too, need to take that lesson to heart.

Today's Gospel is a bit about handing on what is in the family. Every family has a talent, an attitude, or a particular trait that appears here and there throughout the family tree. Jesus tells us today that he lives on in each of us through the Spirit. Jesus lives on through a holy attitude, a helping hand, a grateful smile. Guided by his commandments, we have the Spirit coursing through our spiritual veins, and we recognize him in others, and sometimes in ourselves. He remains with us, lives through us, and we share the life of God in those familiar and holy ways of the Spirit inherited through the sacraments.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, May 22 Our Advocate

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus refers to the Advocate as the Spirit of truth. In the First Reading, Lydia who is persistent and faithful, becomes an advocate for her household and her friends, who eventually are baptized by Paul. For whom are you an advocate? *Today's Readings: Acts 16:11–15; Psalm 149:1b–2, 3–4, 5–6a, 9b; John 15:26–16:4a*.

Tuesday, May 23 Good Works, Belief, and Baptism

The account of Paul and Silas in prison, in today's First Reading, shows the strength and faith of the disciples as they spread the Good News. Because of the imprisoned evangelizers' faith, the jailer is converted. He then cares for them and is baptized, along with his household. How does your life draw others to the faith? *Today's Readings: Acts 16:22–34; Psalm 138:1–2ab, 2cde–3, 7c–8; John 16:5–11.*

Wednesday, May 24 Dying and Rising

Too often, we accept Christ's dying and rising without recognizing its profound impact on our lives. How have you allowed your faith to transform you? Have you struggled and made it through a dark time and found new life with God's help? In this sixth week of Easter, the depth of the meaning of the Paschal Mystery may just be dawning on you. Hang on to the realization of that new meaning and allow transformation to occur. *Today's Readings: Acts 17:15, 22—18:1; Psalm 148:1–2, 11–12, 13, 14; John 16:12–15.*

Thursday, May 25 Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations." We often wonder how we are to fulfill this command from Jesus. In *The Joy of the Gospel*, Pope Francis speaks of slowing down and accompanying people, allowing them to share their concerns. We can respond to others by humbly and gently sharing God's Word. *Today's Readings: Acts 1:1–11; Psalm 47:2–3, 6–7, 8–9; Ephesians 1:17–23; Matthew 28:16–20.*

Thursday of the Sixth Week in Easter

In today's reading from Acts and the Gospel, the way Jesus' disciples acted before he died and rose is contrasted with how they lived afterwards. In the Gospel, Jesus' words puzzle the Apostles. In Acts, however, Paul proceeds to spread the Good News with no qualms. He knows that his faith is based in Jesus Christ. *Today's Readings: Acts 18:1–8; Psalm 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; John 16:16–20.*

Friday, May 26 St. Philip Neri, Priest

Holiness and humor mark the life of Philip Neri (1515–1595), who frequently used lighthearted methods to emphasize a more spiritual, deeper meaning. He turned Carnival into a pilgrimage to the seven churches, complete with music, laughter, and dancing. The focus on the churches attracted so many, and the movement around the city of Rome was so exhausting, that there was no time for sinful partying. How can you use humor for holiness' sake? *Today's Readings: Acts* 18:9–18; *Psalm* 47:2–3, 4–5, 6–7; *John* 16:20–23.

Saturday, May 27 Complete Confidence in God

"If you ask anything of the Father in my name he will give it to you," Jesus tells us in today's Gospel. We often take that as an endorsement to ask for just about anything. Our prayer, however, must truly be in Jesus' name. That implies less control on every small desire we have, and more asking for the joy promised. How that joy is delivered is up to God. *Today's Readings: Acts 18:23–28; Psalm 47:2–3, 8–9, 10; John 16:23b–28.*

One thing is certain: The Spirit witnesses to the truth of Christ, who lives in us and with us. The Holy Spirit guides and teaches the Church, which is the body of Christ. In confirmation, the grace of the Spirit becomes fully manifested in us, enabling us to tell the world that we follow Jesus and have become new people in Christ.

The saints who were our heroes and our namesakes allowed the Spirit of God to change their lives so they were more like Jesus. No wonder we were invited to be like them.

Maybe it's time to work on that again. †

Therefore, the Holy Spirit is the love between the Father and the Son. The Holy Spirit is consubstantial with the Father and the Son. This divine mystery occurs because the goodness of God must be communicated and shared.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church lists several ways in which we come to know the Holy Spirit within the Church (CCC 688). First on the list is sacred Scripture, which the Spirit inspires. We grow in our relationship to the Spirit by hearing and responding to the voice of the Spirit speaking through the biblical writings.

After Scripture, the *Catechism* lists Tradition and the magisterium as places we encounter the Holy Spirit. Reading the writings of the early Church fathers and studying the first Church councils, I was struck by the beauty and wisdom in their writings. I began to recognize

communicate its goodness. This explains the existence of the whole of creation. It affords a place for the Most Holy Trinity to communicate its goodness and share God's divine life. We are then called into existence out of pure love. Humanity has the capacity to receive and enter into a relationship with divine love. We also have the capacity to communicate, share, and love the Most Holy Trinity.

This is the call to holiness and wholeness in the life of every person, the call to respond to the love of God poured into our hearts. There is only one proper response to a God who would give

Tradition as the Holy Spirit leading us into a deeper understanding of the mystery of Christ.

After Scripture, Tradition, and the magisterium, the *Catechism* mentions the sacramental liturgy as a place we come to know the Holy Spirit. The work of the Spirit prepares us for the liturgy. In silence and prayer before Mass, we can receive this work of the Spirit, who will inspire faith and desire in our hearts.

Next, the Spirit recalls the events and meaning of Christ's coming. Through the readings, homily, and prayers of the Mass, Christ is manifested to us by the Holy Spirit as we recall what he has done for us. The Spirit makes that event present. Through the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ.

As we receive Christ in holy

himself up to us and even die for us—the gift of self. We give ourselves in loving service to the one who gave himself in loving service to us.

Holiness is setting oneself aside for the purposes of God. We realize our lives are not our own. We have been redeemed by the blood of Jesus Christ. And so we are bound to God and offer ourselves in service to our sisters and brothers, who are also the children of God. This service in love brings us wholeness at both a personal and communal level. †
