

GLUTEN INTOLERANT?

The Parish now provides an option for receiving Holy Communion for anyone suffering from gluten intolerance or celiac disease. We have obtained special altar breads that are fully certified for use at Mass by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, and laboratory tested to contain only .001% gluten. Please see the Pastor or the Sacristan before Mass about receiving Communion using one of these special hosts.

<u>RCIA</u>

The <u>**Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults**</u> is the process by which people become members of the Roman Catholic Church. **RCIA** is intended to serve:

- Those not Baptized who would like to learn more about the Catholic religion.
- Those Baptized in another religion who think they might like to become Catholic.
- Those Baptized Catholic but have not been raised in the Faith.

PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 11:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, June 4, 2017 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. CREMATION & THE CHURCH

On October 25, 2016, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith published a new instruction on the burial of the dead and on the conservation of the ashes in cases of cremation. The instruction reiterated the long held view that the Church is not opposed to the practice of cremation, though it continues to recommend that the bodies of the deceased be buried in cemeteries or other sacred places. However the new document insists that ashes should not be kept in private homes, and that the scattering of ashes in the air, on land or at sea is not permitted. The instruction also insisted that cremains may not be divided among various family members, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry or other objects. 

June 4, 2017 Send Out Your Spirit

Today's Readings: Acts 2:1–11; Psalm 104:1, 24, 29–30, 31, 34; 1 Corinthians 12:3b–7, 12–13; Sequence Veni, Sancte Spiritus; John 20:19–23. "Lord, send out your Spirit, and renew the face of the earth," we sing as the refrain for the Responsorial Psalm today. The Spirit sent and received at Pentecost is a spirit of renewal, unity, empowerment, and clarity. The description of being filled with the Spirit, and its lasting effects, is powerful. Those filled with the Holy Spirit can change the hearts of those they encounter. However, even in unity, there is a great array of spiritual gifts, as we hear from St. Paul in the Second Reading. The Spirit calls us to be one in Christ, but to participate in our different ministries and "activities." The beauty of the Holy Spirit is described in the Sequence from today's liturgy, in which we call forth the Spirit to fill our inmost being, and to shed all seven gifts upon us.

Where are the Spirit's gifts found in you? Are you called to serve others at prayer, or to teach? Perhaps you are given insight and understanding. On this Pentecost day, name your gift of the Spirit, and celebrate the manifestation of the Spirit and the benefit you are called to confer. We who are part of the one body are given the same Spirit, and joyfully unite in proclaiming—each in our own language and expression—that Jesus is Lord. May we take to heart the words of today's Sequence, *Veni, Sancte Spiritus*, as we sing, "Give them virtue's sure reward; / Give them your salvation, Lord; / Give them joys that never end. Amen. / Alleluia!"



THIS WEEK AND BEYOND

June 9 St. Ephrem

Called the "Harp of the Spirit," Ephrem was a hymn writer and quite a poet for fourth-century Syria. He not only taught through his hymn texts, he created poetic phrases that captured beautiful meanings for the sacraments, the Church, Christ, and Mary. Find a favorite hymn today, and notice each text, each verse, and each image. What captures your religious imagination in that hymn? *Today's Readings: Colossians 3:12–17; Psalm 37:3–4, 5–6, 30–31; Luke 6:43–45.*

June 24

Nativity of St. John the Baptist

With humility, John understood his role as the forerunner of Christ. Anticipating the coming of Christ, he states, "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30). The date that we celebrate John's birth coincides with John's statement. After the birth of Jesus, which is near the winter solstice, the days lengthen. With the celebration of John's birth on June 24, close to the summer solstice, the days become shorter. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 49:1–6; Psalm 139:1b–3, 13–14ab, 14c–15; Acts 13:22–26; Luke 1:57–66, 80.*

July 14 St. Kateri Tekakwitha, Virgin

The first Native American saint, Kateri Tekakwitha survived the loss of her parents, disfigurement by small pox, and ridicule and bullying from two tribes. Her faith was her solace. She would walk through the woods, picking up twigs and binding them together as a small cross, and then stick them in the ground. When she returned, she would stop at each twig cross to say a prayer. Make twig crosses and use them to mark prayer stations in your home or on your property. *Today's Readings: Hosea 2:16bc, 17cd, 21–22; Psalm 148:1bc–2, 11–12, 13, 14; Luke 10:38–42.*

July 18 St. Camillus de Lellis, Priest

Dedicated to caring for the sick, Camillus de Lellis (d. 1614) not only built hospitals and cared for the ill himself, he founded his own congregation, the Ministers of the Sick, whom he trained and inspired to care for those who are ill, and to treat them with great care and love. *Today's Readings: 1 John 3:14–18; Psalm 112:1–2, 3–4, 5–6, 7–8, 9; John 15:9–17.*

July 25 St. James, Apostle

Often referred to as St. James the Greater, and brother of John the evangelist, this Apostle is considered to have been part of Jesus' inner circle. In Spain, his name has become well known as people travel the Camino de Santiago, also known as the Way of St. James, to the Shrine of St. James the Great in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela. Pilgrims worldwide claim St. James as their patron. *Today's Readings:* 2 *Corinthians* 4:7–15; *Psalm* 126:1bc–2ab, 2cd–3, 4–5, 6; *Matthew* 20:20–28.

August 6 Transfiguration of the Lord

The Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord unites the Old and New Testaments in a particular way. Not only is Jesus truly transfigured but Moses and Elijah, the Law and the Prophets, are also transfigured. It is not lost on us that Jesus has given new meaning to all that Moses and the Law, or Elijah and all prophets, have supplied up to that time. We can be transfigured as well, as we find new meaning through Jesus Christ in what we say, learn, do, and offer today. *Today's Readings: Daniel 7:9–10, 13–14; Psalm 97:1–2, 5–6, 9; 2 Peter 1:16–19; Matthew 17:1–9.*

"And they were all filled with the holy Spirit."

"[Jesus] said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.'" into that locked room the Holy Spirit blew, bringing gifts of grace and strength they couldn't imagine.

Were they still afraid? Probably. Did they suddenly know what to do? Probably not. But they knew they could not be silent.

Something compelled them to go out, confident that they had a gift to share with the world. What they couldn't have realized was that the Spirit fell on the world that day as well—allowing those whose hearts were opened to hear the words of life preached by those who at one time didn't know what to say.

Pentecost is often referred to as the birthday of the Church. The Church remains what it was at the first—imperfect women and men gifted by the Spirit to speak the good news to other imperfect women and men who have been gifted to hear it.

The Spirit blows through the world even now—the presence of God, our Advocate, who invites us to proclaim Christ to all and gives us the grace to do so. †

Transformed by Easter

hristian history reaches its

crescendo point in the resurrection of Jesus.

The risen Jesus is the final revelation of the heart of God—a God who teaches love rather than hate, forgiveness rather than blame, nonviolence rather than violence.

Recall Jesus' encounters with his disciples after his resurrection. He comes to the circle of followers with whom he had spent three years. These people, who were closest to him, had nevertheless rejected, betrayed, and abandoned him. Following his resurrection, Jesus has the opportunity to chastise them. And yet in all four Gospel accounts of the risen Christ we see that Jesus neither berates nor blames his disciples. Indeed, Peter, who had betrayed him three times, is given three chances to say to his master, "I love you."

There is nothing to be afraid of in the risen Jesus. We have in him the perfect icon of a God who is safe and a universe that is safe. We have a God who does not blame, does not punish, does not threaten, does not dominate. We have a God who breathes forgiveness. The whole biblical tradition has been moving to this moment where God is identified with universal forgiveness.

Once we have a personal experience in our own life of the risen Christ upholding us, naming us, loving us, freeing us, then we have nothing to fear. That's how secure Christ makes us because we have a reference point, we have a center point. We have received the gift of the Spirit. †

Pentecost People

We are a Pentecost people. Like the first disciples, we are gifted with the Holy Spirit so that we can share our faith with others. This is not always easy. Many of us were raised to believe that religion is a private matter. It can be difficult for us to talk about God or our faith. And yet, faith-sharing in families is crucial.

We live in a culture that in many ways no longer supports Judeo-Christian values. Thus, young people need to hear and see the people most important to them talking about and living the gospel message. If faith is going to be real in their lives, they need to see that faith is real in the lives of those closest to them.

Celebrate Pentecost this year with your family by reading or retelling the story from Acts 2:1-13. Talk about how you would have felt if you were in the upper room, and invite other family members to do the same. Discuss the Holy Spirit in your own life. How have you experienced the gifts of courage and understanding? When have you felt the Spirit's fruits of joy and peace? Finally, have fun with the symbols of fire and wind. Weather permitting, spend the afternoon flying a kite. Put together a wind chime. Have a special dinner with lots of candles. Talk about why you think fire and wind are symbols of the Holy Spirit.

Pentecost is the day the disciples were empowered by the Holy Spirit to leave the safety of the upper room and share their faith with a city of strangers. Why not take the risk this Pentecost and share your faith with those closest to you? If you were one of the disciples on that first Christian Pentecost, what would you have wanted to share about your faith? Trust in the Spirit. Like those early disciples, you may be astonished at the results. †
