
THE ROOF REPLACEMENT PROJECT AND CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FOR SAINT LUKE THE EVANGELIST PARISH

EUCHARIST IS THE CULMINATION SACRAMENT

The Eucharist is the summit in the center of our lives in the church community. In its celebration we become rooted in the mystery of the dying and rising of Jesus Christ. We anticipate the heavenly banquet already here on earth. All the other sacraments either lead to the Eucharist or flow from the Eucharist.

By our pastoral adaptations during the 20th century, we seem to treat Confirmation as the "crowning sacrament," not the Eucharist. We did this especially by delaying its celebration and requiring longer and more elaborate preparation.

Baptism and Confirmation prepare us for the celebration of Eucharist. By Baptism we have been given access to the family of God's New Covenant people. In Confirmation we have been sealed in the relationship of community in the body of Christ. Thus, we have a right to sit at the "family table" on Sundays and share in the body and blood of the Lord.

Confirmation functions as a sealing of Baptism and as a qualification for the Eucharistic assembly. Confirmation, therefore, should be celebrated *between* Baptism and Eucharist, *before* Eucharist, not after.

A number of adult Catholics have never been confirmed in the church. There is something missing, spiritually, in the lives of those who have not been sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The church in this diocese will restore the traditional order in which the sacraments of initiation have celebrated: Baptism in infancy, usually, and then Confirmation and First Communion. Then the weekly celebration of the Eucharist will truly become a feast of the family, with all its members being fully initiated.

All Catholics in New Hampshire are being asked to reflect on this view of what it means to be confirmed. And as we adjust our perspective on the place of Confirmation, the preeminent place of the Eucharist is more clearly highlighted.

PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on **Sunday**, **December 3**, **2017** in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. Please see Fr. Albert with questions.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 19

50th Anniversary of the Dedication of Mary, Mother of the Church in Newton

On November 19, 1967, Bishop Ernest Primeau of the Diocese of Manchester solemnly Dedicated the church in Newton for sacred use.

he rite for the dedication of a church and an altar is rightly considered among the most solemn liturgical services in the Catholic Church. A church is the place where the Christian community is gathered to hear the word of God, to



offer intercession and praise to God, and above all to celebrate the Holy Eucharist, and it is the place where the holy sacrament of the Eucharist is kept. Thus it stands as a special kind of image of the Church itself, which is God's temple built from living stones. And the altar of a church, around which the holy people of God gather to take part in the Lord's sacrifice and to be refreshed at the heavenly meal, stands as a sign of Christ himself, who is the priest, the victim, and the altar of his own sacrifice. The anniversary of dedication of each local Parish's church building is celebrated as a solemnity in that local community, outranking most Sundays in Ordinary Time and even the Parish's patron saint. Thomas G. Simons, author of Holy People, Holy Place: Rites for the Church's House (LTP: 1998), writes:

"The celebration of the anniversary of the dedication of the parish church building is an often- forgotten opportunity to celebrate the life of the local church and re-emphasize to the people the importance of the gathering place for God's holy people. It is an occasion in which sacred identity and local history become tangible. The continuity of the faith from generation to generation is celebrated".

On the weekend of November 18 & 19 we will pray in both of our Parish churches in thanksgiving for all the blessings received in our churches at Newton and in Plaistow. Join us in prayer to Almighty God who has blessed us in so many ways with the diversity and richness of our communities.

We will gather for Solemn Evening Prayer and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament on Sunday, November 19 at 6 PM in Newton. A reception will follow in the Church's narthex. All are welcome to celebrate with us!

Any Catholic married in a civil ceremony (JP) or in any religious ceremony other than a Catholic one (unless specifically excepted by the Bishop) is not living out the Sacrament of Marriage in its fullness according to the teaching of the Church. HOW TO MAKE A REPORT OF SEXUAL ABUSE

Child sexual abuse is a crime in the State of New Hampshire and the Church. New Hampshire law requires that anyone who has reason to suspect that a child is being or has been abused or neglected must make a report to the Division for Children, Youth & Families ("DCYF") of the State of New Hampshire, 1-800-894-5533. Any person who suspects or alleges child abuse on the part of a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of a parish, school, or institution of the diocese of Manchester is also encouraged to make a report to the Office for Ministerial Conduct, 603-669-3100. Church personnel - clergy, paid employees, and volunteers - have additional reporting requirements if they believe that Church personnel have sexually abused a child. Fundamental Planning

A t first glance, the well-prepared (including me) might take great pride in today's Gospel. You know who you are—you whose purses contain everything but the kitchen sink, you who stockpile food and fuel just in case "the big one" hits. I rarely leave the house without food, drinks, tissues, and reading materials and am often the one others come to when they're less than prepared for a long wait, unexpected hunger, or a surprise runny nose. And I'm hardly humble about my planning abilities—it's perhaps my favorite topic for gloating.

[Jesus said,] "Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour." Then how, on a recent weeklong trip, did I forget to pack underwear? My family was shocked that The Planner had forgotten something so basic. No gloating that week!

In gospel times, lamp oil was also a necessity—how would a lamp remain lit without oil? Yet five of the women in the wedding procession left home without it. Did they just forget? Did they think the bridegroom would be on time so there'd be no need for lamps after dark? How did they miss something so fundamental?

We too, in our busy lives, often miss the fundamentals. *Fundamental 1*: Life is short and we will die—at a time we don't know. *Fundamental 2*: Nothing is more important than our relationship with God.

Today's Gospel challenges us to think about how we're preparing ourselves for the end of our lives. We prepare wills, trusts, and health-care directives, but how about spiritual preparations? What are we doing to deepen our relationship with God every day? How are we living our Christian faith more concretely on a daily basis? These are the fundamentals. How prepared are we? †

We sometimes miss the basics.

Why Do We Suffer? By Michael D. Guinan, OFM

Harvey, Irma, and Maria, the Mexican and Haitian

earthquakes, the Indian Ocean tsunami. Accidents, terror attacks, disease, and death. Natural disasters and those produced by humans bring with them so much suffering. Ancient literature from Egypt and Mesopotamia attests that even then people called out, "Why?" In the lament psalms of the Bible, the psalmist cries out, "Why, Lord?" Our voices join an age-old chorus!

The problem of suffering is difficult. How can we understand a benevolent, just God in the face of such human experiences?

Perhaps the best biblical example of this struggle is found in the Book of Job. Job suffers the loss of possessions and family and is afflicted with a terrible disease. Friends hear of his plight and come to console him. After Job's cry of pain, the discussion begins.

Why is Job suffering? One easy answer that surfaces immediately is that Job deserves it; he is suffering because of his sins. When Job rejects this, his friends counter, in effect, "Don't give us that! All humans are rotten sinners!" For them, all suffering is somehow a punishment for sin. Sad to say, Job's friends have vocal descendants even now. While it is true that our sinful actions have consequences, as an all-purpose explanation, this one is too simplistic.

Problem or Mystery?

Even within the Book of Job, the situation is more complicated. As readers, we know from the start that his friends are wrong. Job is righteous, and his suffering is allowed by God to test his virtue. Other answers also appear in the book. Like any good ancient Near Eastern father, God disciplines us through suffering to make us better (5:17–18, 36:15). Or, suffering is mysterious, so who are we to understand God's ways? (11:7–10, 15:8–9).

Although these responses may give temporary relief, ultimately they are not satisfactory answers to the meaning of suffering. While we seek understanding, perhaps this is not the best approach to the problem. In fact, maybe the problem with suffering is that it is not really a "problem" at all, but a mystery.

What is the difference? A problem is something "out there." We can see all the pieces, survey its dimensions. The question is, how do we put it together? How do we solve it? Problems are solved intellectually. A mystery is different. It is a situation in which I am so immersed that I can never get far enough away to see it all "out there." Love and death are mysteries. So is suffering.

Mysteries involve us on the deepest levels of our relationships with ourselves, others, the natural world, and with God. To be human is to be enmeshed in these relationships. When they grow into greater wholeness (through love) or come apart (through suffering), we are in the

presence of mystery. We will never solve the meaning of suffering any more than the meaning of love.

"I Am With You"

At the heart of Christianity is the affirmation that, through the Incarnation, Jesus entered into these relationships too. Jesus fully shared in the human condition. When he faced suffering and death, he also called out, "Why?" His final words from the cross were, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Mark 15:34). We know that God did not forsake Jesus but raised him to everlasting life.

Nowhere in Scripture do we read, "Have faith in me, and you will understand everything, including suffering!" But we do read, whatever the suffering, "Do not be afraid, for I am with you." We do not suffer alone. Together, we survive all suffering—even death itself! †
