
THE ROOF REPLACEMENT PROJECT AND CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FOR SAINT LUKE THE EVANGELIST PARISH

ADULT CONFIRMATION

Are you an adult who has been Baptized and received Eucharist, but has not celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation? The adult Confirmation process is an opportunity to complete the Sacraments of Initiation. If you would like to prepare for Confirmation, or if you have questions, call Cathy Smith at 603-382-8324, ext. 305 or email her at csmith@stluketheevangelist.net.

RCIA

The <u>Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u> is the process by which people become members of the Roman Catholic Church. **RCIA** is intended to serve:

- Those not Baptized who would like to learn more about the Catholic religion.
- Those Baptized in another religion who think they might like to become Catholic.
- Those Baptized Catholic but have not been raised in the Faith.

PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, March 4, 2018 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. Please see Fr. Albert with questions.







LENTEN REGULATIONS

FASTING

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

ABSTINENCE

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

EASTER PRECEPT

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to **receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season** (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the **Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist.** Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All of the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praise worthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.

Lenten Prayer and Liturgy

The Church invites all people to special moments of prayer during the season of Lent. It is a common custom for people to make room in their schedule for daily Eucharist, which we celebrate as follows during the Lenten season:

Monday	8 am	Newton
Tuesday	8 am	Plaistow
Wednesday	6:30 PM	Plaistow
Thursday	8 am	Newton

Another Lenten custom involves taking a journey... to the Holy Land! Going on pilgrimage has always been an important part of our Christian tradition. By visiting a place where a religious event occurred, a



pilgrim hoped to share in the experience associated with that place. The desire to visit Jerusalem and the Holy Land was very important to Christians long ago, but because of the danger and expense of travel, and the political climate of Palestine, such a journey was not always feasible. When the Friars of the Franciscan Order took over the care of the Holy Places in Jerusalem in 1342, they began to erect "Stations" in Churches back home in Europe. It was a way to "go" to the Holy Land without ever leaving home. The custom of the Stations quickly spread to parish Churches, and the devotion of the Stations of the Cross was born.

Praying the Stations of the cross

We walk the Stations of the Cross each Friday of Lent at 6:30 at NEWTON Using various versions and forms of the Stations, and led by various groups

in the Parish, we make Jesus' journey to the Cross our own. **On March 23, we will conclude our evening Stations with a Lenten Soup Supper.**

Baptismal Font and Holy Water Font


During Lent, we pray and prepare to renew our own Baptismal promises even as we pray as a community for those to be Baptized. Following ancient custom, the Sacrament of Baptism is not ordinarily celebrated during Lent, and the Baptismal Font itself is sealed. We also "fast" from the Baptismal water usually present at the doors of the Church. The entire Church waits with Jesus in the desert, praying for the Living Waters of Easter.



Lenten Space, Silence, & Music

During Lent, the Church's lighting is dimmed so as to encourage an atmosphere of prayer and introspection. Our Assembly's music is more meditative and somber. **We leave at the end of Mass in silence**, reflecting on our mission as Disciples to pray, fast, and to give of ourselves in the coming week.

Sunday, March 11, 2018



Today's Readings: 2 Chronicles 36:14–16, 19–23; Psalm 137:1–2, 3, 4–5, 6; Ephesians 2:4–10; John 3:14–21. The readings today tell of the merciful love of God. Carey Landry emphasizes this aspect of God in the song "God is Rich in Mercy" in which he wrote, "God is rich in mercy, full of compassion." Today's Gospel points out that God's love for us is so profound that he offered his only Son on the Cross so that we might have eternal life. When we consider our ancestors in the faith, we learn they wrestled to follow the Commandments and remain faithful to God just as we do today.

In the Book of Chronicles, the Israelites were taken into captivity as punishment for their infidelity, but even here,

God's mercy prevails when King Cyrus, inspired by the Lord, freed the people. Sin causes us to turn away from God, but instead of punishment, God gives us the gift of his Son who has redeemed us; he has brought us out of the darkness into his light. No matter the circumstances in which we find ourselves, God is present and mercy overflows.

In this season of mercy, it is important to name those sins that keep us from God and seek forgiveness. It is also important to show mercy to others, especially those whom we may have harmed in any way. As you ponder God's mercy, consider celebrating the Sacrament of Penance this week.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, March 12

Healed

When we reflect on Scripture, we consider not only physical healing but spiritual transformations. The first thing you might notice in the Gospel is that the official's son is healed, but that is not the end of the story. When the son is healed, the man "came to believe." The Psalm provides a prayer of thanksgiving for the times we have been rescued/healed by God. Make a list of those times God has been with you and healed you. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 65:17–21; Psalm 30:2 and 4, 5–6, 11–12a and 13b; John 4:43–54.*

Tuesday, March 13 Living Water

As you reflect on today's readings, keep Baptism in mind. Water is a mighty force of nature. It can nourish our bodies and the ground or destroy everything in its path. In Baptism, everything unclean in us is destroyed and we are nourished with the Living Water. Ezekiel's vision tells of the abundance where the river flows. Christ is the Living Water that brings us life. *Today's Readings: Ezekiel 47:1–9, 12; Psalm 46:2–3, 5–6, 8–9; John 5:1–16.*

Wednesday, March 14 Jesus, the Son of God

In the Gospel, Jesus tells the people that he is the Son of God and that the time will come when all will be raised to new life. As in the First Reading, where Isaiah prophesies about the day of the Lord, Jesus too promises that the dead who have done good will hear and have life. How well have you responded to God's voice this Lenten season? God is truly gracious and merciful. Open your hearts to his Word. Write about or draw the images that come to mind after reading the Gospel. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 49:8–15; Psalm 145:8–9, 13cd–14, 17–18; John 5:17–30.*

Thursday, March 15 Golden Calf

The First Reading once again highlights God's profound mercy for his loved ones. The Israelites have crafted a golden calf to worship. They have lost faith in God and turned away from him. We too struggle to remain faithful, especially when we feel lost, alone, or afraid. Moses helped the people see God's presence. Who helps you see God's presence? Know that no matter the sin, God will not shower wrath upon you but will call you home and wait patiently for your loving gaze. Make a list of the "golden calves" in your life and offer them up in prayer. *Today's Readings: Exodus* 32:7–14; *Psalm* 106:19–20, 21–22, 23; *John* 5:31–47.

Friday, March 16 The Wisdom of God

Though written long before the time of Christ, the First Reading describes how those who reject Jesus' wisdom plotted to kill him. Wickedness blinds our hearts to see what is good and righteous. It sets us on a path of destruction. By his death and Resurrection, Jesus confronts sin and death so that we might have life. Do we have ears to hear and hearts to learn the wisdom of God? Invite a wisdom figure from your life to coffee or tea. *Today's Readings: Wisdom 2:1a, 12–22; Psalm 34:17–18, 19–20, 21 and 23; John 7:1–2, 10, 25–30.*

Saturday, March 17

Refuge

During these final days of Lent, listen carefully to the refrain of the Psalm. In times of pain and weakness, God is truly our refuge. This Lenten season may have revealed the blind spots within our hearts, but all should know that sin cannot take hold when we seek refuge in God. Allow God's mercy to wash over you and ask for God's justice. Pray today for all those who seek refuge and safety. *Today's Readings: Jeremiah 11:18–20, Psalm 7:2–3, 9bc–10, 11–12; John 7:40–53.*

We Are God's Handiwork

My husband likes to photograph the beauty of creation. He has gotten very good at it, sometimes zooming in to focus on the details of individual flowers or butterflies, other times zooming out to capture the glory of a waterfall, a mountain lake, or the fiery clouds billowing from one of Hawaii's volcanoes into a night sky full of stars.

Several of his photos decorate my office walls. He's justifiably proud of each. They're the work of his artist's eye and hand, so he signs them and takes care to frame them just right.

In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul calls us God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus—not because we are so amazing (we are, in fact, sinners), but because he loved us.

John's Gospel echoes the sentiment: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son." If a human being like my husband can take pleasure in and be justifiably proud of the work of his own hands, then how much more can God love his own handiwork? The answer, of course, is immeasurably more. God loved us enough to give us himself in Christ Jesus, who laid down his life for us though we had done nothing to deserve it.

The photos my husband creates can't thank him or give anything back to him, but it is in our power to thank our Creator, who filled us with life and redeemed us through Jesus' death and resurrection.

Today, try to love someone else a little more out of sheer gratitude that God so loves you. +

Imitating God's Powerful Mercy

"Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy."

-Matthew 5:7

When words aren't accompanied by actions, they lose power. If we hear someone talking endlessly about mercy but never practicing it, we yawn and turn away. "Don't just tell me; show me!" we protest.

To establish credibility, it is important to note how Jesus shows mercy before he ever mentions it. When we think of how he practiced mercy throughout his life, we remember dramatic cures of desperate people: the centurion's servant, paralytic, or hemorrhaging woman.

But we should also remember the ordinary, daily mercies he practiced as easily as breathing. This resembles the kind of mercy God showers on us. By all accounts, the disciples could be dense. Yet Jesus tolerated their stupid questions, petty feuds, and shameful disloyalty. Rarely did he show annoyance. He never said, "I've been with you this long and you still don't get it?"

Even more mercifully, he calls them his friends and asks them to continue his work on earth. He empowers them to preach the good news, cherish the poor, and cure the sick. Without a word about their miserable failings, he sends them on

a mission to be his witness throughout the earth. That is copious mercy.

Perhaps the last beatitude should be, "Blessed are those who live the beatitudes, for they bring the teaching alive." How do we learn to be merciful? Most agree that with charity, they'd rather be on the giving end. It's painful to receive, perhaps because humans often mix condescension with charity.

But mercy—ah, that's a different story. When we know we've goofed and squirm with tension awaiting the penalty, mercy comes like a cool breeze in the heat. Our self-defenses and excuses crumble with relief. In a burst of goodwill, we vow never to do that again or be so stupid.

Holding Back

And what of those who act mercifully? Here it's harder to be on the giving end. It's so tempting to "teach 'em a lesson they'll never forget," to assess the full payment. Just once, we have our coworkers, our opponent, our spouse, or our child in a position where we could demonstrate our power to pulverize. One who has made a mistake is—quite literally—"at our mercy."

And yet the merciful hold back. They relax into the image of a compassionate God, saying, "Let God take care of the punishment." Or they remember how often they've been in a jam, when others have shown mercy.

For centuries Christians have prayed, "Lord have mercy. Christ have mercy."

And God has given us mercy that far surpasses what we deserve.

God's Unending Mercy

Each morning, we receive the gift of twenty-four new, unexplored hours. We are given health, breath, and energy. God calls us to nurture the next generation, to make the world more beautiful through art, music, and literature. Furthermore, he gives us remarkable gifts: abilities to compute, meditate, inspire, heal, and teach. In a continuous flow of grace, God overlooks our worst errors and failures.

We may recognize God's mercy in a disaster narrowly averted, a diagnosis of "benign" instead of "malignant," events that come together to save our necks. After years of praying "Kyrie eleison," we can respond to this divine outpouring with a mercy that mirrors God's.

If God showers us daily with his mercies, we can be more tolerant of the slow coworker, resist the urge to lambaste a careless child, and show restraint when we discover the mistake of a friend. Then we all become richer in mercy. +
