***** FAITH FORMATION & PARISH INFORMATION *

A LITTLE HISTORY ABOUT CONFIRMATION

Oftentimes after Confirmation some of our young people feel that they have *graduated* from the religious education programs and parish. Their parents have made great efforts to get them confirmed, and then breathe a sigh of relief, "At least we got that done!"

Is that what Confirmation is about? "Something to get done?" Why have Confirmation at all? Does it have anything to do with youth ministry?

In the Western church, when the bishop could not be present for the Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion with new Christians, priests were allowed to Baptize and to preside at the Eucharist in the name of the bishop. But bishops reserved the celebration of Confirmation to themselves in order to give witness to the unity of the church family in the diocese. Thus, people could be baptized in the parish where there was a priest. But Confirmation was delayed until the bishop could be present. Gradually, it was delayed so long that it started to be regarded as a "sacrament of maturity." That is not the original meaning or Confirmation as a Sacrament.

We know that Christian growth is a lifelong transformation through the grace of Christ. The danger we run into when Confirmation is celebrated in the teenage years is that it may be considered as some kind of "graduation" from church involvement. Youth ministry has its own singular importance and place in the church. It should not be used as a preparation for Confirmation. Once youth ministry has been liberated from the burden of Confirmation programming, it can find its own authenticity.

The history of the church's Confirmation practice demonstrates that Confirmation belongs before the Eucharist. We need to find a way to get it back where it belongs.

<u>RCIA</u>

The <u>Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u> is the process by which people become members of the Roman Catholic Church. PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday. held May 6, 2018 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the welcome. Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. Please see Fr. Albert with questions.

Restore • Renew • Proclaim the Hope that is Christ



The Diocese of Manchester is in the process of continuing to strengthen and renew faith formation in our parish, school and home school communities. Through this process we are being called anew to "Restore, Renew and Proclaim the Hope that is Christ."

The goal is to make lifelong faith formation a priority and a reality throughout the diocese. This requires a few things:

- Making adult faith formation a priority in our parishes, which includes formation of catechists, parents and the entire adult community.
- Strengthening our youth ministry programs to include all teens of high school age.
- Reimagining our sacrament preparation processes to include a return to celebrating the sacraments of initiation in their **restored order**: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist.

What is Lifelong Faith Formation?

Lifelong faith formation is a process of growing in the faith that begins with baptism. Immersed in the life of the Trinity, we are adopted sons and daughters of God our Father, brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ and temples of the Holy Spirit. Like all human relationships, developing and deepening our relationship with the Trinity happens gradually and over time. Consequently, lifelong faith formation provides opportunities and experiences throughout the entire life span to strengthen our relationship and knowledge of God, Jesus and the Spirit; to enhance our understanding of Scripture, Tradition and doctrines of our faith; and to sustain us in living as disciples of Jesus Christ.

What does restored order of the Sacraments mean?

Restored order means returning the three sacraments of Christian initiation to the logical order in which they were designed to be celebrated: first Baptism, then Confirmation, then Eucharist. During the first five hundred years or so of the history of the Church, it was always the case that the sacraments of Christian initiation were celebrated in this sequence.

Why is the Diocese of Manchester changing the age of Confirmation?

By placing Confirmation at this age, the Diocese of Manchester will be following the natural sequence of the sacraments of Christian initiation. In addition, by placing Confirmation **prior to the reception of First Eucharist** it makes it easier to view the Eucharist as the summit of Christian initiation.

How is the celebration of Confirmation going to change in the Diocese of Manchester?

By 2021, the standard age of Confirmation is going to be third grade, and Confirmation will be celebrated at the same liturgy as First Communion. As a result, the preparation and reception of the sacraments of initiation throughout the Diocese of Manchester will be Baptism in infancy, Confirmation and Eucharist in third grade. Although not a sacrament of initiation, the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be received in the second grade.

What are the benefits of restored order?

First, it will highlight that the Eucharist, not Confirmation, is the culmination of Christian initiation. Secondly, with the reception of grace of the Holy Spirit at a younger age, it will give children greater courage and guidance in facing the increasing difficulties of living a Christian life. Finally, it will allow for more opportunities for parents to take greater responsibility in their role as the primary educators of their children.

The Cornerstone

Almighty and ever-living God, you reveal your great love for us in your Son, Jesus. By his dying and rising, we have been made your children and so, we lift our voices to give thanks for your goodness. May Christ the cornerstone, provide us with the strength and courage to build up your Kingdom. Grant us a faith and love that moves us to lay aside our desires in order to work for justice. Implant your will deep within our hearts so that, we offer all that we are to you and for your glory. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Sunday, April 22, 2018 The Rejected Cornerstone

Today's Readings: Acts of the Apostles 4:8–12; Psalm 118:1, 8–9, 21–23, 26, 28, 29; 1 John 3:1–2; John 10:11–18. Together, the First Reading and the Gospel invite us to reflect on the saving power of God. Many thought that the Messiah would usher in war, and once he conquered, would reign as a powerful king. Jesus' reign is one of peace and love. The images our readings provide are that of a rejected stone and a shepherd. When Peter is confronted about the healing of the cripple, he tells the Jewish leaders that they are like builders who put aside a stone unfit for building. The reality is, they didn't examine it closely enough, and the stone that they reject is the Messiah. Think about the brutality Jesus suffered and the confrontations he experienced. The one who saves is the one who many humiliated and hunted down. Jesus is the foundation that keeps us from collapsing.

Similarly, in the Gospel, Jesus, as the Good Shepherd, lays aside everything for his sheep. Jesus isn't the warrior some were expecting, but a loving Savior in whom we take refuge. In the name of this unexpected Savior, the cripple was healed and we are healed. Who in our communities, like Jesus, is rejected or ignored? Reach out to those and help them know they are loved and have gifts to share in building up the Kingdom. Engage in some active imagination with the image of Christ the cornerstone. How does this image comfort or challenge you?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, April 23 The Gate

The Gospel shows Jesus as the gate through which people must enter to be saved. Imagine a gate. It can keep things in or out. It has the potential to protect. By his death and Resurrection, Jesus has opened the Kingdom of Heaven. By uniting ourselves to him, we enter into his sheepfold. Meditate on Jesus as the gate, and see how he leads you to the Kingdom. *Today's Readings: Acts of the Apostles* 11:1–18; *Psalm* 42:2–3; 43:3, 5; John 10:1–10.

Tuesday, April 24 All Nations

In the Scriptures, reference to the Gentiles usually is a reference for all non-Jewish people. Our First Reading helps depict how the Church is growing beyond Jerusalem and spreading to all nations, even the Greeks. As disciples, we are called to give witness to Christ the Shepherd to all peoples. In your prayer today, include a petition that all nations might know the peace and love of Christ. *Today's Readings: Acts of the Apostles 11:19–26; Psalm 87:1b–3, 4–5, 6–7; John10:22 – 30.*

Wednesday, April 25 Feast of St. Mark

Today's readings provide three ideas on which to reflect. First, in the Gospel, Jesus tells the Apostles to preach to all nations. Second, Peter tells us to be sober and vigilant in order to remain steadfast in faith. Third, the Psalm invites us to praise for all God has done for us. Be attentive to Christ's presence as you share time with another today. *Today's Readings: 1 Peter 5:5b–14; Psalm 89:2–3, 6–7, 16–17; Mark 16:15–20.*

Thursday, April 26 Bold and Confident

Scripture's portrayal of Paul is bold and confident. As Paul speaks to the people in the synagogue, he recounts Israel's history, showing that Jesus is the Chosen One sent by God, the One foretold by the prophets. Have you ever been in a situation where you needed to share your faith boldly? We are heirs of God's promise who go forth sharing the Good News. We are the messengers Christ has sent. Send a message of Good News to a friend to reconnect. *Today's Readings: Acts of the Apostles 13:13–25; Psalm 89:2–3, 21–22, 25 and 27; John 13:16–20.*

Friday, April 27 Light and Path

God truly has kept his promise by raising Jesus from the dead. Jesus is the true light of life and the path of salvation and anyone who comes to him becomes a child of God. If you were sitting in the synagogue listening to Paul preach, how might you have responded? Paul invites unbelievers to follow the Light and believers to show forth the Light. Spend time praying with the Psalm refrain. *Today's Readings: Acts of the Apostles 13:26–33; Psalm 2:6–7, 8–9, 10–11ab; John14: 1–6.*

Saturday, April 28 Jealousy

In the First Reading, the Jews are jealous of the crowds who gather to hear Paul and Barnabas. Jealousy is a problem. It can lead one to embrace malice. The disciples teach us a lesson by dusting their feet and moving on. When have you felt jealous and what incited those feelings? Dialogue with Jesus about a time you were jealous and hear his advice. *Today's Readings: Acts of the Apostles 13:44–52; Psalm 98, 1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; John 14:7–14.*

HOW TO MAKE A REPORT OF SEXUAL ABUSE

Child sexual abuse is a crime in the State of New Hampshire and the Church. New Hampshire law requires that anyone who has reason to suspect that a child is being or has been abused or neglected must make a report to the Division for Children, Youth & Families ("DCYF") of the State of New Hampshire, 1-800-894-5533. Any person who suspects or alleges child abuse on the part of a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of a parish, school, or institution of the diocese of Manchester is also encouraged to make a report to the Office for Ministerial Conduct, 603-669-3100. Church personnel - clergy, paid employees, and volunteers - have additional reporting requirements if they believe that Church personnel have sexually abused a child. Our Good Shepherd

y mother lived for a time on a ranch in Texas. The ranch had cattle and sheep. My mother told me that sheep are pretty dumb and need a lot of care. She had great respect for the ranch hands who patiently got them out to pasture and then rounded them up when it was time to come in. Left to their own devices, she said, sheep would be easy prey for coyotes, foxes, and bobcats that roam the hill country.

Sheep were important for many families living in first-century Palestine as well. They provided food, clothing, milk, and a source of income.

A good shepherd was worth his weight in gold, because he spent his days with the sheep, leading them to pasture, protecting them from harm, and finding them when they got lost.

Shepherds may not have had a high social status, but it would have been hard to live without them.

Jesus, the Good Shepherd, does all these things for his flock, and then goes even further: "I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly. I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

The ranch hands my mother talked about would have grieved over a dead sheep but wouldn't have died trying to save it. They made sure the sheep were watered and fed, but they didn't make the sheep's lives more abundant.

But we have abundant life because Jesus laid down his life for us. He is our Good Shepherd. Can we ask anything more?

Treasuring Sabbath Time

Third Commandment: "Remember the sabbath day—keep it holy" (Exodus 20:8).

We've all gotten a Great Idea in the shower, on the bus, at the gym, or staring into space. We might suddenly remember where we left the keys, decide what's for dinner, or solve a problem that's been annoying us. The mind relishes empty spaces, becoming more creative in decluttered stretches.

If that is true in daily life, the Third Commandment shows how rest is even more important for our spiritual lives. The root meaning of the word *sabbath* is "to separate." It marks the end of one week and the start of another, or the close of work and the beginning of play.

As soon as a good directive like this is given, people exaggerate it. Some folks really ran amok with this one, even to the extreme of forbidding doing good on the Sabbath. Religious authorities spun into a frenzy when Jesus healed on the Sabbath. Clear-sighted as always, he reminded us: "The sabbath was made for man, not man for the sabbath" (Mark 2:27). In other words, if it helps you live a more fulfilled life, do it. If you're going through contortions to keep a law and losing compassion in the process, forget it.

How delightful when the commandments, carved solemnly on stone and written in the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, usually a grave document, both tell us to relax, lighten up.

Ready, Set, Go

For many of us, Sunday has become the "junk drawer" of the week: We cram in all the errands and duties that can't get done because of work pressures every other day. Retailers are happy to accommodate, and Sunday becomes Shopping Day.

What's wrong with this? It's not the greatest moral evil, but we could do better. In this pattern, we lose sight of what we were made to be: God's delight. We forget that we have abundant blessings and should take time to savor them, awash in gratitude.

The original meaning of the Sabbath was the day set aside for Israel to honor its covenant with God. Today, one way to observe it is with Sunday Mass. Sabbath time also reminds us that God is eager to have our attention and quick to pour out graces. When we clear our calendars and minds, we remember who we are, just as if we are making a retreat.

And if we don't? If we keep cranking out work and churning out errands, we look like responsible, tax-paying citizens. But by giving up quiet Sabbath time, we dehumanize ourselves and lose sight of what's most important. We were all made for loving God and each other. Other accomplishments are fine, but don't measure up to that.

Clearing Space for God

Some people may protest: "But I'm working three jobs to feed my family! Where am I supposed to fit in Sabbath?" For those who are this tightly scheduled, maybe it becomes an hour before the kids wake up or after they go to bed. Maybe it's time in the evening without television or computer. There are as many ways to keep holy the Sabbath as there are people. In such times we remember we are God's beloved, and no matter what life throws at us, nothing else is as fundamentally important.

Modeling a sense of Sabbath is especially important for parents. What do we want our children to remember? Mornings when the family snuggled in pajamas, built blanket caves, held tickling contests, and cooked something delicious? Or the fact that Mom and Dad dourly trooped off to work like robots? +
