A LITTLE HISTORY ABOUT CONFIRMATION

Oftentimes after Confirmation some of our young people feel that they have *graduated* from the religious education programs and parish. Their parents have made great efforts to get them confirmed, and then breathe a sigh of relief, "At least we got that done!"

Is that what Confirmation is about? "Something to get done?" Why have Confirmation at all? Does it have anything to do with youth ministry?

In the Western church, when the bishop could not be present for the Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion with new Christians, priests were allowed to Baptize and to preside at the Eucharist in the name of the bishop. But bishops reserved the celebration of Confirmation to themselves in order to give witness to the unity of the church family in the diocese. Thus, people could be baptized in the parish where there was a priest. But Confirmation was delayed until the bishop could be present. Gradually, it was delayed so long that it started to be regarded as a "sacrament of maturity." That is not the original meaning or Confirmation as a Sacrament.

We know that Christian growth is a lifelong transformation through the grace of Christ. The danger we run into when Confirmation is celebrated in the teenage years is that it may be considered as some kind of "graduation" from church involvement. Youth ministry has its own singular importance and place in the church. It should not be used as a preparation for Confirmation. Once youth ministry has been liberated from the burden of Confirmation programming, it can find its own authenticity.

The history of the church's Confirmation practice demonstrates that Confirmation belongs before the Eucharist. We need to find a way to get it back where it belongs.

ADULT CONFIRMATION

Are you an adult who has been Baptized and received Eucharist, but has not celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation? The adult Confirmation process is an opportunity to complete the Sacraments of Initiation. PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, January 6, 2019 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. Church baptismal Canon Law also regulates sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. Please see Fr. Albert with questions.

<u>RCIA</u>

The <u>**Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u>** is the process by which people become members of the Roman Catholic Church. WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the long-standing inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten: If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. During winter time storms and the clean up associated with major snowfall, access to the campuses in Newton and Plaistow will be restricted. Public notification of the closure will be accomplished through the Office of Religious Education and the Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten as in the past; Parishioners need only to look for indications of Timberlane or Sanborn school districts closure to assume that Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish is also closed.

The Parish Office and Liturgical schedule will typically be observed as usual even if school districts post a delay in their opening times.

In the event of winter events on a weekend, the Pastor, Facilities Director and Religious Education Coordinator will continue to work together to determine whether or not to cancel class meetings, Parish events or outside group activities. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.

Sunday, December 23, 2018 The Spirit Speaks through Elizabeth

Today's Readings: Micah 5:1–4*a*; *Psalm* 80:2–3, 15–16, 18–19; *Hebrews* 10:5–10; *Luke* 1:39–45. When we meet Elizabeth in today's Gospel, she is caught up in astonishing events. She is carrying a child in her old age while her husband, Zechariah, has been rendered mute after questioning an angel who gave him a message that the child would be conceived.

When her relative from Nazareth comes for a visit, Elizabeth grasps that something even greater is now happening. Her baby leaps in her womb; and Elizabeth, bursting with the Holy Spirit, knows at once the news that Mary has come to tell her. She is overwhelmed that her relative has been chosen to bring to birth the promised Messiah, and she recognizes God's abundant blessing in both Mary and this child. Mary, who had shared the news from the angel Gabriel with Joseph alone, now hears Elizabeth's words echoing the words of the angel. Gabriel had called Mary "favored one"; Elizabeth calls her "blessed among women." The angel had said the child to be born would be "holy, the Son of God"; Elizabeth calls him "Lord" (Luke 1:35).

Both Gabriel and Elizabeth echo Micah's long-ago prophecy of the Messiah: "his greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth: he shall be peace."

With Christmas nearly here, let us welcome Christ into our hearts with the same joy that Elizabeth did, and pledge to be instruments of his peace in our families and our world.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, December 24 Giver of All Gifts

Our gifts are bought and ready to be presented to loved ones. David, too, wants to give a gift—a house for God. God reminds David that God is the giver of all gifts, that all David has is from him. God shows his generosity by promising David a different kind of "house"—a kingship through his descendants that will last forever. Jesus, King over all peoples, fulfills the promise. We give thanks for God's extravagant gift of his Son. *Today's Readings: 2 Samuel 7:1–5, 8b–12, 14a, 16; Psalm 89:2–3, 4–5, 27 and 29; Luke 1:67–79.*

Tuesday, December 25 The Nativity of the Lord

Finally the waiting is over and we celebrate the birth of Jesus. When you place the image of the Infant Jesus in the manger of your crèche, remember this is no ordinary child! Jesus, the Word, was present in the beginning; and the world was created through him. "And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." How blessed we are that our God desires to dwell with us. Let us rejoice that Emmanuel—God with us—is born! *Today's Readings (Mass during the Day): Isaiah 52:7–10; Psalm 98:1, 2–3, 3–4, 5–6; Hebrews 1:1–6; John 1:1–18.*

Wednesday, December 26 St. Stephen, the First Martyr

Even as the Church joyfully celebrates the birth of Jesus for three more weeks, the feast of St. Stephen, the first martyr, refocuses us on the cost of discipleship. Stephen, a deacon in the early Church, was stoned by a mob while preaching the Gospel. With his dying breath, he begged God to forgive his killers. What is the cost of discipleship for us? Do you need to forgive someone who has wronged you? *Today's Readings: Acts* 6:8–10, 7:54–59; *Psalm* 31:3cd–4, 6 and 8ab, 16bc and 17; Matthew 10:17–22.

Thursday, December 27 St. John, Apostle and Evangelist

John and his brother James were fishermen who abandoned their nets and their father when Jesus called them to follow him. Although the authorship of the Gospel of John has been debated since AD 200, many Church fathers have attributed it to the Apostle John. The "beloved disciple" mentioned several times is believed to be John himself, who rested on Jesus' breast during the Last Supper, remained with him at the Cross, and "saw and believed" at the empty tomb. *Today's Readings: 1 John 1:1–4; Psalm 97:1–2, 5–6, 11–12; John 20:1a, 2–8.*

Friday, December 28 The Holy Innocents, Martyrs

Today we remember the boys Herod slaughters when he learns that Jesus, the "newborn king," has escaped his grasp. He cannot abide a rival king even though his own people are joyful at Jesus' birth. When we believe someone has taken something that is rightfully ours, we too can become enraged. What a different response Jesus counsels—to turn the other cheek! *Today's Readings: 1 John 1:5—2:2; Psalm 124:2–3, 4–5, 7b–8; Matthew 2:13–18.*

Saturday, December 29 Living in the Light of Christ

John juxtaposes light and darkness to compare our words with our deeds: "Whoever says he is in the light, yet hates his brother, is still in the darkness." The Church continues to celebrate this holy Christmas Time; lights still brighten our homes and yards to welcome Christ, our Light. But do we truly live in the light? The test given by John is whether we harbor hatred for anyone. It is never too late to request or give forgiveness, to give up a grudge, to reconcile with another. Only then will we truly live in the light of Christ, whose forgiveness and mercy toward us have no bounds. *Today's Readings: 1 John 2:3–11; Psalm 96:1–2a, 2b–3, 5b–6; Luke 2:22–35.*

CHRISTMAS IS COMING!!! Or hadn't you heard?.....

With the Christmas holiday feast upon us, a few planning reminders for the "big day..."

Please note that the last opportunity for the **Sacrament of Reconciliation** before Christmas is Saturday, December 22 beginning at 3:00 PM at Plaistow.

The Parish Office will be closed **Monday**, **December 24 through Thursday**, **December 27 and on December 31 and January 1.** Parish Offices will re-open for business on **Wednesday**, **January 2 at 8:30 am**.

The Liturgies for the **Solemnity of Christmas** are on **Monday, December 24** at **4:00 PM in Plaistow** and at **6:30 PM in Newton**. On **Tuesday, December 25**, Christmas Day, we will celebrate Liturgy at **9:00 am in Newton**. Christmas is a Solemnity and is <u>always</u> a holy day of obligation for all Catholics.

As you make your family plans for Christmas Mass, please remember that the 4:00 Vigil Liturgy on **December 24** tends to be *very* well attended. Throughout her life, Mary trusts God's power to get her through hard times. She faces the challenge, too, of believing in Jesus when he makes enemies and finally dies on the Cross.

Mary is the God-bearer, the one who brings the Son of God into the world. She trusts that nothing is impossible for God. Mary's example calls us to trust God and bring God's love to others in the world as she did. Let us explore in our sessions what it means to us to trust in God.

Any person who suspects or alleges child abuse on the part of a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of a parish, school, or institution of the diocese of Manchester is also encouraged to make a report to the Office for Ministerial Conduct, 603-669-3100. Church personnel – clergy, paid employees, and volunteers - have additional reporting requirements if they believe that Church personnel have sexually abused a child. One of the more moving experiences was a visit to the Church of the Visitation. Located at the top of a small hill, the church welcomes visitors with a wide plaza and a wrought-iron entryway. Immediately to the right of the courtyard is a tall bronze statue of Mary and Elizabeth greeting each other. The figures are slender and visibly pregnant. The artist captured their joy with a slight arch in their backs, their arms beginning to ascend, and their heads lifted up as though laughing in delight. The statue made us smile.

I think about that statue now and believe this is how we should always greet the Lord—with delight, joy, and an understanding that we are pregnant with his grace and presence. We are called to reveal that presence to the whole world. In these last few days before Christmas, reflect on the ways you will show your joy in the Lord's coming. +

Why Did Jesus Come?

I thappened years ago on Christmas. As the parishioners left church after Mass, a woman approached me, all smiles, and said, "This is such a beautiful feast! I'm not sure exactly why God did it, but I certainly am glad!"

The Incarnation, from the Latin for "flesh" (*caro*/*carnis*), affirms

the "enfleshment" of the Word of God. This doctrine, which is at the center of our Christian faith, upholds the mystery that Jesus of Nazareth, the Christ, is one divine person but possesses both a divine and a human nature. As it turns out, we do have some idea why God did it.

The Creed tells us that the Incarnation was "for us and for our salvation." Before the birth of Jesus, Joseph is told that Mary will bear a son and "you are to name him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). It is the incarnate Jesus who then saves or delivers us from the condition of sin and death.

But can this be the whole story? Does the Incarnation really depend on sin? It would seem that the Word of God became human not because of sin, but rather because God wanted Christ to be the most perfect work of creation, the goal and direction of creation.

Overflowing Love

In a real sense, the Incarnation is



connected with the very life of the Trinity. The inner life of God is a life of ever-giving love. The second person, the Son, is at the center of this flow of love. God freely chooses to let this love overflow outside; creation flows out of this fountain of divine goodness. Here too, the incarnated Son stands at the center as the

focus of God's outpouring love and the one capable of directing and returning that love back to God.

The prologue to St. John's Gospel affirms that the Word was in the beginning before all things; that all things were created through him and that this Word became flesh in our midst (1:1–18). The hymn in St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians is similar: He (the incarnate Jesus) is before all things; all things were created in him and for him; in him all things hold together (1:15–20; see also Ephesians 1:3–14).

In other words, everything that exists is always in relationship to the Father, through Christ, and in the Spirit. Because of sin, the Incarnation took the form and shape that it did, but the Incarnation itself is primary.

Viewing the Incarnation this way can help us to appreciate and share the insight of St. Francis of Assisi: All parts of creation—sun, moon, stars, air, water, animals, people—are our brothers and sisters, children in Christ of the one Creator God. Each creature is a unique embodiment and reflection of God deserving our care and respect.

Aesthetic Adventure

It is only in this light that we can recognize sin and brokenness as a disfiguring of the beauty of creation. Through sin we are like the deranged man in Rome who took a hammer to Michelangelo's statue, the *Pietà*. The Incarnation delivers us from sin, but in so doing it restores the goodness and beauty of creation intended from the beginning. In our living the Christian life, we are embarked on an aesthetic adventure: to live the beauty of the Incarnation.

The woman on that Christmas years ago spoke more truth than she realized. It is indeed a beautiful feast, but we do have some idea why God did it. And we—each of us and all creation—are certainly glad! +
