#### **ADULT CONFIRMATION**

Are you an adult who has been Baptized and received Eucharist, but has not celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation? The adult Confirmation process is an opportunity to complete the Sacraments of Initiation. #### PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on **Sunday**, **April 7, 2019** in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome.

Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching.

#### ROSARY / FAMILY PRAYER HOUR LED BY KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

The St Jude Council of the Knights of Columbus leads a rosary on the 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday of each month at 7:00 PM at Mary, Mother of the Church in Newton. The Knights also lead a Family Prayer Hour which includes a Rosary on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday of each month, also starting at 7:00 PM at Mary, Mother of the Church in Newton. On February 25, the United States Senate failed to advance the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act. This bill proposed to prohibit the killing of newborn children by ensuring that babies born alive following an abortion would receive the same degree of care to preserve their lives and health as would be given to other children born alive at the same gestational age. It should horrify all of us that our elected officials failed to advance a bill to make clear that killing newborn babies is wrong and should not be tolerated. # Sunday, March 10, 2019 Journey with the Word

Today's readings: Deuteronomy 26:4–10; Psalm 91:1–2, 10–11, 12, 13, 14, 15; Romans 10:8–13; Luke 4:1–13. As a people and as individuals, we turn to God in times of want and in times of plenty, as we live out our covenant relationship. Moses instructs the people to bring their baskets filled with products of the soil to offer at the altar of the Lord, and then to declare before God all he has done for them, from their days of wandering in Egypt to being led to a land flowing with milk and honey. These are the events that have shaped them as a people. As they confessed their faith, they acknowledged all that God had given to them. Following this proclamation, they bow down in the presence of the Lord.

Jesus is led into the desert to take the journey of his people. A journey of testing and purification. Testing whether Jesus will use his divine power, the devil says, "If you are the Son of God . . ." Jesus responds with words from Scripture, words that give him power and strength. After the temptations are faced, the angels come to wait upon Jesus. Entering into these forty days, be open to discovering the blessings of God's Word, allowing its wisdom to provide you with strength and protection. What passages from the Bible provide peace to you? Which ones give you consolation in times of sadness or joy in the awe and wonder of God?



# THIS WEEK AT HOME

# Monday, March 11 The Least among Us

Who would you consider to be the least among us? Those with no voice or power? The poor, the weak and marginalized? The aged or the young and innocent? The Gospel invites us to see the face of Christ in the people who have little status. Who in your family or neighborhood is in need of a smile, a hug, a conversation, or a warm meal? Who would enjoy hearing from you? Make time for them this week. *Today's Readings: Leviticus 19:1–2, 11–18; Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 15; Matthew 25:31–46.* 

# **Tuesday, March 12** Your Will Be Done

When the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray, he taught them the prayer that we know as the Our Father or Lord's Prayer. Sometimes we say this prayer giving little thought to its words. We pray, "your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven." In heaven, God's will is obeyed perfectly. What would our world be like if his will were obeyed on earth? *Today's Readings: Isaiah 55:10–11; Psalm 34:4–5, 6–7, 16–17, 18–19; Matthew 6:7–15.* 

# Wednesday, March 13 Repent

When Jonah, brought the message to repent to the people of Nineveh, they listened and turned away from sin. Jesus has revealed God and his Kingdom to us. What is your response? Have you allowed his Word to transform you? The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* states that an examination of conscience is a "prayerful self-reflection on our words and deeds in the light of the Gospel to determine how we may have sinned against God." As a preparation for the Sacrament of Reconciliation, make an examination of conscience, considering where you have not listened to the voice of God. *Today's Readings: Jonah 3:1–10; Psalm 51:3–4, 12–13, 18–19; Luke 11:29–32.* 

# Thursday, March 14 Seek and Find

How do you pray and speak with God? Jesus offers these instructions: to ask, to seek, and to find. Is it difficult for you to ask for something from God? Is there something that you are struggling with in your life? Write in your Lenten journal what you are most in need of at this moment. Think about where you turn to seek answers when you face problems or difficult situations. Is God a part of the solution? Ask the Lord to give you peace and to find his will for you this day. *Today's Readings: Esther C:12, 14–16, 23–25; Psalm 138:1–2, 2–3, 7–8; Matthew 7:7–12.* 

# Friday, March 15 Difficult and Messy

We do not need to look too far to know that relationships are difficult and life can be messy. Within every family, group, or community, there are instances of tension. How do we bring acceptance and understanding to those situations? We are called to make peace and to reconcile with one another. Let us ask God to help us bring his mercy and compassion, his peace and his love to every conversation and every corner of our world this week. *Today's Readings: Ezekiel 18:21–28; Psalm 130:1–2, 3–4, 4–6, 7–8; Matthew 5:20–25.* 

# Saturday, March 16 Difficult Love

Love your enemies. It is easy for us to love those who love us, but loving those who have harmed us is difficult. Loving our enemies is countercultural, so we look different than the rest of the world when we love this way. Who will help us love like this? God will give us everything we need to follow him. Spend time in prayer today asking God to forgive those who have caused hurt, pain, and injury in your life. *Today's Readings: Deuteronomy 26:16–19; Psalm 119:1–2, 4–5,* 7–8; Matthew 5:43–48.



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# LENTEN REGULATIONS

# FASTING

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but

liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

# ABSTINENCE

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

# EASTER PRECEPT

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to **receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season** (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the **Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist.** Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

## PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praiseworthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.



Lenten Prayer and Liturg

The Church invites all people to special moments of prayer during the season of Lent. It is a common custom for people to make room in their schedule for daily Eucharist, which we celebrate as follows during the Lenten season:

Monday	8 am	Newton
Tuesday	8 am	Plaistow
Wednesday	6:30 PM	Plaistow
Thursday	8 am	Newton

Another Lenten custom involves taking a journey... to the Holy Land! Going on pilgrimage has always been an important part of our Christian tradition. By visiting a place where a religious event occurred, a

pilgrim hoped to share in the experience associated with that place. The desire to visit Jerusalem and the Holy Land was very important to Christians long ago, but because of the danger and expense of travel, and the political climate of Palestine, such a journey was not always feasible. When the Friars of the Franciscan Order took over the care of the Holy Places in Jerusalem in 1342, they began to erect "Stations" in Churches back home in Europe. It was a way to "go" to the Holy Land without ever leaving home. The custom of the Stations guickly spread to parish Churches, and the devotion of the Stations of the Cross was born.

We walk the Stations of the Cross each Friday of Lent at 6:30 at **PLAISTOW** Using various versions and forms of the Stations, and led by

various groups in the Parish, we make Jesus' journey to the Cross our own. On April 5, we will conclude our evening Stations with a Lenten Soup Supper.

# **Baptismal Font and Holy Water Font**

During Lent, we pray and prepare to renew our own Baptismal promises even as we pray as a community for those to be Baptized. Following ancient custom, the Sacrament of Baptism is not ordinarily celebrated during Lent,

and the Baptismal Font itself is sealed. We also "fast" from the Baptismal water usually present at the doors of the Church. The entire Church waits with Jesus in the desert. praying for the Living Waters of Easter.



# Lenten Space, Silence, & Music

During Lent, the Church's lighting is dimmed so as to encourage an atmosphere of prayer and introspection. Our Assembly's music is more meditative and somber. We leave at the end of Mass in silence, reflecting on our mission as Disciples to pray, fast, and to give of ourselves in the coming week.

# Jesus Is Our Example for Resisting Temptation

When I was on a pilgrimage to Israel, we visited Masada, the last stronghold of the Jews after the Romans destroyed Jerusalem. The temperature hit 117 degrees the day we came. We wandered around and wondered what it must have been like to hold out for a long time. When we returned to our bus, we couldn't wait to get to the cold water that awaited us. The priest said, "The Jews were in the desert for forty years; Jesus was in the desert for forty days; you've been in the desert for forty minutes. Think about that."

When the devil had finished every temptation, he departed from him for a time.

I have no doubt that Jesus was tempted to give himself food and water when he was enduring the desert heat. I have no doubt that in his agony he might also have thought about seizing power for himself. These are the things that tempt us when we are worn out, beaten down, or simply think we are not getting enough of what we believe we deserve.

Lent begins with the temptation of Jesus. Like us in all things but sin, he knew about being and feeling deprived and weak. And while his temptations came while he was in an actual desert, our harsh and barren places may be physical, psychological, or spiritual. We may feel lost, alone, helpless, and sometimes hopeless. In our times of weakness, evil can find a foothold and convince us that we must control our lives, that we can and should have whatever we want. In this account, we find in Jesus an example of how to resist temptation-patiently, humbly, with trust in God's promise of salvation. +

# Finding Our Way Home

"Rejoice with me because I have found my lost sheep" (Luke 15:6).

R ecently I received a photo from friends visiting Ireland. It shows a sheep grazing on a green hillside near a serene cottage. The sheep has a large red splotch of paint on its wooly side, a mark of the farmer's ownership so the sheep can be reclaimed if it wanders.

We also are marked, not with paint but by the compassionate care of the Good Shepherd. No matter how we traverse off the spiritual path, we will be found and reclaimed. We can count on the Good Shepherd to care about us and continue urging us homeward.

There are as many ways to stray as there are sheep in a flock. Sometimes sheep stray on purpose, lured by a false desire to find something tastier than in the place they now have. At other times they stray by accident, so focused on their munching that they forget to look where they are going.

The same is true of us. Not every straying is sinful. We can lose our spiritual awareness when overcome with busyness, grief, depression, or abuse. Difficult economic times can lead to anxiety and away from our Peacemaker. We can lose ourselves in wanting the ideal family, the perfect situation. We can wander off in the false hope of never having enough, always seeking more.

We can also lose our way on purpose, giving in to sinful choices and selfish endeavors, allowing our ego satisfactions to create havoc with our relationships. We can stray into the land of jealousy, anger, hatred, prejudice, and other pastures that steer us away from the Good Shepherd's land.

#### The Good Shepherd and His Helpers

Like a farmer with his wandering sheep, the Good Shepherd looks for us when we've strayed. The Good Shepherd might come as a voice within us, reminding us who we're meant to be and how far we've drifted. Maybe we're called home by a sense of how we need to change, to return to that part of us that has been swept away by laziness, ego, or arrogance. Or the Shepherd might be an encouraging reminder of the beauty within us that we've forgotten in our daily pursuit of duties and obligations.

Sometimes the Shepherd sends a helper to bring back the beloved creature. We can be found through the aid of others. We find our way home when another forgives us for our foolishness or wrongdoing, embraces us in our grief or desperation, urges us to resume living in a loving way, or reminds us of our self-worth and purpose in life.

Being found can bring a sigh of relief that we are back safely on the path that leads to greater harmony with the Good Shepherd. But there are times when being found doesn't feel so great. We feel irritated and challenged because we'd rather stay and chew the green grass of our isolation and selfishness than come home to the possibility of change.

### **Homeward Bound**

Lent is a time to be found, to come home. We need to take a look around the countryside of our hearts and see how we've wandered away from the Good Shepherd, either purposely or by accident. We might also reflect on how we can be instruments of the Good Shepherd, reaching out and helping others find that lost part of themselves.

Let us call on the compassionate and devotional love of the Good Shepherd to bring what is lost in us, and in others, back home again. +
