PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, June 2, 2019 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching.



SEVENTH SUNDAY OF EASTER



Unity

Lord, you gather your community of believers that they may be one. While we do not seek division or desire to be apart from you or your people, it is easy for us to find ourselves separated and alone, because of our words or actions. As we walk through this week, allow us to remove the garment of isolation and independence that hinders the harmony of our living in community as your people. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

So That They May All Be One

Today's Readings: Acts 7:55–60; Psalm 97:1–2, 6–7, 9; Revelation 22:12–14, 16–17, 20; John 17:20–26. Stephen, the first martyr, was among the group of deacons ordained in the Acts of the Apostles. He was filled with the Holy Spirit, but his words were considered blasphemy, a sacrilege to the Sanhedrin. They used stones to silence him, but he called out loudly to his Lord, to receive his spirit and to forgive his persecutors. Both of those phrases echoed Jesus' words on the Cross.

After Stephen's prayer of forgiveness in the First Reading, we hear Jesus pray for unity in the Gospel. During the final portion of the Last Supper discourse, Jesus expresses the love and care he has for his followers. This prayer that all believers "may be one" is as much a prayer for Christians today as it was for the first disciples. Jesus desires for all of us to be with him and to be one with the Father. Jesus wants all to live in the joy of the Kingdom. He wants the world to know that his Spirit will inspire and move them to accomplish wonders that will give glory to the Father. How can you more intentionally live in harmony with those with whom you disagree? Are you willing to carve out time in quiet to listen to the Spirit? In following the Spirit, Christians learn how to witness to God's glory.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, June 3

Courage and Peace

The disciples assure Jesus that they know everything about him and believe he came from God. However, Jesus tells them that they will scatter, leaving him alone in his suffering. In this moment, as he speaks of their abandonment, he comforts them with words of peace and courage. In what area of your life is it difficult to afford the courage to proclaim Jesus as Lord? *Today's Readings: Acts 19:1–8; Psalm 68:2–3, 4–5, 6–7; John 16:29–33*.

Tuesday, June 4 The Glory of God

Jesus' prayer for his disciples is also a prayer for Christians today. Spend some time in prayer today, asking Christ to bless all those followers who have shared and continue to share the Good News of faith with you. Ask Christ to hold close all those who have wandered away and do not feel as though they belong to him. May we be united for the glory of God. *Today's Readings: Acts 20:17–27; Psalm 68:10–11, 20–21; John 17:1–11.*

Wednesday, June 5 Keep Watch over the Flock

The Acts of the Apostles offers a beautiful image of Paul among the elders of the church of Ephesus. After he addresses them, he kneels down and prays with them. They are so moved by his words and the realization that they will not see him again, they begin to weep without restraint and throw their arms around him and kiss him. May our love of God and neighbor move us so that there is no doubt about the work of the Spirit in our heart. *Today's Readings: Acts* 20:28–38; Psalm 68:29–30, 33, 35, 35–36; John 17:11–19.

Thursday, June 6 Hidden Gifts

While praying, Jesus thanks the Father for the gift of his followers. Imagine Jesus' gratitude for human beings who are messy, weak, and flawed. Jesus responds to this gift with a wish that believers be with Jesus and see his glory. Considering that all are a gift to the Son, reflect on the sacredness within each person. *Today's Readings: Acts* 22:30; 23:6–11; Psalm 16:1–2, 5, 7–8, 9–10, 11; John 17:20–26.

Friday, June 7

Ancient Cultures

Ancient cultures often speak of both living well and dying well. It is unusual today to hear people look forward to dying, but what if we knew our final act would give glory to God? That is what Jesus promises Peter regarding his death. Would such knowledge transform the way you live? Have you considered how every moment of our lives, our faith, and our love of the Lord give glory to God? *Today's Readings:* Acts 25:13–21; Psalm 103:1–2, 11–12, 19–20; John 21:15–19.

Saturday, June 8

One Book

Have you ever been so captivated by an experience that time seems to have been suspended? The closing verse of the Gospel hints at this very nature of Jesus Christ. John writes that this book of the Bible is his testimony to the life of Christ. He could have written more but the information about Jesus is more than the books that could be written. More important than words is the relationship that is formed with Christ. Take to heart John's words to grow in love with Christ. Today's Readings: Acts 28:16–20, 30–31; Psalm 11:4, 5, 7; John 21:20–25.

Putting Prayer First

In Luke's ascension account from Acts, Jesus admonishes his apostles to stay in Jerusalem and wait for the Spirit because they are witnesses of his mission and message. When the time for his ascension comes, Jesus blesses them, then "was lifted up" (1:9). We don't hear the great commission to go out to, preach to, and baptize all nations as we do in Matthew's Gospel (28:19–20). Instead, Luke's account leaves us with an image of the apostles joyfully returning to Jerusalem: "They were continually in the temple praising God" (24:53).

Sunday Readings

Acts 1:1-11

He presented himself alive to them by many proofs after he had suffered, appearing to them during forty days.

Ephesians 1:17-23 or Hebrews 9:24-28; 10:19-23

And he put all things beneath his feet and gave him as head over all things to the church.

Luke 24:46-53

As he blessed them he parted from them and was taken up to heaven.

Returning to Acts, I love that the early disciples' first order of business—even before Pentecost—was to gather to pray (1:14). Paul often admonished the early Christians to pray constantly. He knew that prayer grounds us in the Lord and strengthens us to lay down our lives and carry our crosses. Prayer focuses our attention on God's call and our response to it. The apostles' prayer opened them to receive the promised gift of the Spirit and strengthened them for their mission—to let the world know that Jesus is Lord, that the kingdom of God has come, and that we have been restored through the death and resurrection of Christ.

Thus should our week begin: in praise and worship before God, in gathered prayer. Like the disciples in Jerusalem, the Lord will open our minds "to understand the scriptures" (Luke 24:45). We, too, will be filled with the Spirit and be sent out as joyful witnesses to God's presence and saving work. +

Is "'Til Death Do Us Part" Realistic?

In addition to leading marriage preparation and enrichment programs, we've been responsible for divorce ministries in two dioceses. It's humbling to hear experiences of those who expected lasting marriages but instead saw their hopes and lives crumble. Here are some of the lessons we've learned.

The three most important things for a healthy marriage are commitment, commitment, and commitment. With divorce rates around 50 percent, commitment seems unfashionable. Has human nature changed so much? Perhaps human nature hasn't changed, but our culture has. We live in a throwaway society; if something breaks, our impulse is to get a new one rather than fix the old.

Modern society also has more temptations than ever. With men and women working as colleagues, spouses spend more time with members of the opposite sex who share common interests and are on their best behavior. (Workplace morals aren't necessarily higher, but at least colleagues don't have spit-up on their clothes or wear raggedy T-shirts.) Your spouse may have been alluring during courtship, but coworkers sharing career goals can be tempting. This makes commitment harder than ever.

In some ways, marriage is getting



better. Once it was enough for husbands to be providers and for wives to care for the home and children. Now we expect couples to share dreams and be friends and life partners.

We expect couples to practice commitment skills—especially communication. Spouses unwilling to speak

honestly and listen respectfully have hollow commitments. Shared values also support commitment. If one spouse values a simple lifestyle and another wants to accumulate wealth, there will be tension. If faith and morals are important to one but not the other, key decisions become reasons to argue.

Church Wisdom

What does the Church say about marriage, besides the conventional wisdom of commit, communicate, and seek common values? The Church says, of course, what Jesus said: "Love one another as I love you" (John 15:12). Wedding vows take a lifetime to live out. Let's unpack the grace behind the vows:

Exclusivity: *I*, ____, *take you*, ____, *to be my (wife/husband)*. Specific names indicate this is an exclusive commitment between this man and this woman.

Fidelity: *I promise to be true to you.* Fidelity often gets translated as sexual loyalty—neither spouse will commit adultery. But there are nonhuman

"mistresses," too. Work, hobbies, children, and more can cut into the romance and attention spouses should give each other.

Unconditional love: In good times and in bad, in sickness and in health....Loving unconditionally is a promise for the future. It's more a decision to love than merely feeling love. Not knowing what changes the future holds, can I love you if you become old, fat, or senile? That's a lot to say a blind yes to.

Covenant: *I will love you and honor you....* Unlike contracts, a covenant goes beyond a fifty-fifty agreement. Sometimes one spouse must bend 75 percent while the other gives 25 percent. It's not always fair, but a promise is a promise.

Permanence: All the days of my life.... Traditionally, permanence is understood as not getting divorced. A commitment to permanence means daily attentiveness to the relationship. It may mean a nightly walk to keep communication flowing. It's preventive maintenance.

Prayer: *Amen*, a short prayer, is the couple's way of saying yes to each other and God. +
