PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, October 6, 2019 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. Please see Fr. Albert with questions.

Family Guide September 22, 2019 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 16:1-13

This week we hear a challenging parable about a rich man who is cheated by his steward. After squandering his master's property, the steward makes amends with his master's debtors by lowering their debts. The steward hopes that this goodwill offering will help repair friendships with those in the community he has lied to. The master commends the steward for acting wisely. Jesus reiterates that we should strive to be trustworthy in both big ways and small so that we develop honest habits.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): In this week's class, your child learned about the different ways people serve at Church. Talk to your child about some of the people who help at Mass, and what he or she can do to help. The class discussed how they can follow Jesus every day. Ask your child to share some ways that he or she can follow Jesus. Practice making the Sign of the Cross together as you start and end prayers together this week.

Promise (Grades K-1): This week's class focused on the Mass. The children read a story about a girl named Lucy and her family's trip to Mass. The children shared their stories of going to Mass, and acted out some of the parts of the Mass together. Talk to your child about how he or she can show love for God. Ask your child to show you the Mass booklet he or she made in class, and make plans to bring it with you to Mass next week.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Your child learned about Pope Francis. The children discussed how Pope Francis encourages us to take care of our planet and to show mercy to others. Both Pope Francis and St. Teresa of Calcutta are great examples of people who show mercy to the poor. Ask your child what it means to him or her to show mercy. Share ways that you can both try to be faithful to God in big and small ways this week.

Venture (Grades 4-6): The children learned the importance of honesty, especially in cases when they are pressured by others to do something wrong. The class read a choose-your-own adventure story featuring Sophie who faces a dilemma when Maddie and some popular girls urge her to shoplift. Talk to your child about the different outcomes of the story, and the consequences of Sophie's decisions to live with the guilt or tell the truth. Discuss the importance of honesty and integrity for building a strong and trusting community, as Jesus wants us to do in our church and beyond.

Visions (Grades 7-8): Your child discussed Pope Francis's mission to care for creation and all its members. Your child learned how Pope Francis shares many goals with St. Francis of Assisi, including showing love and mercy to the poor. The class presented a play of today's Gospel story of the steward who cheats with his master's money, and learned about the prophet Amos who spoke out against people who took advantage of the poor. Ask your child how he or she is inspired by Pope Francis, and ways he or she can follow his example daily.

Pray Together

After your conversation, sit quietly for a few moments as you reflect on what each member of your family has shared. Close your time together in prayer by taking turns offering the names of the people who serve your parish and help your family. Thank God for these people's presence in your lives.

Restore • Renew • Proclaim the Hope that is Christ



The Diocese of Manchester is in the process of continuing to strengthen and renew faith formation in our parish, school and home school communities. Through this process we are being called anew to "Restore, Renew and Proclaim the Hope that is Christ."

The goal is to make lifelong faith formation a priority and a reality throughout the diocese. This requires a few things:

- Making adult faith formation a priority in our parishes, which includes formation of catechists, parents and the entire adult community.
- Strengthening our youth ministry programs to include all teens of high school age.
- Reimagining our sacrament preparation processes to include a return to celebrating the sacraments of initiation in their **restored order**: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist.

What is Lifelong Faith Formation?

Lifelong faith formation is a process of growing in the faith that begins with baptism. Immersed in the life of the Trinity, we are adopted sons and daughters of God our Father, brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ and temples of the Holy Spirit. Like all human relationships, developing and deepening our relationship with the Trinity happens gradually and over time. Consequently, lifelong faith formation provides opportunities and experiences throughout the entire life span to strengthen our relationship and knowledge of God, Jesus and the Spirit; to enhance our understanding of Scripture, Tradition and doctrines of our faith; and to sustain us in living as disciples of Jesus Christ.

What does restored order of the Sacraments mean?

Restored order means returning the three sacraments of Christian initiation to the logical order in which they were designed to be celebrated: first Baptism, then Confirmation, then Eucharist. During the first five hundred years or so of the history of the Church, it was always the case that the sacraments of Christian initiation were celebrated in this sequence.

Why is the Diocese of Manchester changing the age of Confirmation?

By placing Confirmation at this age, the Diocese of Manchester will be following the natural sequence of the sacraments of Christian initiation. In addition, by placing Confirmation **prior to the reception of First Eucharist** it makes it easier to view the Eucharist as the summit of Christian initiation.

How is the celebration of Confirmation going to change in the Diocese of Manchester?

By 2021, the standard age of Confirmation is going to be third grade, and Confirmation will be celebrated at the same liturgy as First Communion. As a result, the preparation and reception of the sacraments of initiation throughout the Diocese of Manchester will be Baptism in infancy, Confirmation and Eucharist in third grade. Although not a sacrament of initiation, the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be received in the second grade.

What are the benefits of restored order?

First, it will highlight that the Eucharist, not Confirmation, is the culmination of Christian initiation. Secondly, with the reception of grace of the Holy Spirit at a younger age, it will give children greater courage and guidance in facing the increasing difficulties of living a Christian life. Finally, it will allow for more opportunities for parents to take greater responsibility in their role as the primary educators of their children.



How Do We Treat the Poor?

When Pope Francis was elected, Catholics were inspired by his humility and simplicity. When he bowed before the people in St. Peter's Square and asked for their prayers, the little crowd gathered around the TV in the basement of the Catholic Center was moved to tears. When he announced that he would continue living in the guesthouse rather than the papal apartments and eat in the cafeteria, we cheered. But Pope Francis also challenged us. He wanted us to examine how we treated the poor and marginalized of the world. In his

[Jesus said,] "The person who is trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones." encyclical *Laudato Si*', he confronted us with the understanding that our misuse of the environment impacted the poor first of all and that we could no longer continue to consume our natural resources in a reckless and greedy fashion.

The prophet Amos has some harsh words for those who exploit the poor. In the Old Testament, care for the widow, orphan, and stranger—the poorest of the poor-were among the most righteous things a person could do. Many prophets pointed to the failure to do so as a sign that the people had turned from the Lord and, in their sin, cared only for themselves. More recent figures who also have indicated that the measure of a society is the way they treat their poorest members include Ghandi, St. John Paul II, and Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Christ commanded us to love one another. Surely this includes seeing that all have the basic necessities of life, even if that means we don't get everything we want. +

Exploring Our Roots

How often have we heard or read the words over the years: "God created mankind in his image; in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them" (Genesis 1:27). We're created in God's image. In other

words, our family of origin is divine.

Perhaps we've heard those words so often that we don't receive an existential shock anymore. Beginning with the opening lines of the Old Testament, God tells us that we are fundamentally good and that we have a foundational identity with God. This is nothing less than extraordinary!

To put it differently, God extends an invitation to us. God seeks to give away God, but it is with great difficulty! You would think the invitation would be readily accepted, but not so. One of the common responses to God's offering of self is, "Lord, I am not worthy." It may sound humble, even respectful. But it can also be the way we avoid God's call.

Not so the young virgin from Nazareth. When the angel Gabriel announces to Mary that she is to be the Mother of God, this humble teenager from a backwater town doesn't run away from God by protesting unworthiness. No, Mary just wants to understand how she can bear a son under such unlikely circumstances. Once she realizes how God plans to work through



her, her openness to the invitation is extraordinary. She becomes the archetype of receptivity. Mary is the one perfect vessel who knows how to say an unquestioning yes to God's invitation.

Trusting God's Goodness

Most of us don't accept God's invitations so readily. Unlike Mary, we question our unworthiness, refusing to believe that God is speaking to us. Meanwhile, God is trying to tell us that there is nothing we need to earn, nothing we can attain or accomplish, nothing to work up to. We've already "got it" by being a part of the family of God. Our relationship with God is about awakening rather than accomplishing, realizing rather than performing. Trust is the issue, and that becomes the biblical concept of faith. It's all about confidence that God could love us enough. It's all about confidence in God's goodness.

This sense of being inadequate, of not being enough is what I call Original Shame, rather than the familiar Original Sin. As God's creatures we're a mixed blessing. We're filled with contradictions and mystery, darkness and light. But God, who has taken the risk of creating freedom inside us, is always gracious. God persists in loving us—mixed blessings that we are—in all our unworthiness.

New Kind of Fame

What is God seeking from us? God isn't looking for servants, slaves, or workers, for contestants to play the game or jump through hoops. God is simply looking for images that can bear the mystery of the glory and the darkness of life. God invites us, his creatures, to a relationship of love. What God wants are icons who will communicate who God is, what God is about.

Once we accept and believe that we're made in God's image, we have found our identity. We don't have to be so preoccupied with roles and titles, with clothing, cars, and all the things the world holds up as ideals. We don't need material things to assure us that we're special.

We know we're radically significant by being children of the Lord. We have less need to be visible or showy, to make a name for ourselves, to take our place in history. We no longer need our fifteen minutes of fame—because we know we're famous! Our family of origin is divine. You don't get much better than that. +
