Tai Chi is the ancient Chinese martial art that is used for meditation, exercise, balance, and mind and body wellness. St. Luke the Evangelist Parish is offering this form of graceful, slow movement to help parishioners to gain strength, to improve their balance, flexibility, and range-of-motion, and to relieve stress. PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, October 6, 2019 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. After 8am Mass – DRIVE donations from Newton Church to Parish Office in Plaistow. After 10am Mass – CARRY donations from Plaistow Church to Parish Office.
WEDNESDAY, 11/6
Stage Decoration & Banner Hanging Heroes 3pm-5pm – Three (3) volunteers are needed to assist the Fair Lead with some initial set-up. Volunteers must be willing and able to: carry a few awkward, but not heavy, items and boxes from various places and negotiate stairs. We will move some lightweight items around as well. This group will then split: one team will hang banners in the gym. The other team will "decorate" the stage with 2 Christmas trees, garland, flowers and a wreath. Volunteers must be comfortable climbing & using a step ladder.
THURSDAY, 11/7 Please note that all jobs listed below involve stairs, walking, carrying, paying attention, teamwork, communication and a friendly "can-do" spirit. Also, Fair set-up is not predicable; it may go faster, or slower, than anticipated. Flexibility is key.
Trucks/Vehicle with open trailer 3pm-6pm – We could use two (2) trucks and/or vehicles with open trailer, anyone??
Work Area Set-up 3pm-4pm – Two (2) volunteers are needed to set up the Volunteer Check-In Area. Volunteers must be able to: sweep; carry two 6' lightweight plastic tables, 3 chairs and a trash can to the area; as well as tape an extension cord and power strip to the floor.
Super Schlepers of Seasonal Stuff 3pm-4:30pm – Four (4) volunteers are needed to help gather necessary items. Volunteers must be willing and able to: carry tables in a variety of sizes and weights as well as other items from various places, negotiate stairs, and place the items in the Café Holding Area.
Transporters of Treasures 4:30pm-6pm – Four (4) volunteers to load lots of items onto a truck/trailer from the Parish Office and unload them into the Parish Center gym and then over to the correct Parish tables as labeled.
Conveyers of Collections 5pm-6pm – Four (4) people needed to help unload items from vehicles to the Country Store & Silent Auction areas. Volunteers must be able to pay attention to which items go where.
Distributors of Display Blocks and Chairs 5pm-6pm – Four (4) volunteers to distribute chairs & wooden display blocks around the gym as noted on map.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 16:19-31

This Sunday's Gospel challenges us to be selfless and care for others who need help. Jesus tells a story of a poor beggar named Lazarus who lived outside the gates of a Rich Man's house. Lazarus' requests for help were ignored for years. Lazarus finally found comfort in Heaven once he had died. The Rich Man passed away and went to the netherworld. The Rich Man begged Abraham for mercy, just as Lazarus had once begged the Rich Man. Abraham reprimanded the Rich Man for his actions during his lifetime and for not heeding the warnings in Scripture. Jesus reminds us that we have been provided with all of the resources in our lives to understand God's desire for us to serve one another. Take time this week to reflect on steps your family can take to become more aware of the ways you can share God's love with other people.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): The children learned the importance of helping people who need assistance. The children discussed how they can help their friends when things go wrong and which adults they can depend on for help. They read the story of the Rich Man who would not share with the Poor Man. Talk with your child about the importance of sharing with other people and helping others feel welcome. Ask your child about some things he or she can do to help others, especially members of your family.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child's class talked about the importance of sharing with others. Ask your child to tell you about how and where we can share food with those who don't have enough. How did he or she feel when the Rich Man didn't share his food with the Poor Man? What could the Rich Man have done to help the Poor Man? The class concluded by learning that we share our world with all of God's creation. Make a plan with your child to do something good for another person, or the Earth, this week.


Good News (Grades 2-3): This week's lesson taught the importance of being aware of other people's needs. The class learned about Saint Francis of Assisi's encounter with a leper. The class also presented a play of the Rich Man and the Beggar. What were the consequences of the Rich Man's lack of awareness of the Beggar's needs? How could the Rich Man have benefitted from being aware of God's word? Ask your child to tell you what he or she is good at. Discuss how your child can use his or her gifts to help others who may be gifted in different ways.

Venture (**Grades 4-6**): The class began by reading a series of interviews about St. Francis' conversion to Christianity. St. Francis of Assisi changed his life after encountering others who needed help. The young people then read the story of the Rich Man and Lazarus. How could the Rich Man have treated Lazarus when they were both alive on Earth? What does Jesus want us to learn from this Gospel story? How can your child avoid growing complacent?

Visions (Grades 7-8): Ask your youngster to recount the story of Marcus and Jalen. What clues did Marcus miss that indicated his friend was hungry? How could Marcus have handled the situation better? Compare the story of Marcus and Jalen to the Gospel story of the Rich Man and Lazarus. Talk to your child about how we can avoid becoming complacent. What can we do to open our eyes and be more aware of the needs of others?

Pray Together

Have each family member use his or her own words to pray for those who feel left out by their friends, families, and communities. Brainstorm ways your family can work toward helping those who will benefit from your love.

"Abraham said, 'If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead.'" it," he said. "I was a little afraid of what it would mean. Would I be responsible to help him again?" We talked about it a little, and I invited him to put that question to God in prayer.

I'm not sure we have an easy answer to what it means to look someone in the face and invite him to share a meal. And I daresay not many of us would do what that student set out to do. But St. Paul urges us to "pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness" (1 Timothy 6:11). That's a lifetime's work and possible only with the grace of God. Surely, as we grow in those virtues, we will come to see all people as worthy of our time and care without worrying about what might happen in the future. It may not be practical and it certainly won't be easy. But the demands of God's love compel us to try. And if we do so, we might not share the fate of the rich man in Luke's Gospel who learned too late how best to love. +

Facing Life's End with Faith

Twice in eight years, I've been involved in making end-of-life decisions about my two adult sons, Tim and Ritch, who were born with cystic fibrosis (CF), an incurable hereditary disease. While the decisions were the most difficult I've ever made,

knowing their wishes and the Church's teachings, as well as having faith in the promise of eternal life, made it easier.

In 2011, while awaiting a lung transplant, Tim, age thirty-three, was admitted to the intensive care unit (ICU) with life-threatening problems. Initially, his condition was serious but hopeful. He was receiving nutrition and medications, and was attached to a ventilator and other life support. His treatment fell under what the Church calls "ordinary" means: efforts that offer more realistic hope of benefit to the patient than burden. The Church teaches that such ordinary means must be used.

Soon Tim took a turn for the worse. He became unconscious, and his vital signs deteriorated. I prayed for healing but knew Tim's situation was hopeless. As I looked at him, hooked to tubes and machines, I thought of Mary watching Jesus on the cross and wondered, *How long will Tim hang on* his *cross?*

I wasn't surprised when the CF specialist who had been treating Tim and Ritch explained why the medical team was



recommending we sign a do-not-resuscitate (DNR) order. Through tears, she said that, if they tried to resuscitate him, broken ribs could puncture his diseased lungs. Also, Tim's weak heart would likely stop again.

Resuscitating Tim under such hopeless

conditions falls under what the Church calls "extraordinary" means: efforts whose potential benefits do not outweigh the burdens they impose. The Church allows death to happen by withholding extraordinary means, but it condemns the willful taking of life through euthanasia or assisted suicide.

Thankfully, our family agreed that the only thing more painful than signing the DNR order would've been making Tim endure more suffering without any benefit. Tim wanted to be an organ and tissue donor, but the condition of his body made him an unsuitable candidate.

Tim's death convinced Ritch to get his own legal affairs in order. Ritch, age thirty-six, had a rare liver condition associated with CF. In 2016, he passed out due to internal bleeding and was admitted to the same ICU where Tim had died. Ritch's condition soon became hopeless. He clung to life despite blood transfusions and other efforts. Fortunately, our priest came and said that discontinuing Ritch's life support was compatible with Church teaching.

Ritch had signed his organ-donor card but, like Tim, his organs were unsuitable for transplantation. However, some tissues (skin, bones, tendons, for example) could be used to save and improve the lives of many people. We said yes.

The same CF specialist who had been at the hospital when Tim died rushed to be there when Ritch's life-support systems were discontinued. Again, we cried together and I thanked her for caring for my boys. Our immediate family stayed with Ritch until his heart stopped.

I can only imagine the difficulty of making these decisions if we hadn't known Tim's and Ritch's wishes or if there had been disagreements. It's critical to have your legal affairs in order, understand Church teaching, and discuss your wishes with loved ones and doctors.

Guiding Wishes

The American Bar Association (americanbar.org) has resources on health-care advance directives and related legal issues, and the prolife pages of the Catholic bishops' site (usccb.org/prolife) has a comprehensive explanation of Church teaching on end-of-life issues.

Making end-of-life arrangements in advance reminds us of the dignity and value of our earthly lives and the eternal reward that awaits us in the next. +
