
TAI CHI

Tai Chi is the ancient Chinese martial art that is used for meditation, exercise, balance, and mind and body wellness. St. Luke the Evangelist Parish is offering this form of graceful, slow movement to help parishioners to gain strength, to improve their balance, flexibility, and range-of-motion, and to relieve stress. Classes are taught by members of the Oriental Healing Arts Association – a Senior Friendly and Senior Safe Tai Chi Program with the purpose of bringing Tai Chi to all age groups. Classes are on Mondays at 9:00 AM and Thursdays at 3:00 PM and 6:30 PM in the Plaistow Church Hall. The cost is \$5.00 per class, and for seniors on a fixed income, the cost is \$3.00 per class.

If a person cannot make this information known at the time of admission, a family member may be able to make that information known to the hospital staff.

RCIA

ADULT CONFIRMATION

Are you an adult who has been Baptized and received Eucharist, but has not celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation? The adult Confirmation process is an opportunity to complete the Sacraments of Initiation. PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, November 3, 2019 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. 

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 17:11-19

Jesus heals ten lepers that he meets on the road. Only one of the ten returned to thank Jesus. This leper was considered to be an outsider by Galileans for two reasons. First, leprosy was dreaded, contagious, and legally obligated the afflicted to live apart from society. Second, the leper was a Samaritan, which meant he had a different nationality and religion. Jesus looked beyond the differences between himself and the leper and taught that God's love is for everyone.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child has learned the importance of thanking and has named actions for which to say "thank you." The session also taught that Jesus cares for those whom others leave out. Talk with your child about family members and the many things in your home for which you need to say thanks. Ask to see the "Thank You Prayer Card" your child has put together. You can say this prayer together before dinner or before going to bed.

Promise (Grades K–1): In this week's session your child thanked God for the gift of creation. He or she learned about Jesus' parable through a story about a teddy-bear picnic. Ask your child to tell you the stories of the picnic and of the ten sick people. Talk about ways your family can say thank you to people who do good things for you.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week's lesson focused on the people who provide care. Your child learned that Jesus' love for people is shown in his healing acts. Jesus shares his love and life through the Seven Sacraments. Ask your child to tell you the story of the ten lepers in his or her own words. Share ways that your family can show gratitude to those who provide you with help and service.

Venture (Grades 4–6): As part of a sharing of the Sunday Gospel, the class discussed times when they have been thankful to God. Ask your child to share with you the stories of Bishop Bartolome de las Casas and of Saint Kateri Tekakwitha. Talk about how these two people reached out to people in need. Discuss members of your community who may be in need. How can your family serve them?

Visions (Grades 7–8): Your child's class performed a play about St. Francis of Assisi. Part of his growth in faith was his encounter with a leper on the road. The leper was an outcast, just like the ones we met in Sunday's Gospel. When Francis embraced the leper, he realized that in God's eyes there were no outcasts. Ask your child to share what he or she learned from the lesson of Francis. Discuss the definition of prayer and the five kinds of prayer they learned about today—blessing, adoration, petition, thanksgiving, and praise.

Pray Together

When your conversation is finished, join hands and let each person in the family mention some blessing that he or she is grateful to God for providing. After each person has contributed, together say: "Heavenly Father, we thank you."

What are...

Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist

Bishop Thomas J. Tobin Diocese of Youngstown in Ohio

THEOLOGICAL/HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

In 1971 extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist were first permitted in the United States. At that time the Congregation of the Sacraments responded to a request of the American bishops to allow laypersons to assist priests in giving Holy Communion.

In January 1973, Pope Paul VI, in the instruction "Immensae Cariatis," extended this permission to the universal Church. He wrote: "Present-day conditions demand that greater access to Holy Communion should be made possible so that the faithful, by sharing more fully in the fruits of the sacrifice of the Mass, might dedicate themselves more readily and effectively to God and to the good of the Church. First of all, provision must be made lest reception become impossible or difficult owing to a lack of a sufficient number of ministers."

The institution of this ministry responds to the condition in the Church today whereby Catholics are encouraged to share in communion at every Eucharist in which they participate, and under both species, and the large number of persons who are coming forward to partake of the body and blood of Christ.

In any parish, qualified persons who have been nominated for service as extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist must receive mandate from the Diocesan bishop. The pastor forwards the names of the persons to the bishop asking that they be named for service as extraordinary ministers. This requirement distinguishes the extraordinary minister of the Eucharist from other liturgical ministers and emphasizes the extraordinary nature of this ministry.

Extraordinary ministers are commissioned to function within their own parish for a period of three years. The commission expires after three years or if the person moves away from his or her parish. The commission is

renewable by again requesting the endorsement from the bishop. Commissioning should take place during a parish celebration according to the rite provided in the Book of Blessings. The commission may be revoked by the pastor if the individual no longer fulfills the requirements for this ministry established below.

RESPONSIBILITY/PURPOSE

"Extraordinary ministers may distribute Communion at Eucharistic celebrations only when there are no ordained ministers present or when those ordained ministers present at a liturgical celebration are truly unable to distribute Holy Communion. They may also exercise this function at Eucharistic celebrations where there are particularly large numbers of the faithful and which would be excessively prolonged because of an insufficient number of ordained ministers to distribute Holy Communion." (Instruction on Certain Questions Regarding the Collaboration of the Non-Ordained Faithful in the Sacred Ministry of Priests)

Extraordinary ministers are also used in order that the sick or homebound may receive communion with the frequency recommended in the revised rite for the Pastoral Care of the Sick. Any person who regularly takes communion to the sick is to be trained and commissioned. An individual may be commissioned for only this aspect of the ministry or may perform this service within the Eucharistic assembly. To establish the connection between the Sunday assembly and the homebound and sick of the parish, extraordinary ministers ideally are sent from the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist to take communion to them.

SELECTION/DISCERNMENT

Extraordinary ministers are to be fully initiated Catholics (having received Baptism, Eucharist & Confirmation, be at least 16 years of age, and lead lives in harmony with the undertaking of this ministry including participating in the sacramental life of the Church. If married, a Minister must have been married validly in the Catholic Church. The Pastor, Parish staff, and Pastoral Council assist in discerning parishioners to fulfill this ministry.

hen my daughter was seven, she cut her thumb badly while trying to make a fruit salad. When she cried out for me, I quickly dressed her younger sister and we went to the hospital for stitches. She was in pain and crying when the doctor injected the anesthetic into the hand to numb the pain. With a firm, but quiet voice he looked at her and said, "Katy, does it still hurt?" She stopped all at once and said with a voice of wonder, "No." He proceeded to stitch up the thumb and congratulated her on being brave. She thanked him and then talked about him for the rest of the day.

The priest would still have to inspect him before he could return to his community, but his desire to look at Jesus one more time and give thanks for his mercy had to come first. We don't know what made him so mindful of his healing, but his response inspires us. How has Jesus touched and healed you? How will you thank him, and who will you tell? +

Peace: Possibility or Pipe Dream?

"Peace be with you,"
we say glibly each week
at Mass. As with many
memorized responses,
it can become a stale
phrase that doesn't
connect to our everyday
lives. Consider the
following:

- "My coworker's whining drives me crazy. She's always complaining, criticizing my work or making snide remarks."
- "If you don't stop playing that video game, I'm throwing it out and canceling your cell phone plan. It's like you're addicted."
- "Yes, we need a new jail, but not in my back yard! I pay good money to live in a safe neighborhood. Put it in the inner city where it belongs."

Peace at Home

We used to lament that governments and peoples across the world couldn't get along. Why can't they be reasonable and negotiate their differences? Why can't they share our planet's resources in peace? There's enough to go around if we don't get greedy.

But then we had children and saw how easily they could push our buttons and rouse our anger. We now understand that global strife has its roots in the same emotional dynamics of any family, even within the psyche of individuals, as we



deal with people who annoy, offend, and hurt us. The goal, of course, is to become more peaceable persons, families, and communities, but it's not as easy as just saying at Mass, "Peace be with you."

To live the words of the Mass, "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord," we must be willing to

learn peacemaking skills. Some come by these naturally—their families modeled healthy conflict resolution or they're naturally easygoing. For the rest of us, it's a struggle to balance our wants against the common good, let go of the need to have our way, and learn some practical skills.

Five "Cs" of Conflict Resolution

Here are some strategies for resolving conflicts nonviolently:

- 1. Communicate: Instead of attacking with a "you" statement ("You make me so angry when you forget to call"), first identify your own feelings and express them in an "I" statement ("I feel frustrated when you don't call to tell me you'll be late").
- **2. Concede:** There are occasions when a mature adult says, "This seems more important to you than to me. I'm willing to let you have your way." Consider that conceding might save both parties stress and heartache.

- **3. Compromise:** The most common skill for conflict resolution involves finding a solution between two positions: "I'll let you watch your TV program today if I can choose tomorrow."
- **4. Chance:** Sometimes nobody wants to budge in a dispute. If the disagreement is between children or the decision isn't grave, try settling it by chance—toss a coin or pick a number.
- **5. Create:** A helpful strategy is seeking a "win-win" solution. This takes creativity as all parties let go of their original desires and brainstorm alternatives that meet everyone's needs. Instead of fighting over the TV, play basketball.

The price of peace is neither cheap nor quick. It takes courage and selflessness to move beyond our own will to seek the common good. It often means giving up personal power and control to consider how we need to change. Sometimes the peacemaker may be taken advantage of or hurt, but what is the alternative—hurting others?

Think of one person you can't stand. Now, think of one positive or redeeming trait of that person. If you can't do it, then how can we expect communities and countries to move past anger to love? +
