THE BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD



ADULT CONFIRMATION

Are you an adult who has been Baptized and received Eucharist, but has not celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation? PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, November 3, 2019 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. Please see Fr. Albert with questions.

Christmas Masses this year will be on December 24 at 4:00 PM in Plaistow and 6:30 PM in Newton, and on December 25 at 9:00 AM in Newton. The Masses for the Octave, Mary, Mother of God, will be on December 31 at 4:00 PM in Plaistow and January 1 at 9:00 AM in Newton. Your help is greatly appreciated. Any Catholic married in a civil ceremony (JP) or in any religious ceremony other than a Catholic one (unless specifically excepted by the Bishop) is not living out the Sacrament of Marriage in its fullness according to the teaching of the Church. HOW TO MAKE A REPORT OF SEXUAL ABUSE

Child sexual abuse is a crime in the State of New Hampshire and the Church. New Hampshire law requires that anyone who has reason to suspect that a child is being or has been abused or neglected must make a report to the Division for Children, Youth & Families ("DCYF") of the State of New Hampshire, 1-800-894-5533. Any person who suspects or alleges child abuse on the part of a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of a parish, school, or institution of the diocese of Manchester is also encouraged to make a report to the Office for Ministerial Conduct, 603-669-3100. Church personnel – clergy, paid employees, and volunteers - have additional reporting requirements if they believe that Church personnel have sexually abused a child. BEST M & M COOKIES EVER!

1 cup granulated sugar1 cup packed dark brown sugar2/3 cup shortening2/3 cup unsalted butter softened2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 eggs

2 ¾ cups all purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon coarse sea salt or kosher salt

2 ½ cups plain M & M candies

Heat oven to 350 F and adjust baking rack to middle position. Line 2/3 large baking sheets with parchment paper. In the bowl of an electric mixer, add granulated sugar and brown sugar. Turn mixer to low and mix just to combine. Add shortening and softened butter, turn mixer to medium and beat 3 minutes or until lighter in color and smooth. Add vanilla and beat on medium 30 seconds. Add eggs one-at-a-time, mixing just until incorporated after each addition. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, and coarse salt and kosher salt. Add flour mixture to the sugar/butter mixture and turn mixer to low speed. Mix just until flour mixture is incorporated. Fold in 1¾ cup M&M candies. If time allows, cover, refrigerate and let the dough rest 1-24 hours. If time doesn't allow, the cookies can be baked immediately and are still terrific without the rest time. Drop the dough, using a 2" scoop (about 1½ tablespoons), onto the baking sheets about 2-inches apart (12 cookies to a baking sheet). Press 3-4 additional M&M's into each cookie. Bake cookies at 350°F for 9 minutes or just until the edges of the cookies start to set and are a little firmer to the touch. Place baking sheets with cookies on a cooling rack for 2 minutes, then transfer cookies directly to the cooling rack.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

½ cup unsalted butter softened

½ cup creamy peanut butter

½ cup dark brown sugar

½ cup granulated sugar

1 egg lightly beaten

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1¼ cups all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon baking soda

¼ teaspoon table salt

¼ teaspoon coarse sea salt
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 cup peanut butter chips
optional
¼ cup powdered sugar
confectioner's sugar, for
topping



Preheat oven to 350°F and line 2 large baking sheets with parchment paper. (If not using parchment, do NOT grease the baking sheets.) In the bowl of an electric mixer, add butter and peanut butter. Beat on medium speed 2 minutes until completely incorporated. Add the brown and granulated sugars and beat an additional 2-3 minutes or until smooth,

creamy and paler in color. Add the egg and vanilla and beat another 1 minute. In another large mixing bowl, whisk together flour, ½ teaspoon baking soda, table salt, sea salt and cinnamon. Add the flour mixture to the butter mixture and turn the mixer to low speed. Mix until the flour is almost incorporated. There should be just a little flour visible. Remove the mixing bowl from the mixer and add the peanut butter chips, if using. Stir the dough gently just until all flour is incorporated. Use an 1.5" scoop to scoop balls onto the baking sheet 2-inches apart. (If you don't have a cookie scoop – use about 1½ tablespoons of dough per cookie and roll the dough into balls.) Lightly sprinkle the cookies with powdered sugar. To put fork marks into the cookies, gently press the fork onto the cookie dough – being sure to crisscross the fork to get that traditional "peanut butter cookie" appearance. Bake 9-10 minutes at 350°F or until the edges of the cookies are set. Transfer the cookies to a cooling rack.

SINFULLY EASY COOKIES

- 1 cup softened butter
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- 3 cups all-purpose flour

- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup chopped walnuts

In a medium bowl, cream the butter with the white sugar and brown sugar. Stir in the eggs and vanilla. Sift together the flour, baking soda, cream of tartar, cinnamon and salt; stir into the creamed mixture. Finally, mix in the nuts. Divide dough into 3 equal parts, shape each piece into a log about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter. Wrap logs in wax paper and chill for 3 hours or overnight. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C). Cut dough logs into $\frac{1}{4}$ inch slices and place them on an unprepared cookie sheet. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes, until light brown.

NUTELLA COOKIES

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons white sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup Nutella

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Mix flour and sugar together in a bowl; add eggs and mix until incorporated. Stir Nutella into flour mixture until dough is smooth. Roll dough into 2-inch balls and lightly press onto a baking sheet. Bake in the preheated oven until edges of cookies are starting to harden, 20 to 25 minutes.

COCONUT MACAROONS

- 1 cup flaked coconut
- ½ cup white sugar
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 pinch salt
- 2 (1 ounce) squares semisweet chocolate, melted

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C). Grease cookie sheets and lightly dust with cornstarch. In a medium bowl, stir together the coconut, sugar and cornstarch. Add the egg and salt, mix until well blended. Drop by rounded spoonfuls onto the prepared cookie sheet. Bake for 13 to 15 minutes in the preheated oven, until golden brown. When cool, drizzle with melted chocolate.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospels: Luke 19:1-10

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus enters the life and home of Zacchaeus. Although Zacchaeus' neighbors see him as an outsider, Jesus knows him to be a human being deserving of love and dignity. Zacchaeus' story reminds us that all people are worthy of God's love. We imitate Jesus by opening up our lives to people in the community, and the wider world, who may be hungry or feel isolated.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child has learned about one of Jesus' friends, named Zacchaeus. Friends are very important to children, and this week's lesson is all about friendship. Friends are people who like being with us and who enjoy sharing with us. Ask your child to tell you the story of Zacchaeus in his or her own words. Talk about family friends and how important they are to you. Look together at the meal table activity your child has made and discuss how friends share meals together.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week, your child shared experiences of friendship in class and learned that Jesus wants to be friends with all people. Ask your child to use the picture page to tell you the story of Zacchaeus. Because your child prayed the Our Father in class this week, be sure to say that prayer together at least once a day.

Good News (Grades 2–3): The story of Zacchaeus helped your child recognize the value of friendship. Talk about how Zacchaeus felt when Jesus invited himself to the tax collector's house for dinner. Ask your child to show you the Mass booklet the class put together. Talk about the two parts of the Mass—the Liturgy

of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Share how your family can show friendship to others.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your child has learned that Jesus invites all people to his table. Ask your child to share some of his or her favorite meal stories from the Gospel of Luke with your family. Have your child recount some of the things they learned about homelessness from the interview they read in class. Review the story of Zacchaeus and discuss how your family can grow to be more like Jesus. Ask your child why Saint Martin de Porres is so important to the people of Peru.

Visions (Grades 7–8): This week's lesson uses the story of Jesus and Zacchaeus to explain the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The moments in their meeting are parallel to the four steps in the Sacrament—invitation, confession, satisfaction, and forgiveness, or absolution. Share how important the Sacrament of Reconciliation is for your family. Talk about ways you can make frequent Confession part of your family's religious routine. Take a moment to ask forgiveness from one another, too.

Pray Together

This Sunday falls right after the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls. As a family, take a few moments to talk about your favorite saints and loved ones in Heaven. Then thank God for the witness of these saints and loved ones. You can make your own Litany of the Saints by having each family member in turn say the name of a saint and all can answer: "Pray for us!"



Love Is Our Truest Vocation

Being Catholic is not something that happens to us overnight. It takes work and practice—a lot more than just an hour a week in church. It's really the task of a lifetime.

What makes one a Catholic? In one sense, one becomes Catholic by receiving the sacraments of baptism, confirmation,

and Eucharist—just as a person becomes married by celebrating the sacrament of matrimony. But as any married person will tell you, the wedding itself doesn't make a marriage. To really become what one promised in the wedding vows takes time and hard work.

Similarly, one doesn't take on Catholic identity merely by receiving the sacraments. Like marriage, Catholic identity requires time and effort. Catholic identity, like marriage, is about love. And love is an art.

Years ago in music school, I would spend hour after hour at the piano learning two pieces required for the end-of-semester recital. After weeks of practice I could play those pieces rather well. But just because I could play two songs didn't mean I was an artist. A real artist isn't limited to a couple of pieces. Artists can play all the pieces.

Similarly, to be good at the art of



Catholic loving you have to be able to love all the pieces. You have to love everyone—even as God loves everyone and invites people of every race, language, and way of life to the great nuptial banquet of the kingdom.

What It's All About?

Love everybody? While this may seem impossible,

it is at the heart of Catholic identity. Our Catholic vocation is essentially a call to be lovers, just as Jesus was. Following Jesus doesn't mean we have to become carpenters, fishermen, or preachers. Following Jesus means we have to become great lovers.

Jesus was an artist at loving. He could play all the pieces. He loved rich and poor people, saints and sinners. As a sign of that universal love, he opened his arms on the cross and shed his covenant blood for all.

Clearly we don't arrive at this Catholic, all-embracing level of artistry overnight. When learning to play the piano, one starts with easy pieces and gradually works up to the harder ones. The same is true with the art of loving: We start with the easier pieces (loving our parents, children, friends, neighbors) and slowly work up to the harder pieces—the people who are not like us.

From Feelings to Action

And this loving goes deeper than surface niceties. The loving that lies at the core of Catholic identity leads to concrete acts: embracing the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the prisoner. It requires working for peace. It involves concern for the earth. It demands justice for the poor.

And because the objects of our loving are human, limited, and sinful, our loving will most certainly entail forgiveness—both forgiving and being forgiven. We who follow Jesus are called to announce the kingdom of God by being ambassadors of reconciliation and instruments of peace.

The Eucharist is the marvelous sign of Catholic identity. The Eucharist takes us into the body of Christ. It fills us with the spirit of Christ so we can truly become Catholic, all-embracing lovers. Love is our vocation. Love is the heart of our Catholic identity. +
