

PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, February 2, 2020 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. Please see Fr. Albert with questions.

HELP WANTED TO PUT AWAY TREES



The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord - February 2 -

At the end of the fourth century, a woman named Etheria made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Her journal, discovered in 1887, gives an unprecedented glimpse of liturgical life there. Among the celebrations she describes is the Epiphany, the observance of Christ's birth, and the gala procession in honor of his Presentation in the Temple 40 days later. Under the Mosaic Law, a woman was ritually "unclean" for 40 days after childbirth, when she was to present herself to the priests and offer sacrifice—her "purification." Contact with anyone who had brushed against mystery-birth or death-excluded a person from Jewish worship. This feast emphasizes Jesus' first appearance in the Temple more than Mary's purification.

The observance spread throughout the Western Church in the fifth and sixth centuries. Because the Church in the West celebrated Jesus' birth on December 25, the Presentation was moved to February 2, 40 days after Christmas.

At the beginning of the eighth century, Pope Sergius inaugurated a candlelight procession on this feast; at the end of the same century the blessing and distribution of candles which continues to this day became part of the celebration, giving the feast its popular name: Candlemas.

Reflection

In Luke's account, Jesus was welcomed in the temple by two elderly people, Simeon and the widow Anna. They embody Israel in their patient expectation; they acknowledge the infant Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah. Early references to the Roman feast dub it the feast of Saint Simeon, the old man who burst into a song of joy which the Church still sings at each day's end. Read Luke 2: 22-40.

MARRIAGE IN THE CHURCH Did you know that ALL Catholics are required to be married in the Church as a condition of the validity of their marriage?

Any Catholic married in a civil ceremony (JP) or in any religious ceremony other than a Catholic one (unless specifically excepted by the Bishop) is not living out the Sacrament of Marriage in its fullness according to the teaching of the Church. HOW TO MAKE A REPORT OF SEXUAL ABUSE

Child sexual abuse is a crime in the State of New Hampshire and the Church. New Hampshire law requires that anyone who has reason to suspect that a child is being or has been abused or neglected must make a report to the Division for Children, Youth & Families ("DCYF") of the State of New Hampshire, 1-800-894-5533. Any person who suspects or alleges child abuse on the part of a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of a parish, school, or institution of the diocese of Manchester is also encouraged to make a report to the Office for Ministerial Conduct, 603-669-3100. Church personnel – clergy, paid employees, and volunteers - have additional reporting requirements if they believe that Church personnel have sexually abused a child. Do Something for Lent. Renew your faith.

What is the Lenten Journey all about? Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are called the "three pillars" of the Christian way of life. They help support a full and healthy life of discipleship. During Lent we try to repair and strengthen these three pillars, which also are called the "three disciplines" because they help people become better disciples of the Lord.

The Lenten Journey is about PRAYER. Prayer is conversation with God. Make a good habit of daily prayer. Read the Psalms; and each Lent try and learn one or two by heart. Try to sing your prayer at home, and make every effort to sing well when you worship with others.



The Lenten Journey is about FASTING. To prepare himself for his life's work, Jesus fasted in the wilderness. As Christians grow up, they need to learn traditional, healthy ways to fast. When we fast, we deny ourselves some food or other good things. We remind ourselves of how dependent we are on God's gifts, which always must be shared fairly and never taken for granted.

The Lenten Journey is about GIVING. Almsgiving means "sharing compassion." Almsgiving means more than giving away the things we don't need. It means giving away some of the things we do need because someone else also needs them. It means giving of ourselves.

Our Lenten Journey is about faith sharing during the Lenten season. It is a way to learn more about your faith and grow as a disciple of the Lord; it is a way to meet fellow parishioners, and to contribute to the life of our Parish.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 2:22-32

In the Gospel, Mary and Joseph honor Jewish tradition by bringing their firstborn son to the Temple. Simeon, a holy prophet, recognizes Jesus and reveals him as the Messiah who will fulfill God's promises to Israel and will be a light to all nations. Anna, a prophetess, is also at the Temple. She has been praying and fasting in expectation of the Messiah. The Feast of the Presentation is also called Candlemas because it is the day on which the Church customarily blesses and distributes candles used in worship and in the home. The blessed candle is a reminder to all that the light of Christ is present always and everywhere.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Children need to know that Jesus was once a child with a family, too. Families help children to meet God. Talk with your child about the differences and likenesses between your family members and Jesus.

Promise (Grades K-1): This week's class helped your child appreciate the gift of light and its importance for life. The class also discussed how Jesus lights the way for everyone. Ask your child to share with the family the story of Simeon and Anna at the Temple. Talk, too, about ways your family can light the way for others.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Your child has learned that Jesus is the Messiah God promised to send and that Jesus is the Light of the World. Ask your child about the Feast of the Presentation and how the feast helps us all recognize the light of Christ who invites us to spread the light of love to others. Ask your child to define the word salvation from the lesson. He or she can also show you the candle from the Candlemas Procession.

Venture (Grades 4-6): On this feast day, the Church celebrates how Jesus is recognized as the Light of the World. In class, your child learned that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and Harriet Tubman were lights for the world, too. Invite your child to share a bit of Harriet's story with the family. The class also learned about the Liturgy of the Word and how that first half of Mass feeds our minds with Scripture teachings. Consider reflecting on the previous week's or the upcoming week's readings. Ask your child to tell you about Saint Paul Miki and the Martyrs of Nagasaki.

Visions (Grades 7-8): This Sunday's feast is a celebration of light. It shows Jesus as a light for the nations. In class, your youngster recognized light as a symbol, not just of Jesus himself, but also of all his followers. Invite your young person to share why light is an important symbol of Jesus. Discuss how your family can share Christ's light with all whom you meet. Since we won't hear the reading on the Beatitudes this year, the lesson this week covered them. Have a discussion about what each Beatitude means.

Pray Together

Gather the family at the kitchen table. In the center of the table, place the family Bible and a lighted candle. Let each person in the family ask for God's help in spreading the light of Christ to all they meet. After each person has a say, all can respond with the words, "Jesus you are the Light of the World. Shine on our family and on all whom we meet."

P arents who bring a new baby home bring also their hopes and dreams for the child. At the very least, we hope the child will be happy and healthy and will have a life that is better than ours. I can only imagine what Mary and Joseph thought when they brought Jesus to the Temple. Even though the angel Gabriel had revealed their son's identity, did they look at him and see the refiner's fire of Malachi's prophecy?

It's possible, but I think they saw him more as their beloved child. The angel Gabriel told Mary that her son would "be great...[and] the Son of the Most High" (Luke 1:32), but did she know everything that meant? That's hard to see when your child is an infant in your arms.

What we know is this: Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the Temple, and two people who had been waiting all their lives for a sign from God took that child into their arms and into their hearts and saw in him the answer to their prayers and the fulfillment of their hopes.


In that moment, Mary and Joseph could simply hold their breath and pray for the grace and strength to raise this child of God—and to hold their own hope out to him. +

Honoring Our Parents

od's Fourth Commandment reads, "Honor your father and your mother..." (Exodus 20:12). What nugget of wisdom does this commandment teach us? Today some parents and children are estranged; others wish their

parents were alive so they could honor them. But the following story shows how delightfully some children still honor their parents.

Jan celebrated her sixtieth birthday with friends, far from her children living in five different states. "No gifts," she had told her kids. "All

I need are memories of you." Then the postal service delivered a special box. Within it were sixty slips of paper on which Jan's children had written sixty special memories. She read and cherished each one, mixing laughter and tears.

Why honor our parents? In the world of the Bible and in good homes today, parents provide images of trust, hope, and serenity that enable the young to face formidable obstacles. To their children they convey the message, spoken or unspoken, "You are loved. You are wonderful."

All humans are constantly making the passage from the known to the unknown. Parents who have endured disappointment, even tragedy, can help their offspring travel that passage with dignity. "We've made mistakes," they say. "We've lost jobs, health, or our dearest loves. But it didn't kill us. Something in people endures, continues to trust, and moves forward in confidence."

Related Roles

Furthermore, parents are memory keepers. When their children hit snags,

they remind them what glorious people they are. And if humor, perspective, or packages of goodies can lighten the load, they contribute those, too.

The wisest parents honor their children in turn. They count on their children's good sense to pilot them through difficulties, so they

restrain the "free advice." They clarify the boundaries of their role: providing safe harbors, but holding the ropes loosely. They encourage children to explore God's beautiful world, not burdening them with unnecessary anxiety. They recognize the arenas where the young have more expertise, inviting them to shine there.

Many parents struggle with handing on their faith to a generation that seems unenthusiastic at best. There, too, honor comes in. Realizing that the gift of faith, no matter how important, cannot be coerced or controlled, parents can follow the advice of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. Agonizing over her sons' shenanigans, she once said, "What's a mother to do but pray and dote, pray and dote?"

If the roles of parent and child seem too idealized, we need only look to Jesus

and his mother and behold them as our role models. (Unfortunately, Scripture records little of Jesus' relationship with Joseph.)

Learning from Jesus and Mary

The wedding at Cana (John 2:1–12) provides the perfect example of their honoring each other. Mary wisely tells Jesus of the need: "They have no wine." Then she backs off. She trusts his instincts to resolve the crisis.

Despite his reservations ("My hour has not yet come"), Jesus in turn honors his mother. Whether he was responding to her, or to the couple's dire need, we may never know. Despite the exhaustion and pain of his passion, Jesus continues to honor Mary, making sure even from the cross that his beloved disciple would continue to care for her (John 19:26–27).

In Jesus' day, women with no son or husband for protection often became desperate beggars. Knowing that sad reality, Jesus makes sure that John will take her into his own home. Saint Ignatius imagined that the first appearance of Jesus after the resurrection, although not recorded in Scripture, must surely have been to Mary.

As parents and children who follow Jesus, we are called to do likewise. +
