

PARENTS BAPTISM PREPARATION SESSION

The monthly preparation session for infant Baptism will be held after the 10:00 AM Liturgy on Sunday, March 1, 2020 in the Parish Office living room. All parents planning to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism are welcome. Families wishing to celebrate Baptism in the Church must be registered (according to Church Canon Law) and practicing (attending Sunday Mass) for 3 full months before a Baptism can be scheduled. The use of the envelope system is always optional; however, it does guarantee a manner of accountability. For most families, the Pastor or staff can easily verify attendance during these three months. Church Canon Law also regulates baptismal sponsors (godparents). Sponsors must be at least 16, fully initiated (having received Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation), and be practicing Catholics living Christian lives consistent with the Church's teaching. The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 5:38-48

Jesus asks us to go beyond treating others in the same way we want to be treated ourselves. He asks us to care for each other as God does—to love other people without expecting love in return and to even love to our enemies. This is an invitation that takes a lifetime to grow into and fulfill. It is a challenge for the family to keep this message alive in a world that puts a premium on competition and on being "better."

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): All parents want their children to live by the Golden Rule and so must be role models for this behavior. The Golden Rule lesson is best learned within the home. Ask your child to share the booklet the class made and talk about how the Golden Rule helps us all be good friends.

Promise (Grades K–1): Jesus taught us that we must love and forgive our enemies. Your child explored the call to turn the other cheek and walk the extra mile. Talk with your child about how members of the family need to forgive one another. Support that conversation by being quick to forgive your child when he or she needs to be forgiven.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Ask your child to share what Jesus said about forgiveness. Give examples of ways your family can show love to your "enemies." Ask your child to share the story of "Mean Manny," and how Olivia handled someone bullying them.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Children are most sensitive to bullying words. In class this week, your child talked about the effect that these

kinds of words have on young people. They also read and discussed different endings to a story about bullying. Invite your child to share this story with the family. Talk about what Jesus means when he asks that you love your enemies and to pray for those who do you harm. Discuss how important forgiveness is for the good of your family. Talk, too, about how praying the Our Father can help you learn how to forgive.

Visions (Grades 7–8): One of the most difficult of Jesus' teaching is "turning the other cheek." In class, your youngster was asked to wrestle with this statement. Encourage your young person to share with the family why this was so important to Jesus and how it can work in society. Ask your youngster to tell you about the camp Seeds of Peace and its mission to bring together teens from war-torn countries. Discuss the lasting importance of the friendships that develop between the Seeds. Review the four moral codes with your son or daughter, and discuss which ones are appropriate to live by. How does Jesus' New Law affect how we treat, and are treated by, others?

Pray Together

Set aside some time for the whole family to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation as we approach Lent. There may be a Penance Service at your parish church, or you can go together at one of the times when private confession is being offered. Even though your younger children have not yet received the sacrament, it would be good for them to see their parents and older siblings participating. When you get home together, thank God for the gift of forgiveness.

Attende, Domine

"Hear us, O Lord"

With Ash Wednesday upon us, it is a good time to think and pray about the Lenten Season - the "Springtime" of the Church. The word "Lent" means spring, and comes from the same root as the word "lengthen," since the days do get longer as winter wanes. The whole northern hemisphere turns toward the sun, the source of life, and winter gives way to spring. In Hebrew, the language of the Old

Testament, the word for "repentance" is "to turn." As the earth turns to the sun, as the earth turns from winter cold to the new life of spring, so do we turn our lives towards our loving God and seek the Way of the Lord Jesus anew.

"Even now, return to me, says the Lord." (Joel 2:12). The word "sin" means separation. We are called to turn from our separate selves, from our sins; and to come together in community. Self denial is another way we express our



repentance. We turn away from sin and death and toward God as our source of life by disciplining our wills and desires.

Self-denial is three-fold, according to Matthew's Gospel (chap. 6). We **PRAY**: "Go to your room, close your door and pray to your Father in private." We **FAST**: "No one may see you are fasting but your Father in heaven." We give **ALMS**: "Keep your deeds of mercy secret, and your Father, who sees in secret will repay you." Self-denial is an exercise, a work-out, getting our lives and spirits into shape. Through the Lenten exercise of **PRAYER**, **FASTING** and **ALMSGIVING**, we spring clean our lives, sharpen our senses, put tomorrow in its place and treasure the day at hand.

For Forty Days we are conscious of how we must sharpen our senses and focus mind and heart on the reign of God. We are, above all, aware of those waters in which we were baptized into Christ's death. That is, death to sin and evil; it is life in Christ that we began in those waters of baptism. These waters wait at Lent's end for the Catechumens of the Church. The entire Lenten season turns, it seems, on Baptism, renewal and reception into the Church.

We, too, wait for the opportunity to renew our own Baptismal Promises, and to feel the splash of Easter water on our faces after the dryness of our Lenten desert journey.

From Father Albert *Lent*, 2020

he Church asks us to give ourselves to prayer and to the reading of Scripture, to fasting and to giving of alms during the Lenten season. The fasting that all do together on Fridays is but a sign of the daily Lenten discipline of individuals and households: fasting for certain periods of time, fasting from certain foods, but also fasting from other things and activities.

Likewise, the giving of alms is some effort to share this world equally not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and possessions and through work of many kinds for a just world.

FASTING means that anyone between the ages of 18 and 59 may eat only one full meal (with the other 2 meals being distinctly smaller). One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any meals at all. One fasts for a spiritual reason - (an end to sin, a reconciliation in one's life or family, an end to war or other disturbance, or for the spread of the Gospel or



personal/corporate conversion) than for a personal dietary goal. The Church requires all between the ages of 18 and 59 to observe the fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fridays and Wednesdays are also traditional fast days, but are not mandatory.

ABSTINENCE is the discipline for those age 14 or older to **forego the eating of** any meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays of Lent.

The **EASTER DUTY** is the **obligation to receive Holy Eucharist** between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday.

The **Sacrament of Reconciliation is an obligation** for all those who are conscious of grave sin. A frequent celebration of Reconciliation is encouraged for all, especially during the Lenten Season.

Reconciliation is celebrated at Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish on Saturdays at 3:00 at Plaistow, and on the Sundays of Lent following 6:00 PM Evening Prayer at Newton.

A Lenten Penance Service is scheduled for Sunday, March 22 at 4 PM at Saint Michael Parish in Exeter. Many local clergy will be available. All are welcome.



Fat Tuesday

ardi Gras (*mar-dee grah*) means "Fat Tuesday" in French. It's the day before Ash Wednesday, when Lent begins.

If we are serious about keeping Lent, the Mardi Gras party before it should be great fun. Plan all the things you will need: your favorite music, party hats and noise-makers, masks, confetti, streamers, your most favorite foods and, of course, guests.


Popular Mardi Gras foods are pancakes in Great Britain, crepes in France, stuffed grape leaves in the Middle East, sweet rice in Puerto Rico, cream rolls in Scandinavia, sausages and peppers in Italy, and doughnuts in Poland and Germany.

Pick the time and place, and invite the people. And remember—there's a point behind the party. It gets us ready to keep a good Lent. Mardi Gras is a little like emptying our drawers and closets into a pile before we straighten them out. We can wear costumes and masks to make fun of our bad habits: Draw TV screens around your eyes if you watch television too much. Draw the stopped hands of a clock on your face if you are always running late. Wear a general's medals if you are bossy.

At the end of the party, have paper and pencils ready. Write down how you want to improve during Lent. You can pass these around or talk about the help you will need to succeed. Then tear them up into tiny bits and bury them in the ground or put them in the trash. At the end, to begin Lent, join hands and say the Our Father. Then clean up in silence.

Wednesday, February 26, 2020 Now Is the Time



Today's Readings: Joel 2:12–18; Psalm 51:3–4, 5–6ab, 12–13, 14 and 17; 2 Corinthians 5:20—6:2; Matthew 6:1–6, 16–18. "Rend your hearts." Lent is a time to offer our hearts to God, who will tear vice and sin out of us. At times, the process is painful. We are so attached to our sins that they become a habit. It took a crisis to compel Joel and his people to look inward and discover how they had taken God for granted. Both the crisis and the confession of sin were painful.

St. Paul reminds us why we confess our sins: God has made us righteous in Christ. We are in a radically new relationship with God. The strength of this relationship overcomes every obstacle because God works within us and even through us, extending his gift of reconciliation to others.

If we do not live this gift of gracious love, however, we will lose it. The time to act is now.

By praying, fasting, and giving alms, we practice living out the reconciliation God offers. These and other acts of piety strengthen our relationship with God. We give alms to acknowledge that all we have is from God and we need nothing more. We pray to express our love for God and to know God's love for us. We fast without gloomy looks because we hunger for God. We are overjoyed that God frees us from sin and death and draws us into life with him. The joy of knowing God's love for us helps us persevere in our Lenten walk.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, February 24

Prayer

Jesus rebukes his disciples for not having enough faith to cast out a demon. Our prayer might also feel weak and ineffectual. Lent is a time to persist when we feel like failures at prayer. Lent may also be a time for us to learn new ways of praying and being with God. St. James urges us to be humble and patient. God wants to fill us with holy gifts. How will you enrich your prayer life this Lent? *Today's Readings: James 3:13–18; Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 15; Mark 9:14–29.*

Tuesday, February 25

Almsgiving

St. James describes an alarming situation in which members of the community are so caught up in the things of this world that they neglect God and cause division. Jesus' disciples, in turn, betray their preoccupation with status. When we generously donate our money and time, we begin freeing ourselves from an attachment to worldly things. We also remind ourselves that such things are impermanent. All that we will have in the end is God—or nothing at all. What charity will you offer this Lent? *Today's Readings: James 4:1–10; Psalm 55:7–8, 9–10a, 10b–11a, 23; Mark 9:30–37.*

Wednesday, February 26 Fasting

In a culture that extols immediate gratification, the ancient practices of fasting and abstinence seem strange and pointless. When undertaken with prayer, however, they become deeply meaningful. When we fast and abstain from meat, we deepen our awareness of our mortality. We express our spiritual hunger for God. We distinguish wants from needs. We join our small sacrifices to Christ's great one. Fasting and abstaining also joins us with others the world over who ask God to cleanse their sinful hearts. *Today's Readings: Joel 2:12–18; Psalm 51:3–4, 5–6ab, 12–13, 14 and 17; 2 Corinthians 5:20—6:2; Matthew 6:1–6, 16–18.*

Thursday, February 27

A Better Life

As the Israelites prepare to enter the Promised Land, Moses reminds them of all that God has done and all that God asks of them. If they obey God, God will bless them and they will thrive in their new homeland. Jesus calls us to follow him in self-giving love. It's hard for us to obey. We persevere in faith, hoping that our new way of living will lead to the future we truly want. Reflect on how your Lenten promises will bring you closer to God. *Today's Readings: Deuteronomy 30:15–20; Psalm 1:1–2, 3, 4 and 6; Luke 9:22–25.*

Friday, February 28

Beyond Fasting

God's people complain that despite their fasting and ritual practices God does not do their bidding. The prophet replies that they are concerned about themselves and not the well-being of others. When people ask Jesus why his disciples do not fast, he points out that God has come to his people, so they should celebrate. One group fasts for selfish reasons while the other fasts but fails to see God's coming. How can your practice of fasting and abstinence help you better see both God and the needs of others? *Today's Readings: Isaiah* 58:1–9a; *Psalm* 51:3–4, 5–6ab, 18–19; *Matthew* 9:14–15.

Saturday, February 29

Feasting with the Lord

It's not easy to turn from our interests to follow the Lord, yet Isaiah continues to urge us to act with justice and compassion. When Jesus calls Levi to embrace the demands of discipleship, Levi promptly obeys. The new disciple even throws a party. Levi understands that despite the challenge, discipleship brings us into the presence of our Lord. Choose a moment from your day and celebrate how God is with you. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 58:9b–14; Psalm 86:1–2, 3–4, 5–6; Luke 5:27–32*.



HOW TO MAKE A REPORT OF SEXUAL ABUSE

New Hampshire law requires that anyone who has reason to suspect that a child is being or has been abused or neglected must make a report to the Division for Children, Youth & Families ("DCYF") of the State of New Hampshire, 1-800-894-5533. Any person who suspects or alleges child abuse on the part of a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of a parish, school, or institution of the diocese of Manchester is also encouraged to make a report to the Office for Ministerial Conduct, 603-669-3100. Church personnel - clergy, paid employees, and volunteers - have additional reporting requirements if they believe that Church personnel have sexually abused a child. Accentuating the Positive: Easier Said than Done

Hate is a passion that can take over a person's heart in a short amount of time. God knows this, and he challenges us to avoid hate and holding grudges. In the law that Jesus preached, we are not even allowed to hate our enemies or persecutors. That is radical!

It is easy to let injuries build up over time. Eventually we find ourselves far away from those we should be closest to or those we once loved. This separation starts in our thoughts and settles into our

We don't have to hate, be angry, or carry grudges if we don't want to. Our hearts and minds can be filled with God's grace. We can work on three levels to overcome hate and anger: visual, verbal, and physical. When angry thoughts invade your mind, look up (visual), speak the truth to yourself (verbal), and change your posture (physical). This helps alter self-destructive thought patterns and helps us refocus our heart and mind. Add these natural means to the supernatural means of calling on God's grace, of receiving the sacrament of penance, and of taking moments of prayer to see and speak his truth over a situation.

We are God's temple. His spirit of peace, mercy, and serenity needs to reign inside us. That means getting rid of negative, hateful, and hurtful thoughts toward ourselves and others. Don't let them pull you down! +

How Can We Love Our Enemies?

"Love your enemies," Jesus says in Luke 6:27. What in the world was he thinking about? Why, there are times when I have trouble loving some

of my friends! How can I possibly be expected to love my enemies?

If that's what you're thinking, you have lots of company. To reflect prayerfully about these strong words of Jesus, let me point out that this command is one of four different love commands in the Gospels.

First, there is the general Christian responsibility to "love God above all and your neighbor as yourself." Then there is the general Christian responsibility to "love your neighbor as yourself." Then there is the command that relates the disciples of Jesus to one another. Jesus says, "This is my commandment: love one another as I love you" (John 15:12). Finally there is the command that calls for a love that includes everybody. It's not enough to love friendly neighbors or other disciples. We must love without limits. For Jesus says: "I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you" (Matthew 5:44).

The first two commands make sense. Peace and harmony in family and society come from loving those we are close to. The disciples' loving of one another, though demanding at times, also makes good sense. For Jesus' disciples are called to imitate him. But "Love your enemies"—a command—doesn't seem

to make any sense at all. It seems to go against fundamental principles of justice and the duty we have to love ourselves and not allow ourselves to be victimized by others.

Jesus Gives Us No Wiggle Room

The maddening thing is that this central teaching of Jesus is so all-inclusive.

It allows us no wiggle room. We cannot choose which enemies we will love and which we will not. Nor can our love be simply an attitude. We have to act. We must do good to them even if they hate us. We must ask God's blessings for them even if they curse us. We have to pray for them even if they mistreat us.

The love Jesus calls us to is unconditional. It brooks no ifs. It's a love that says, "I love you, no matter what you do or say, for you are the image of God."

Finding All of Our Sisters and Brothers

There's a story about a rabbi who was discussing with his disciples the difference between day and night: "When," he asks, "does the night end and the day begin?" One disciple replies,

"Is it the moment when you can tell the difference between a sheep and a dog?"

"No," the rabbi answers, "it isn't that." Then peering deeply into their eyes, he says, "It is the moment when you look into the face you have never seen before and recognize the stranger as a sister or brother. Until that time comes, no matter how bright the day, it is still night for you."

That is a moving story, but we have to take it a bit further. We have to be able to look into the faces of neighbors we have seen and responded to with anger, impatience, ill will. To look into the face of such people and see a sister or brother: This is the kind of unconditional, nonviolent love to which Jesus calls each of us. +
