THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FOR SAINT LUKE THE EVANGELIST PARISH

Our Parish will conclude its Capital Campaign at the end of October. Thanks to your generosity, we re-roofed the entire Plaistow campus, and accomplished smaller projects such as rebuilding the cellar access for the Food Pantry, cleaned and re-piped the septic system at the Parish Center/School, and installed a new chimney pipe in the Parish Center.

When the spring weather returns, we will accomplish other major projects: we have signed an agreement with Petra Paving Inc to seal, remediate and restripe the parking lots on the Newton and Plaistow campuses. We are currently negotiating with a paint contractor for the Newton Church and Parish house and will begin the bidding process for electrical upgrades in both churches.

CONFIRMATION AND EUCHARIST

What is "the Restored Order"?

An increasing number of dioceses in the United States are adopting a restored order policy for the celebration of the sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist. This means, quite simply, that it becomes

standard policy for Catholics who were baptized in infancy to receive Confirmation *before* First Communion, not *after*. Practically speaking, this means that the two sacraments are received at the First Communion Mass, with Confirmation being celebrated after the homily.



Why is it referred to as "the Restored Order"?

During the first 500 years or so of the history of the Roman Catholic Church (and still today in the Christian churches of the East), it was always the case that the sacraments of Christian initiation were celebrated in an invariable sequence: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. And it was almost always the case that all three sacraments were celebrated together at the same time, even with infants. Following the lead of official documents that were issued by the Church after the Second Vatican Council, more and more dioceses are restoring this original order to the celebration of the sacraments of Christian initiation.

Isn't Confirmation a sacrament of maturity that should come after First Communion as a child grows older?

Not really. Confirmation is actually the completion of Baptism (by the full gift of the Holy Spirit). To celebrate Confirmation requires nothing more by way of age-appropriate maturity than to receive the Eucharist. Remember, there is a legitimate, parallel practice in Eastern churches of fully initiating even infants with all three sacraments. The maturity that is required for receiving any of the sacraments of Christian initiation is only what is age-appropriate. The Church expects interior dispositions of readiness, such as understanding freedom, that are realistic at any given age, nothing more.

When we are used to a different practice after more than a thousand years, why is the Church now going back to the original sequence?

Restored order is more than just a fascination with the way it used to be. In fact, there are some very significant theological and liturgical reasons for restoring the integrity of the three sacraments of Christian initiation—all celebrated in proper order, even at the same time. The RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) requires that children and adults in the catechumenate receive all three sacraments together, even if the children are younger than the age at which the Catholic children of the parish are routinely confirmed. Putting the celebration of Confirmation between Baptism and Eucharist better expresses its role as the completion of Baptism. As a matter of fact, the sacrament that is the culmination of a person's Christian initiation is the Eucharist, not Confirmation. Theologically, it is the gift of the Holy Spirit given in all its fullness at Confirmation that best prepares one to receive Eucharist, and thus to be most fully joined to the Body of Christ.

Is it wrong, then, to be confirmed after receiving Eucharist?

Of course not. The Church has many ways of celebrating the mysteries of God's love in the sacraments. But because Rome so strongly encourages restoring the order of celebrating the sacraments of Christian initiation, don't be surprised if more and more communities restore the original sequence of the three sacraments of Christian initiation.

 - B. Open the email BiddingOwl sent you

WHAT EVERY CATHOLIC SHOULD KNOW

"God's love does not differentiate between the newly conceived infant still in his or her mother's womb and the child or young person, or the adult and the elderly person." ~ Pope Benedict XVI1

Catholic teaching on abortion is rooted in the recognition that the dignity of the human person begins at conception and flows through life until we face the end of our earthly journey. Respect for human life includes responding in charity to all those suffering a loss after an abortion.

Unwavering Stance

From its earliest days, the Church understood each person's inherent dignity. A document commonly referred to as The Didache, or "The Teaching" [of the Twelve Apostles], dated between the first and second century, states "You shall not kill the embryo by abortion and shall not cause the newborn to perish." Other early Church figures, including St. Ambrose and St. Augustine (4th and 5th centuries, respectively), attest to the dignity of human life in the womb. More recently, the Catechism of the Catholic Church summarizes, "From the first moment of his existence, a human being must be recognized as having the rights of a person - among which is the inviolable right of every innocent being to life" (no. 2270). The Church continues Her affirmation of life in all that she does: by Her efforts to educate, care for the poor, the sick, and outreach to the marginalized. This consistent care for humanity lies at the heart of the Catholic Christian faith. It is with this longstanding commitment to life in mind that we are all called to strive for "... a society capable of recognizing the dignity of every person" regardless of one's stage of life (Pope Francis to the United Nations, October 20, 2016).

No Small Matter

The Guttmacher Institute reports that, "Twenty-one percent of all pregnancies (excluding miscarriages) in 2011 ended in abortion..." equating to approximately 1,060,000 abortions.

In comparison, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention <u>list the leading causes of death</u> in 2011 as heart disease (596,577) and cancer (576,691). This means that if fetal death by induced abortion was included in the CDC's data from 2011, abortion represents about 30% of all deaths in the US in 2011 while heart disease and cancer account for 16.6% and 16.1%, respectively.

Every human being is inestimably valuable. As privileged creatures of God, He has created us in His very "image and likeness" (Gn 1:26), unlike any other beings in existence. Furthermore, the incarnation, death, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, who gave Himself "once for all" (Heb 10:10), affirms human dignity. There has never been, and never will be, a human person for whom Christ did not offer Himself. God's unfathomable sacrifice, God who "so loved the world that he gave his only Son" (Jn 3:16), shows us just how much we are worth. Our dignity, then, is not about what we can or cannot do. Rather, our dignity is about what God has already done; it flows from our unique relationship with Him; it flows from the sacrifice He made for us on the Cross. This is the heart of human dignity: that God the Father has loved each and every one of us into existence.

RESPONDING WITH PRAYER AND MERCY

Reconciliation and Healing

"I wish to restate as firmly as I can that abortion is a grave sin, since it puts an end to an innocent life. In the same way, however, I can and must state that there is no sin that God's mercy cannot reach and wipe away when it finds a repentant heart seeking to be reconciled with the Father." - Pope Francis, At the Conclusion of the Extraordinary

Jubilee of Mercy, November 20, 2016

As we seek to respond in charity to the presence of legal abortion in our society, we should remember that God is constantly calling everyone back to Himself - all the faithful are invited to a renewed relationship with Jesus Christ. If we recognize that God calls everyone to amend their ways, it may help us to walk forward with our brothers and sisters whose lives have been touched by abortion, to seek healing with them, glad together in the fact that God and all of heaven rejoice at the return of a beloved son or daughter (cf. Lk 15:7).

Recognizing that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Rom 3:23), the Church calls all of its members to the Sacrament of Reconciliation, asking that we approach the confessional at least once a year to confess serious sins (Catechism of the Catholic Church no.1457). Pope Francis, himself, receives the Sacrament of Reconciliation every two weeks! Rather than a punishment, Reconciliation is referred to as a "celebration." It is through this great Sacrament of healing that we are brought back into full communion with God and our brothers and sisters in the Church, and in a very real way, healing between God and any single member of the faithful will effect real positive change in the lives of others.

Where to Turn for Healing & Support: If you or someone you know is suffering after abortion, confidential non-judgmental help is available. Call Project Rachel's national toll-free number: 888-456-HOPE (-4673) or visit HopeAfterAbortion.org.

Finally, we must respond with additional prayer. All efforts must be steeped in prayer, interceding on the behalf of those affected by abortion and for an end to the "culture of death" that regards "a life which would require greater acceptance, love and care [as] useless, or held to be an intolerable burden, and is therefore rejected in one way or another" (Saint John Paul II, Evangelium Vitae, 12).

Prayer to Our Lady of Guadalupe

Virgin of Guadalupe, Patroness of unborn children, we implore your intercession for every child at risk of abortion. Help expectant parents to welcome from God the priceless gift of their child's life.


Console parents who have lost that gift through abortion, and lead them to forgiveness and healing through the Divine Mercy of your Son.

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

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The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Matthew 22:1-14

The Gospel proclaims another of Jesus' parables—the story of the wedding feast. A king sent his servants out to invite people to his son's wedding. He really wanted to share his great joy. The king was surprised and hurt when many refused his invitation. After his further invitations met with disaster, the king dispatched his servants to go into the streets and get enough guests to fill the hall. Even then, somebody showed up without a wedding garment. God invites many to the great feast between Jesus and humankind, but even then it is possible to refuse the invitation.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child understands that everybody loves parties. In class, the party theme was used to introduce the children to the notion of the Sunday Eucharist as Christians gathering at Jesus' party. You can reinforce this understanding by helping your child feel comfortable and welcome in church. Feeling at home in church helps young children also experience the sense of belonging that is so much a part of the Sunday Mass experience.

Promise (Grades K–1): Talk together about Jesus' invitation to see God's kingdom as a wonderful celebration—one with room for everyone. Talk with your child about what happens at the Sunday Eucharist—people gathering, music, learning, conversation, and receiving Communion. Is there anyone in your family's life who could be invited to church? Consider inviting that person to Mass.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned how important the Third Commandment is. Keeping holy the Lord's Day is vital for those who are invited to Jesus' great feast. Have a good conversation about the Sacrament of the Eucharist and the Third Commandment. Ask your child to tell you how we make Sunday a holy day.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week's lesson began with a discussion of hunger and a story about some young people who are doing something about hunger. Talk about the experience of hunger and why Jesus might have used the story of a feast to tell about God's kingdom. You might also want to have a conversation about your family's experience of Sunday Mass and how you can better participate in this sacred banquet.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Your youngster's class explored the importance of food both as nourishment for the body and as nourishment for the community. The Gospel shows the value Jesus put on the wedding banquet and the king's invitation for all to come. In this spirit, the class also learned that not everyone has access to the food he or she needs to survive. Ask your son or daughter to share what the class learned about hunger and about the Catholic view of economic life and how to set a table with plenty of food for all. Have your young person define Christian Hospitality in his or her own words.

Pray Together

At a family meal, ask each member of the family to pray in his or her own words that, just as Jesus invites everyone to the banquet, people can work together to feed a hungry world.

We're the Supporting Cast

L ife can make us think we are in control of our lives. We plan, think, execute, and succeed (or fail). Then along comes an illness, an accident, a job loss, or one of countless other things, and we realize we really aren't in control of much. This famous phrase sums it up: Man proposes, God disposes.

We can transfer this same false assumption into our relationship with God and expect Mass, prayer, and liturgy to work for us, fill us, and entertain us. But liturgy and prayer are about giving God his glory above all else.

The LORD of hosts / will provide for all peoples / A feast of rich food and choice wines.

Philippians 4:12-14,19-20

I have the strength for everything through him who empowers me.... My God will fully supply whatever you need, in accord with his glorious riches in Christ Jesus.

Matthew 22:1-14 or 22:1-10

[Jesus said,] "Go out, therefore, into the main roads and invite to the feast whomever you find."

When we pray, and especially when we enter into communal liturgy, we are reminded once again that it is all about what God is doing. Isaiah says the Lord will provide for all people. God will provide! We might prepare, serve, or participate, but the director, producer, and main actor is God. We are the supporting cast. That is why liturgy is not so much about our planning, participation, or entertainment but about entering into harmony with God's action and praising him as he asks.

The same point can be found in the Gospel. The king sends out invitations for his son's wedding and prepares the feast. He adjusts to the unexpected lack of interest and invites others. The ones who arrive are the ones the master has invited.


It would be foolish for one of the invited guests to vaunt their importance. Their role is to humbly enjoy and gracefully help the king and the newlyweds to shine on their night! +

Shaped by the Cross

Every night before going to bed, my parents would make the sign of the cross on each child's forehead and whisper, "May God bless you and keep you." Then we would go to our bedrooms, dip our fingers in the small holy water font, and sign ourselves. I remember asking my parents for their blessing before going on a trip or asking the abbot for his blessing before leaving the abbey. These simple signs have left a lasting impression on me.

The cross was everywhere when I was growing up; even today, we find the cross hanging in churches, schools, homes, offices, and cars and around our necks. The priest blesses people with the sign of the cross. Children are marked at their baptism and adults during the Order of Catechumens with the sign of the cross. Christians are shaped by the cross.

In the late 1950s and early 1960s, Christiane Brusselmans, the first woman to earn a doctorate in theology from the Catholic University of Louvain, experimented with an ancient process used to bring adults and families into the Church. Following the Second Vatican Council, her work and that of many others resulted in reinstitution of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)—rites lost during the early Middle Ages due to the shift from adult to infant baptism.

One remarkable rite that marks this process is the Rite of Welcome, in which we admit those seeking baptism



in the Catholic Church to the Order of Catechumens. The most moving moment is when the sign of the cross is drawn on the seekers' heart, hands, feet, and shoulders. I remember her instructing us to use big gestures to ensure recipients felt the weight of the cross, especially on their shoulders. The weight of the cross can indeed be heavy.

Our lives as Christians ought to be modeled after the cross. Each year, tens of thousands of people prepare themselves to join the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil. They stand in a long tradition rooted in New Testament times. Those who have been baptized in other Christian denominations celebrate the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist. Those not previously baptized celebrate all three sacraments of initiation: baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist.

The sacrament of baptism relates images of baptismal bath, baptismal burial, and baptismal birth. First, we are washed clean from everything that prevents perfect union with God, who claims us as an adopted child. Second, we are buried with Christ so we may rise with him on the last day. Third, we are birthed into the Church—the body of Christ. Because of this rich sacramental symbolism, baptismal fonts are sometimes made in the shape of a cross. Catechumens enter on one side to be baptized and exit on the other side.

We should always remember the importance of the cross in our Christian journey. Without explanation, my parents impressed this on me each time they signed me with the cross. +
