THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FOR SAINT LUKE THE EVANGELIST PARISH



The Solemnity of Christ the King is a the liturgical relative latecomer to calendar of the Roman Church. The Solemnity was instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI, and was specifically designated to be a "spiritual weapon" against what the Pope saw as two forces destructive of that time: secularism and atheism. The early 1900's were a time where industrial development saw people living in tenement housing and other inhuman conditions without hope (remember the Child Labor Laws of the U.S. and other social reforms are all products of the post-depression years). The Church also recognized that the world was still reeling from the awful reality of the "war to end all wars,"(!) and the consequences of the rise of national and political movements such as communism, nazism, fascism which and were gaining popularity in Europe. The Church saw a great need to point to another reality - the reality and power of Christ as King and Savior of the world.



The notion of Christ as King refers to Jesus' human royalty as a Son of David and to his royalty as the divine Son of God. Matthew, who's Gospel we have heard all this year, implicitly unfolds Jesus' Kingship as he describes the Kingdom of God and those faithful disciples who act in the world to bring that Kingdom to fulfillment.

This day also marks the end of the liturgical year in the Church. The Solemnity of Christ the King, capping the whole year, encourages us to look back to find signs of God's grace and power, while looking forward to his coming again in glory, while at the same time looking around to see where Christ's Kingship shows itself in the world today.

Join us at 6 PM tonight, Sunday, November 22 in Newton For Evening Prayer and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament as we honor Christ our King.

Family Guide November 22, 2020 Solemnity of Christ the King

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46

This Sunday, we hear Jesus' great parable of judgment. The parable clearly states that all will be judged on the Works of Mercy described in it. We are called to build God's reign on Earth and to share in that reign forever. But to do so, we need to care for the least of God's children and provide food and drink, clothing and shelter, comfort and companionship in order to live full lives. The requirement of God's kingdom is love—love for God that is shown in the way we treat one another.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): This Sunday reminds us all that Jesus will come to judge the living and the dead. Engage your child in a conversation about ways he or she can show kindness to others. This week's Thanksgiving feast is a reminder to share blessings. Make sure that your young child is involved when you provide food for the needy.

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child learned about the Works of Mercy. Remember that children at this age learn best by imitating the actions of those around them. The more the members of your family perform acts of kindness and generosity, the more those habits are formed in your child. Make sure that your family celebration of Thanksgiving involves sharing with people in need.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week, your child learned that God judges us by how we show love to others, especially through the Works of Mercy. To help the children understand the Works of Mercy mentioned in the Gospel, they played a board game. Have them explain the rules and play the game with your family. Talk about how to see Jesus in the people we meet. **Venture** (Grades 4–6): The last Sunday of the Church year is the Solemnity of Christ the King. The lesson of the feast shows that Christ's kingdom is very different. The recipe for entering the Kingdom for all eternity is to recognize Jesus in everyone we meet. Talk together about the Works of Mercy and how you as a family can recognize Jesus and reach out to those who are hungry or thirsty or who need our love and kindness.

Visions (Grades 7–9): This week, your young person learned some very specific examples of the works mentioned in Sunday's Gospel. He or she learned to look at Christ's kingship by finding him in others. Let your young person lead the family in looking for some specific ways you all perform the Works of Mercy—and make plans to do more. Ask your teen to share with the family how Catholic social teaching helps people live to serve others.

Pray Together

In the Gospel, the people asked Jesus, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or naked or in prison?" When you complete your conversation about the Gospel lesson, pray in your own words to answer that question together. Conclude with this simple prayer: "Lord, whatever we do for people in need, we are doing for you."

GLUTEN INTOLERANT?

PARISH POLICY ON GROUPS SEEKING SUPPORT

After consultation with the Parish Pastoral Council, and taking into account the many groups that desire the community's support, it has been decided that the following policy be put into place:

- 1. Only Parish groups will be allowed to solicit support for their projects in our churches. This includes groups from within the Parish itself or groups which are based within our Parish.
- 2. Groups from outside the Parish community will be allowed to solicit support from the community *only by rare exception* and with the express consent of the Pastor and Parish Council.
- 3. No group of any kind will be allowed to solicit until the conclusion of the Liturgy. Publicity and other materials may be displayed in the entrances of the Church, but no actual solicitation may occur until after Mass has ended.
- 4. No more than one (1) Parish group may seek the support of the community at one time. This means that there are not to be multiple support efforts on the same weekend.

The Pastor will be the sole arbitrator of scheduling for Parish groups seeking community support. Parish groups should contact the Parish Office to determine availability for scheduling any support event. Thank you for your continuing support for the mission of St. Luke the Evangelist Parish.

PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL

A Parish Pastoral Council is primarily charged to assist in the development of missionfocused Parishes rather than programmatic or finance-driven ones. **Pastoral Councils** attempt to place at the heart of the Parish a consciousness of a zeal for the mission of Jesus Christ. When there is a clear awareness of this "larger vision" proposed by the Gospel and taught by the Church, a Parish finds itself energized by a sense of mission and directed to matters that foster the mission of the Parish, grounded in the mission of Christ (Diocese of Manchester, Guidelines for Parish Pastoral Councils, 2002). Our Parish Pastoral Council provides invaluable advice to the Pastor and Staff of the Parish through consultation, dialogue and ongoing learning. Our Council generally meets on a monthly basis to discuss Parish life and issues and to assess our ongoing mission as a Catholic community. M ichelangelo's amazing painting, *The Last Judgment*, takes up the whole of one wall of the Sistine Chapel. Michelangelo places in the upper register the symbols of Christ's passion as a way to highlight the instruments of Christ's victory and ours, as well as to show that it was through his loving sacrifice that he has earned the authority to judge the living and the dead.



Shaped by the Cross

E very night before going to bed, my parents would make the sign of the cross on each child's forehead and whisper, "May God bless you and keep you." Then we would go to our bedrooms, dip our fingers in the small holy water font, and sign ourselves. I remember asking my parents for their blessing before going on a trip or asking the abbot for his blessing before leaving the abbey. These simple signs have left a lasting impression on me.

The cross was everywhere when I was growing up; even today, we find the cross hanging in churches, schools, homes, offices, and cars and around our necks. The priest blesses people with the sign of the cross. Children are marked at their baptism and adults during the Order of Catechumens with the sign of the cross. Christians are shaped by the cross.

We should always remember the importance of the cross in our Christian journey.

In the late 1950s and early 1960s Christiane Brusselmans, the first woman to earn a doctorate in theology from the Catholic University of Louvain, experimented with an ancient process used to bring adults and families into the Church. Following the Second Vatican Council, her work and that of many others resulted in reinstitution of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)—rites lost during the early



Middle Ages due to the shift from adult to infant baptism.

One remarkable rite that marks this process is the Rite of Welcome, in which we admit those seeking baptism in the Catholic Church to the Order of Catechumens. The most moving moment is when the sign of the cross is drawn on the seekers' heart, hands, feet, and shoulders. I remember her instructing us to use big gestures to ensure recipients felt the weight of the cross, especially on their shoulders. The weight of the cross can indeed be heavy.

Our lives as Christians ought to be modeled after the cross. Each year, tens of thousands of people prepare themselves to join the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil. They stand in a long tradition rooted in New Testament times. Those who have been baptized in other Christian denominations celebrate the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist. Those not previously baptized celebrate all three sacraments of initiation: baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist.

The sacrament of baptism relates the images of baptismal bath, baptismal burial, and baptismal birth. First, we are washed clean from everything that prevents perfect union with God, who claims us as an adopted child. Second, we are buried with Christ so we may rise with him on the last day. Third, we are birthed into the Church—the Body of Christ. Because of this rich sacramental symbolism, baptismal fonts are sometimes made in the shape of a cross. Catechumens enter on one side to be baptized and exit on the other side.

We should always remember the importance of the cross in our Christian journey. Without explanation, my parents impressed this on me each time they signed me with the cross. +




