TAI CHI RETURNS!

The Parish is once again offering Tai Chi classes on **Thursdays at 3:00 PM and at 7:00 PM**. A minimum of three (3) students per class will be needed to hold the class. Tai Chi is the ancient Chinese martial art that is used for meditation, exercise, balance, and mind and body wellness. St. Luke the Evangelist Parish is offering this form of graceful, slow movement to help parishioners to gain strength, to improve their balance, flexibility, and range-of-motion, and to relieve stress. Classes are taught by members of the Oriental Healing Arts Association – a Senior Friendly and Senior Safe Tai Chi Program with the purpose of bringing Tai Chi to all age groups.

THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT

Why roses and joyful music on the third Sunday of Advent? It all starts with a golden rose. Long ago, the third Sunday of Advent was sort of a "break" in the fasting that was taking place before the celebration of Christmas. The third Sunday of Advent's chants and songs talked about "looking up," being "joy-filled and full of hope" at the nearness of the Savior. In church, the story of the Annunciation was common as the Gospel of the third Sunday of Advent.

The German name for the third Sunday of Advent was *Rosensonntag*, or the "Sunday of the Roses." That name came as a result of 15th century German pilgrim's witnessing Mass in Rome, where the Pope, after Mass on the third



Sunday of Advent, would carry a golden rose in procession out of the church. The rose itself would be sent to an exemplary Christian after Mass that day as a gift.

This custom was in use at Rome as far back as the 11th century, where the Pope would present bouquets of roses to people in the church on the third Sunday of Advent. Over the years, the real roses were replaced by golden roses, often encrusted with jewels. In churches all over Christendom in the West, the custom of presenting roses to exemplary Christians of a particular place caught on. From there, the liturgical color for the day was changed to reflect the joy of the liturgy and the custom of presenting roses – the Church wore "old rose" as a way to signal the nearness of the Christmas festival.

Today, we sing joyful songs and meditate on the image of the rose – whose purity and beauty are reflected in the person of the Blessed Mother Mary, and whose fragrance and loveliness are reflected in the coming "rose of the winter night" – Jesus, Immanuel.



Besides sharing Christmas joy through the Giving Tree, our Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Food Pantry provides Christmas Dinners to needy families in our area. The cost of purchasing items for the baskets typically runs to well over \$2000.00, and with hard times facing so many, we anticipate the need to be even greater than previous years.

Family Guide December 13, 2020 3rd Sunday of Advent / Gaudete Sunday

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: John 1:6-8, 19-28

During Advent, we prepare for Christmas by listening to the people who prepared the way for Jesus' coming. In this Sunday's Gospel, people ask John the Baptist who he is—the Messiah or a prophet. John answers by identifying himself as a voice in the desert, crying out, "Make straight the way of the Lord." He insists that someone more important than he is coming. The Gospel asks us to recognize Jesus among us by answering his call to be our best Christian selves.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): This week, the class made a special Christmas card. Ask your child to show it to the family. Who is he or she giving it to? Remember to keep the real meaning of Christmas—God's coming to live with us—a most important part of your family's preparation for the feast. Your child played a game matching ornaments. Maybe talk about the meaning behind some of your family's Christmas ornaments and decorations.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week, your child learned why it is important to make preparations for Christmas. Talk about how your family prepares for the feast. Talk about how Mary and Joseph prepared for the birth of Jesus. Ask your child to share the story of "The Just-Right Christmas Plate" with the family. Consider displaying your child's "Getting-Ready Mobile" from class in a prominent place at home.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week, your child recognized the preparations for Christmas that are happening in the parish. Ask your child to share what some of those preparations

are. Talk, too, about how John the Baptist announced that Jesus was coming to be with all the people. Ask your child to share with the family the story, "Waiting for a Surprise."

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week, your child learned about the Messiah from the words of the prophet Isaiah and from the Blessed Virgin Mary. They learned that the Messiah brings Good News to the poor and comforts the sorrowful. They learned, too, that God fills the hungry with good things. Talk about ways your family can bring the Good News of Christ to others and how you can feed the hungry and comfort the sorrowful during this Advent season. Prepare to add the O Antiphons to your daily prayer starting December 17.

Visions (Grades 7–9): In class this week, your teen explored how to spread the Good News. The class learned that it was the mission of John the Baptist to prepare people for the coming of Jesus. John's life and preaching pointed not to himself, but to "the one who is to come." Ask: How is spreading the Good News to others part of our family's Advent activities? How does the way our family lives and acts point to Jesus? The class also compared the two narratives of Jesus' birth in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Share both stories. Talk about the similarities and the differences.

Pray Together

As you say your Advent wreath prayer this week, include prayers for all the people who need the message that John the Baptist proclaimed. As each member mentions someone who needs the message, the whole family can respond: "Lord, help us be Good News for others."

John's Joyful Preaching

W hy go into the desert and cry out? The voice in the desert is lonesome, heard only by those who go there to listen. Let's leave our routines, go into the spiritual deserts of our hearts, and listen today.

The words of preparation John preaches are joyful. Why? First, to be told you are on the wrong path is good news. Have you ever followed your GPS to the wrong place because of an address typo? "It would have been nice to know this before I traveled across town to the wrong place," you thought.

Second, it is joyful to be told what makes your beloved happy, because you then know what will please him or her.

Sunday Readings

Isaiah 61:1-2a, 10-11

I will rejoice heartily in the LORD, my being exults in my God.

1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing.

John 1:6-8, 19-28

[John the Baptist said,] "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'Make straight the way of the Lord."' Good news! John's preaching points us to our destination in Jesus and to what makes him happy. The rose vestments worn by our priests today symbolize that joy. Notice in Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel fresco titled *Prophet Isaiah*, the prophet is wearing that color, too.

Another interesting detail is that Isaiah is holding his finger in the book while looking back at a young cherub, who in turn points to his neighbor. Isaiah's finger is in the Gospels, where he is the most quoted prophet of the Old Testament. Jesus reads from the prophet Isaiah, and John the Baptist quotes Isaiah's prophesy about "the voice crying out in the desert."

Perhaps the cherub behind Isaiah is John the Baptist. And perhaps the barely visible baby to whom the little John the Baptist is pointing represents Christ, the reason for our joy. +

Celebrate the Incarnation

S oon after I met my husband, I began experiencing paralyzing anxiety. Was he or was he not the one God meant for me to marry? I was terrified of misinterpreting God's will, yet I was too afraid of hearing an unwelcome answer to ask for help. So, it went on for four years. Thankfully, once we were married, that particular fear resolved itself.

Nonetheless, to this day, severe anxiety still crops up occasionally. The trigger is always different—infertility, insomnia, professional concerns—but the symptoms are the same: my heart pounds, my brain fixates on *what-if* questions, and my chest tightens to the point that I find it difficult to even draw a deep breath. Anxiety consumes my thoughts and spoils the enjoyment of everyday life. And then...in the midst of this darkness, sometimes, I find relief in thinking: *by becoming human, Jesus sanctified even this plague of humankind.*

Sometimes we forget how relevant the celebration of the Incarnation is to our faith.

At this time of year, our senses our filled with the celebration of the Incarnation—God becoming a human being. Stories of stables, shepherds, and angels remind us that God is with us. Yet



sometimes, we forget just how relevant this tenet of faith really is.

When God took on human flesh, he accepted the whole works, including human imperfections. Jesus could have stayed up in heaven to hang out with the choirs of angels. Instead, he came down and got his hands dirty. He took on everything but sin, and for that reason, the entire human experience has been made holy—even the difficult parts.

It's in the Garden of Gethsemane that I see this most clearly. Jesus' prayer rings so true: *Please don't make me go through this. You know I want to do your will, God—but is this really it?* To be fully human is to know uncertainty and feelings of abandonment. It's a lonely place to inhabit, and seemingly reassuring Scripture can sometimes have the opposite effect. Philippians 4:6–7 says, "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Such passages as these can actually feed the *what-if* questions: What if I'm mired in this darkness because my faith isn't strong enough to lift me above it?

We're not alone, though. Jesus experienced terror and uncertainty, too. He walked a similar path of darkness right to the cross. And because he did, there's light in times of darkness—right here, right in the middle of the mire. And while knowing that doesn't take away my anxiety, it does help me get through it. +



Lord, you are the source of my strength, peace, and joy. Send your Spirit to renew my trust and hope in you and give me peace.
