TAI CHI RETURNS!

The Parish is once again offering Tai Chi classes on **Thursdays at 3:00 PM and at 7:00 PM**. A minimum of three (3) students per class will be needed to hold the class. Tai Chi is the ancient Chinese martial art that is used for meditation, exercise, balance, and mind and body wellness. St. Luke the Evangelist Parish is offering this form of graceful, slow movement to help parishioners to gain strength, to improve their balance, flexibility, and range-of-motion, and to relieve stress. Classes are taught by members of the Oriental Healing Arts Association – a Senior Friendly and Senior Safe Tai Chi Program with the purpose of bringing Tai Chi to all age groups.



COME, O COME....

Yes, you read the title right. That's "O" - the letter of the alphabet that most reminds us of breakfast cereal, inner tubes, doughnuts, hula hoops, no hitters... and Advent. In many parishes, "O" is the first word said in the new church year. We sing it in Advent's most popular song, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." It announces the season which anticipates the coming of Christ at Christmas.

This hymn, which is almost synonymous with the whole season of Advent was first composed and sung to announce that Advent was ending. The last eight days of Advent (beginning on December 17 and ending on December 24) form a little season all by themselves. As the church prepares to celebrate the nativity of Christ, the Liturgy gets more intense. At daily Mass, the Gospels relate the events leading up to the first Christmas. At evening prayer, the Church prays a special series of antiphons that beckon the Messiah to come. Each night gives him a new name, drawn from the Old Testament tradition. "O Wisdom," "O Sacred Lord," "O Flower of Jesse's Stem," "O Key of David," "O Radiant Dawn," "O King of All Nations," and, on Christmas eve, the greatest of them all, "O Emmanuel," a name that means "God is with us."

For the reasons which will be immediately obvious, we call that group of refrains the "O Antiphons." They are a hallmark of late Advent, and a collection of music our church has treasured for centuries. The Mass now includes a version of them as the alleluia verses for the same eight days before Christmas.



In the Middle Ages, those seven antiphons got strung together into a popular hymn. The last one became verse one and "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" was born. Thus, the antiphon originally established for the last evening before Christmas Eve is now often sung to begin Advent. That "O" of course, simply tells us that we're talking to someone. It is like saying, "Hey, you," only more politely. But "O" reminds us of much more. It makes us think of something having no beginning and no end, like God's love or an Advent wreath. It resembles the shape of our mouth and the sound we make when we face a mystery we cannot fully comprehend.

O come, Thou **Wisdom** from on high, Who orders all things mightily; To us the path of knowledge show, And teach us in her ways to go.

O come, Thou **Rod of Jesse**, free Thine own from Satan's tyranny; From depths of hell Thy people save, And give them victory over the grave.

O come, Thou **Day-spring**, come and cheer Our spirits by Thine advent here; O Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, And death's dark shadows put to flight.

O come, Thou **Key of David**, come, And open wide our heavenly home; Make safe the way that leads on high, And close the path to misery. O come, great **Lord of might**, Who to Thy tribes on Sinai's height In ancient times once gave the law In cloud and majesty and awe.

O come, Thou **Root of Jesse's tree**, An ensign of Thy people be; Before Thee rulers silent fall; All peoples on Thy mercy call.

O come, **Desire of nations**, bind In one the hearts of all mankind; Bid Thou our sad divisions cease, And be Thyself our King of Peace.

O come, O come, **Emmanuel**, And ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here Until the Son of God appear.

Family Guide

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Luke 1:26-38

In Sunday's Gospel, the angel Gabriel disturbs Mary with the words, "The Lord is with you. You have found favor with God." Mary wonders what those words mean. She wonders, too, how she can become a mother since she is still a virgin. Mary's yes to God is an act of faith. The Gospel is also an invitation to us all to say yes to God's call and to show by our lives that, in Jesus, God becomes Emmanuel—God with us.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Encourage your child to tell the family what he or she has learned about Christmas. Ask your child to share the Christmas booklet put together in class and use it to tell the story to your family. Talk about God asking Mary to become Jesus' mother. Talk about how Mary said yes to God. Remind the children that because Mary said yes to God, God is with us all the time. Pray the Hail Mary together.

Promise (Grades K–1): Christmas is just days away, and your child can hardly wait for the day to come. Ask your child to share with the family the story of the angel coming to Mary to invite her to be the mother of Jesus. Talk about how important it is to say yes to God by being loving and kind and unselfish.

Good News (Grades 2–3): During this week's class, your child learned about God's choice of Mary to be Jesus' mother and her response to God. Talk about one lesson we can learn from Mary: always say yes to God. Ask your child to share with the family the little play they performed in class that was a telling of the Christmas story in the Huron Native American tradition. Pray the Hail Mary together.

Venture (Grades 4–6): In class this week, the children recognized ways they can share the Good News of Jesus' birth with others. They also learned the importance of Mary's faith in God and her willingness to say yes when she was asked to become the mother of Jesus. Ask your child to share with the family God's promise to the house of King David. Be sure and listen to Father Jan Michael Joncas' new song from this week's lesson that he wrote during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Your young person learned about the value of serving others. Ask your son or daughter to share with the family the story of friendship titled, "I'll Push You." Talk about volunteer work that members of your family do. Consider playing a round of "Say Yes!", a game based on Mary's response to her call from God.

Pray Together

When Gabriel announced to Mary that she would become the Mother of God, Mary said yes. Spend a few moments as a family asking God to give each member the courage to always say yes to God. Pray that the way you live shows that, in Jesus, God is always with us.

An Exhibit of Wonder and Love

rowing up I attended midnight Mass on Christmas with my family. I insisted on arriving early because I didn't want to miss the moment before the beginning of the Mass when the sacristan carried the Baby Jesus into the church and placed him in the manger. He was an elderly man who had worked for the church his entire life. He walked with great difficulty and could barely make it down the steps of the sanctuary. Yet, he held the plaster image of Jesus in his arms with such tenderness and reverence he might as well have been carrying a real baby. He knew this image represented the Savior of the world.

As a teenager, I quickly lost interest in the Baby Jesus. I was too *cool* to fuss about any baby, let alone a plaster one. As a student at Notre Dame, I thought it theologically unsophisticated to pay much attention to Christmas beyond the reality of the Incarnation celebrated on that day. I had little patience for the obsession of people for Christmas trees and Nativity scenes. I wondered if they really understood the meaning of Christmas.

But my outlook on Christmas completely changed when I was given a small Nativity set from Burkina Faso, a country in West Africa. It was carved in local wood by a Christian villager. Although the figures were rather primitive, one could clearly see that the artist had carved the Holy Family in the



image of the people of his village. I loved it so much that this first Nativity set became the start of a large collection of Nativities from all around the world, all of which are in the image of the people who created them.

Each year, I carefully unwrap close to 400 Nativity sets. I do this deliberately, thinking of the people who carved each set in his or her own image. As I gently place the Baby Jesus in the manger, set after set, I also think of the old man in my home church from so many years ago and the woman in our church today who carries the Baby Jesus to the Nativity scene with such love and reverence.

In a simple yet poignant way, these many Nativity sets with their varied

features and skin tones and the way we treat them underline the essence of the Incarnation. The artist and beholder alike know that, though very different from us, Jesus became like all of us. Through Jesus, no matter who we are, we are all able to encounter God in a real and tangible way. The Nativity scenes and the rituals around them symbolize and affirm this wondrous reality.

Nativity scenes help symbolize the reality that, through Jesus, we're able to encounter God in a tangible way.

Indeed, this encounter with God in Jesus Christ is not a mere theological exercise or pietistic drivel. Rather, it's a great reality. We celebrate that he took on our image and became like us so we might take on his image and become like him. +
