Do Something for Lent. Renew your faith.

What is the Lenten Journey all about? Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are called the "three pillars" of the Christian way of life. They help support a full and healthy life of discipleship. During Lent we try to repair and strengthen these three pillars, which also are called the "three disciplines" because they help people become better disciples of the Lord.

The Lenten Journey is about PRAYER. Prayer is conversation with God. Make a good habit of daily prayer. Read the Psalms; and each Lent try and learn one or two by heart. Try to sing your prayer at home, and make every effort to sing well when you worship with others.



The Lenten Journey is about FASTING. To prepare himself for his life's work, Jesus fasted in the wilderness. As Christians grow up, they need to learn traditional, healthy ways to fast. When we fast, we deny ourselves some food or other good things. We remind ourselves of how dependent we are on God's gifts, which always must be shared fairly and never taken for granted.

The Lenten Journey is about GIVING. Almsgiving means "sharing compassion." Almsgiving means more than giving away the things we don't need. It means giving away some of the things we do need because someone else also needs them. It means giving of ourselves.

Our Lenten Journey is about faith sharing during the Lenten season. It is a way to learn more about your faith and grow as a disciple of the Lord; it is a way to meet fellow parishioners, and to contribute to the life of our Parish.



Family Guide January 24, 2021 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 1:14-20

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus calls four fishermen to become fishers of people. They respond quickly and follow Jesus. They share in his work of spreading the Good News of God's love. This is a call that comes to all on this Sunday, and we need to respond with the same joy and enthusiasm as the first disciples.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned that Jesus calls people to belong to his family. We all follow Jesus by fulfilling our responsibilities in daily life. Talk to your child about ways to be loving or forgiving, and point out times when your child acts as a a member of God's loving family.

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child learned about listening to God's Word and to others. Ask your child to share the story, "Listening to Emma," with the family. Be sure to listen carefully and to encourage your child to share details. Discuss ways to make sure you are listening to one another.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned about being sent by Jesus to share his Good News with others. Talk about ways your family can share Jesus' message with others during Lent. Remember that actions will always speak louder than words when it comes to bringing the Good News to others. Discuss, too, what vocation is. **Venture** (Grades 4–6): Ask your youngster to share with the family what he or she learned about the Gospel of Mark. The class also acted out a play about the Prophet Jonah, who was called by God but really, at first, did not want to answer yes. Talk about the experiences Jonah had in the story. Discuss ways that your family can answer God's call to follow Jesus and bring the Good News to the people you meet. Ask your young person about the relationship between Saint Monica and Saint Augustine.

Visions (Grades 7–9): The class this week explored how Christians discover their vocations. Ask your son or daughter to share with the family the story, "God Changed My Mind." Talk a bit about the example of Pope Francis and how he discovered his vocation. The class also studied the Eucharistic Prayer from the Mass. This is a good opportunity to share as a family how important the Mass is to you and how important it is to attend Mass every Sunday. The class also explored the Gospel of Mark to find out who Jesus is. Ask your son or daughter to describe what he or she learned.

Pray Together

Sometimes God's call is discovered in silence. When you complete your conversation about Sunday's Gospel lesson, invite all the members of your family to share a few moments of silent prayer. You can all hold hands or just sit quietly together. An adult can remind the family that Jesus calls all of you to follow him. End by praying together the Sign of the Cross.

God's Patient Call

he Sistine Chapel fresco, *The* Prophet Jonah, is directly above The Last Judgment. Michelangelo chooses to depict Jonah for his theological connection to Jesus, who said, "Just as Jonah was in the belly of the whale three days and three nights, so will the Son of Man be in the heart of the earth three days and three nights" (Matthew 18:40).

Unlike Jesus, Jonah initially balks at God's call until he grudgingly accepts and preaches to the city of Nineveh. In his rebellion, he gets in a boat and goes the opposite direction from where God was calling. Eventually he was thrown

overboard and swallowed by the fish, seen painted at his side. After a threenight stomachache, the fish spewed Jonah up on the shore, back where he had started.

Jonah looks up to heaven with a weary longing, which might denote his melancholy personality. The fig tree further reinforces his weakness because it recalls the episode when Jonah lay under the fig tree in depression and lethargy.


Like Peter and Andrew, James and John, God entered Jonah's life and called him. Unlike the apostles, it took him a while to say yes. We can also be slow to respond to the invitation of God in our soul, whether in big or small things. Perhaps the attraction of the world or fear of sacrifice keeps us from saying yes. Yet his voice is constant and persistent.

Michelangelo paints Jonah dangling above *The Last Judgment* as if to subtly say, you are cordially invited to say yes to God's patient callings...while you still have time. +

Being Authentic to God

I have a theory about nurturing faith in the family. It goes like this: If a child's faith is an integral part of his or her everyday life—not just the overtly religious parts—it will become so central to that person's identity that he or she could never leave the Church because it would mean an abandoning of self. The question is, how do you accomplish that goal?

I believe the answer is twofold: authenticity and practicality.

First Corinthians 12 exhorts us to remember that our gifts are uniquely given by God and so is our calling. In my family, nurturing the faith in an authentic and practical way means leading a choir at Mass and teaching natural family planning with the kids sitting in the room with us. It means letting them watch the news and having no-questionoff-limits discussions of what they see there. It means carrying snacks in the car to give to homeless men and women, digging into piggy banks to contribute to the family's Christmas charity, and regarding conservation and recycling as signs of Godly stewardship, not just civic responsibility.

In your family, an authentic, practical application of the faith might look quite different. It's not about doing what everyone else does. It's about being authentic to the gifts residing within individual households. It's about applying the faith to every moment of every day.



This isn't just for the kids, either. Adults cannot nurture in our children what we do not possess ourselves. Conversion is a lifelong process. When Pope Francis visited the United States, for instance, he challenged Catholics as well as nonbelievers. Did we listen? Did we revisit dearly held opinions in light of our identity as Catholic Christians?

Our children need to see us engaged in an authentic search for God, one that doesn't profess to have all the answers but instead constantly seeks his will over our own limited understanding of the world. They need to see us wrestling with concepts like forgiveness and "do unto others" in the mundane interactions that make up the vast majority of life.

In this, they mirror the adult world. The Church suffers when its members pass judgment on others while failing to recognize the ways in which our worldly biases lead us away from the Gospel. The good news is that an authentic and practical application of the faith is the key not only to the next generation of the Church but also to evangelizing the world. +
