The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 1:40-45

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus adds to his growing community. By touching and healing a leper, Jesus shows us that God's love is for everyone. People in Jesus' time feared lepers and made them live apart from others. Jesus, reaching out to the leper gives us an example to do the same for people who many consider outcasts and outsiders.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Sunday is Valentine's Day. It is said that when Saint Valentine was sent to prison, he sent notes to young couples to encourage them in their faith. Ask your child to share with the family the Valentine's Day activity. Display the Valentine banner made during the lesson. Note how the activity can help your whole family express your love for God by showing love and kindness for each other

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child learned that Jesus cared for people who are left out. Ask your child to share with the family what he or she learned about caring. The Valentine's Day celebration is a good reminder of how important it is for your family to show love for one another and to all you meet.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned how Jesus reached out to heal people who were sick. The children also learned how they can reach out to people in need. Talk about ways your family can care for the sick or reach out to people who need your help. Ask your child to share the story of Saint Damien who worked with the lepers in Hawaii.

Venture (Grades 4–6): The class learned this week that Jesus used his humanity as well as his divinity to bring the Good News to people. In the story "The Visitors," the class also learned that understanding can lead to compassion for others. Talk about ways your family can grow in understanding and compassion. Your child learned that Holy Communion is most important in bringing the community together. Talk about your family's attitudes toward going to Mass and receiving Holy Communion.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Two important parts of this week's lesson are the role of Holy Communion in building the Christian community and the value and meaning of the Eighth Commandment. Talk together as a family about the Mass and how each of you can better participate and can make Holy Communion the center of your family worship. Ask your son or daughter to share what the class learned about the Sacrament of Reconciliation and about telling the truth and avoiding lies. Remind one another that you are members of the Body of Christ.

Pray Together

This coming Wednesday is Ash Wednesday—the first day of Lent. When you complete your conversation about the week's Gospel lesson, as your family prayer, plan to go to church to receive ashes. On the way home, ask God to bless your family during Lent and to help you grow in your love for Jesus and the Church.

Traditional Lenten Disciplines

Fasting & Abstinence: Catholics aged 14 and older abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent. In addition, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, Catholics from age 18-59 fast, limiting themselves to one full meal and two smaller meals each day.

Prayer: Catholics are encouraged to pray more during Lent, especially with Scripture. Lent is also an ideal time to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation in preparation for the celebration of Christ's Passion, Death and Resurrection.

Almsgiving: Moved by the sacrifice of Christ, many Christians combine almsgiving with fasting, giving to the poor the money they saved by eating, drinking or buying less as they rely more on God's abundant grace.

Attende, Domine

"Hear us, O Lord"

With Ash Wednesday upon us, it is a good time to think and pray about the Lenten Season - the "Springtime" of the Church. The word "Lent" means spring, and comes from the same root as the word "lengthen," since the days do get longer as winter wanes. The whole northern hemisphere turns toward the sun, the source of life, and winter gives way to spring. In Hebrew, the language of the Old

Testament, the word for "repentance" is "to turn." As the earth turns to the sun, as the earth turns from winter cold to the new life of spring, so do we turn our lives towards our loving God and seek the Way of the Lord Jesus anew.

"Even now, return to me, says the Lord." (Joel 2:12). The word "sin" means separation. We are called to turn from our separate selves, from our sins; and to come together in community. Self denial is another way we express our



repentance. We turn away from sin and death and toward God as our source of life by disciplining our wills and desires.

Self-denial is three-fold, according to Matthew's Gospel (chap. 6). We **PRAY**: "Go to your room, close your door and pray to your Father in private." We **FAST**: "No one may see you are fasting but your Father in heaven." We give **ALMS**: "Keep your deeds of mercy secret, and your Father, who sees in secret will repay you." Self-denial is an exercise, a work-out, getting our lives and spirits into shape. Through the Lenten exercise of **PRAYER**, **FASTING** and **ALMSGIVING**, we spring clean our lives, sharpen our senses, put tomorrow in its place and treasure the day at hand.

For Forty Days we are conscious of how we must sharpen our senses and focus mind and heart on the reign of God. We are, above all, aware of those waters in which we were baptized into Christ's death. That is, death to sin and evil; it is life in Christ that we began in those waters of baptism. These waters wait at Lent's end for the Catechumens of the Church. The entire Lenten season turns, it seems, on Baptism, renewal and reception into the Church.

We, too, wait for the opportunity to renew our own Baptismal Promises, and to feel the splash of Easter water on our faces after the dryness of our Lenten desert journey.

he Church asks us to give ourselves to prayer and to the reading of Scripture, to fasting and to giving of alms during the Lenten season. The fasting that all do together on Fridays is but a sign of the daily Lenten discipline of individuals and households: fasting for certain periods of time, fasting from certain foods, but also fasting from other things and activities.

Likewise, the giving of alms is some effort to share this world equally not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and possessions and through work of many kinds for a just world.

FASTING means that anyone between the ages of 18 and 59 may eat only one full meal (with the other 2 meals being distinctly smaller). One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any meals at all. One fasts for a spiritual reason - (an end to sin, a reconciliation in one's life or family, an end to war or other disturbance, or for the spread of the Gospel or



personal/corporate conversion) than for a personal dietary goal. The Church requires all between the ages of 18 and 59 to observe the fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fridays and Wednesdays are also traditional fast days, but are not mandatory.

ABSTINENCE is the discipline for those age 14 or older to **forego the eating of** any meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays of Lent.

The **EASTER DUTY** is the **obligation to receive Holy Eucharist** between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday.

The **Sacrament of Reconciliation is an obligation** for all those who are conscious of grave sin. A frequent celebration of Reconciliation is encouraged for all, especially during the Lenten Season.

Reconciliation is celebrated at Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish on Saturdays at 3:00 at Plaistow, and on the Sundays of Lent following 6:00 PM Evening Prayer at Newton.

A Lenten Penance Service is scheduled for Sunday, March 22 at 4 PM at Saint Michael Parish in Exeter. Many local clergy will be available. All are welcome.

Do Something for Lent. Renew your faith.


also are called the "three disciplines" because they help people become better disciples of the Lord. Our



LENTEN REGULATIONS

FASTING

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

ABSTINENCE

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

EASTER PRECEPT

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist. Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All of the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praise worthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.



The Courage to Heal

L eprosy was a highly contagious skin disease that led to certain death for anyone who caught it in Jesus' time. For good reason the Jewish law demanded that a leper live set apart and cry out as he walked along to keep everyone at a safe distance. Imagine the pitiful scene of everyone discreetly but purposefully moving away at the sound of someone shouting, "Unclean, unclean!"

Yet the leper doesn't shout to keep Jesus away. He walks right up to our Lord and confesses his faith in Jesus' power to heal him of this incurable bacteria. He humbly admits his contagious illness and places himself before Jesus. And unlike anyone else might do, Jesus doesn't run

away, he walks toward him. He does the unthinkable. He touches him!

We need not be ashamed of our deadly sin that eats away at our heart and cripples our ability to love. Go to Jesus, expose it to him, and let his loving touch transform you.

The terrible disease of leprosy was still a major problem well into the nineteenth century when St. Damian, a Belgian missionary, went to the Hawaiian Island of Molokai to serve as parish priest to all the lepers quarantined on that island. Not fearing to touch them, he cared for them for many years until, as expected, he contracted the disease and died of it.


This is what it means to be a Christian! Be like Jesus. Be not afraid of your wounds or those of others, no matter how repellent, and give of yourself to care for them. +

Light Within the Darkness

Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

Philippians 4:8

We live in a pretty messed-up world: Countries pursue weapons that could wipe out everything. Mothers turn guns on their children. We justify derision, bigotry, and violence in the name of God. Young people objectify themselves and their peers because they lack good models of how to give and receive love.

The problems aren't hard to identify. What's hard is figuring out what to do about them. They're so big, so sprawling, and so tightly woven. Where do I even begin? What's the right plan of action? How can lowly little me, with my couple hundred social-networking friends, interrupt the momentum of this juggernaut?

My impotence makes me angry. I'm jaded by the partisan bickering that ensures nothing ever gets solved. I'm tempted to throw up my hands and write off the future—and my responsibility to it—altogether. What do *my* actions matter, anyway, amid so much brokenness, so much willful ignorance?

But when I spend all my energy on anger, I cease to recognize the beauty, the potential for good, that exists alongside



and is sometimes intertwined with the bad. The voices shouting vitriol, anger, narcissism, and greed drown out the whisper of the divine.

I bury myself in self-righteous judgment until, without realizing it, I become part of the problem instead of the solution. I go looking for a safe, insulated enclave, someplace the problems can't reach me, where I'm absolved of the duty to act where, when, and how I'm able.

The opportunity to act does exist, but it's usually uncomfortable. It's easier to stand back and complain than to dig in, get my hands dirty, and risk learning—through abject failure or mediocre success—how small I really

am. I think this is why St. Paul tells us to contemplate what is true and pure: What I focus on determines my reality. If I wrap my worldview in anger, I leave no room for kindness and compassion. But if I fix my sights on all that is good and holy, I'm fortified against the bitterness and disillusionment that might otherwise cripple me as I fight the unwinnable battle against the effects of sin. After all, let's face it—as Henri Nouwen observed, the world will always be dark. My efforts aren't going to change that.

Fortunately, God doesn't look at the bottom line when measuring my job performance. As St. Teresa of Calcutta famously said, "My job is not to succeed, but to be faithful to my mission." +
