#### **CREMATION & THE CHURCH**

On October 25, 2016, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith published a new instruction on the burial of the dead and on the conservation of the ashes in cases of cremation. The instruction reiterated the long held view that the Church is not opposed to the practice of cremation, though it continues to recommend that the bodies of the deceased be buried in cemeteries or other sacred places. However, the new document inists that ashes should not be kept in private homes and that the scattering of ashes in the air, on land, or at sea is not permitted. The instruction also insisted that cremains may not be divided among various family members, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry, or other objects.



# LENTEN REGULATIONS

## **FASTING**

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

## **ABSTINENCE**

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

# **EASTER PRECEPT**

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist. Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

## PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All of the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praise worthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.



# The Gospel at Home

#### This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 9:2-10

Sunday's Gospel story of the Transfiguration gives us a glimpse of Jesus' Risen life after the events of his suffering and Death. This event gives us a vision of Christian living. It gives us a notion of ourselves transformed by the power of Jesus' Death and Resurrection. Each season of Lent is another springtime in our journey of faith—growing to be people who are like Jesus.

#### **Exploring the Gospel Message**

**Seeds** (Preschool): This week's lesson taught your child about growth and change as signs of God's life in us and all around us. Get out birthday pictures of your child. Talk together about how he or she has changed. Talk, too, about how your child is growing in love of God by learning prayers, going to church, and learning about Jesus.

Promise (Grades K–1): The lesson this week explored the notion of change and growth. Talk with your child about the many ways he or she has grown over the past year. Ask your child to show the booklet that shows how to make a difference. Discuss ways you can help one another when family members are grouchy or sad.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned that Jesus has two natures—both human and divine. Talk as a family about Jesus and how he is a human like you but is also the Son of God. Talk, too, about Jesus as a healer and as a teacher. Continue to plan Lenten activities for the family. Concentrate on how you can help people in need. Discuss how the Our Father prayer can be worked in Lenten prayer.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your child learned about how change is a part of life. The class also explored the Fourth Commandment about honoring one's parents. Talk about how important honoring parents is for your family—including grandparents and other relatives. Talk about respect and obedience as well. Ask your child to share the story, "Miranda's Peaceful Sport." Take a few minutes to review your Lenten covenant.

Visions (Grades 7–9): This week, your young person's class learned about transformation and how God transformed the life of Abraham. The class learned, too, about how the Gospel story of the Transfiguration is a promise of how all our lives will be transformed when we live forever with God. Ask your son or daughter to share with the family the story of Sister Dorothy Stang, who has been called "the martyr of the Amazon." (March 8–14 is National Catholic Sisters Week. Talk about ways your family can show appreciation to religious sisters who minister in your parish, school, or community.)

#### **Pray Together**

When you complete your conversation about Sunday's Gospel lesson, make a litany prayer of the special needs of your family, of your school or work, and of the whole world. After each need is mentioned, everyone in the family can pray together with the words, "Lord, help us all work and pray to help those in need and to change the world."

#### **GLUTEN INTOLERANT?**

The Parish now provides an option for receiving Holy Communion for anyone suffering from gluten intolerance or celiac disease. We have obtained special altar breads that are fully certified for use at Mass by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, and laboratory tested to contain only .001% gluten. Please see the Pastor or the Sacristan before Mass about receiving Communion using one of these special hosts.

#### PARISH POLICY ON GROUPS SEEKING SUPPORT

After consultation with the Parish Pastoral Council, and taking into account the many groups that desire the community's support, it has been decided that the following policy be put into place:

- 1. Only Parish groups will be allowed to solicit support for their projects in our churches. This includes groups from within the Parish itself or groups which are based within our Parish.
- 2. Groups from outside the Parish community will be allowed to solicit support from the community only by rare exception and with the express consent of the Pastor and Parish Council.
- 3. No group of any kind will be allowed to solicit until the conclusion of the Liturgy. Publicity and other materials may be displayed in the entrances of the Church, but no actual solicitation may occur until after Mass has ended.
- 4. No more than one (1) Parish group may seek the support of the community at one time. This means that there are not to be multiple support efforts on the same weekend.

The Pastor will be the sole arbitrator of scheduling for Parish groups seeking community support. Parish groups should contact the Parish Office to determine availability for scheduling any support event. Thank you for your continuing support for the mission of St. Luke the Evangelist Parish.

Vatican mural by Raphael Sanzio, *The Sacrifice of Isaac*, depicts the promised Isaac, the son of Abraham's old age, kneeling humbly on an altar. He was the answer to a prayer, a commitment by God that, through this child, Abraham would have descendants as numerous as the stars. Yet God was asking him to sacrifice that hope and promise. And Abraham, although surely not understanding, was willing to obey the Father. It represents the supreme test of faith. Abraham is called "our Father in Faith" for a reason.

God doesn't always make sense to us and we are painfully aware that his ways are not always our ways.



Although he wants to understand, he doesn't make the reason an absolute. Isaac foreshadows the trusting lamb led to slaughter, the ram whose head will be caught in a crown of thorns, and the Son who will not be spared by the heavenly Father. +

# Build a Strong Foundation

In the absence of clarity, the only way to hold the course is to stay in touch with the One who sees the big picture. Prayer is the foundation of a lived faith.

Sometimes I think past generations had an easier time following God. The Israelites had the finger of the Almighty carving commandments in stone. The early Church had flesh-and-blood encounters with the Son of God. We, on the other hand, have to make do by asking, "What would Jesus do?"

It seems like an easy question until you start trying to answer it. After all, Jesus never told us how to address terrorism, prenatal testing, or the hookup culture. Even perennial problems like poverty require us to distinguish between collective (governmental) and personal responsibility. As we consider the future, how do we discern a Christian response to sticky moral quandaries?

The answer is as deceptively simple as the question. The answer is prayer. But prayer is more than a shopping list tacked to a rosary or Chaplet of the Divine Mercy. Asking God for what we need is good and holy, but prayer is a two-way street; we also have to listen. Listening requires quiet, and the paradigms that govern modern life leave little room for quiet. Lack of stimulus makes us nervous—we can't exercise without earbuds streaming music. We can't eat in restaurants without a widescreen TV in every corner. Smartphones ensure that the web is at our fingertips at all times.



In many ways, this is a blessing; however, it also means God has to shout to be heard. And although God certainly can shout, it's not his preferred mode of communication.

God doesn't inscribe messages on billboards; he speaks softly to pilgrim hearts (see 1 Kings 19:12)—those who seek to hear his voice in everything they encounter, who take time to "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalms 46:11). And therein lies the first challenge—to set aside the background noise that fills modern life.

It may not feel like it, but the moral conundrums of generations past were as much a muddle to the people living through them as ours are now. Their problems look simple because we have the advantage of hindsight. The future will always be shrouded in uncertainty. Confidence comes when we humbly admit we don't have the answers. It comes when we remove distraction and allow our hearts and minds to be molded into a clearer reflection of God.

If we reflect God, we can trust that we have direction in our stumbling—even if we can't see the endpoint. +
