CREMATION & THE CHURCH

On October 25, 2016, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith published a new instruction on the burial of the dead and on the conservation of the ashes in cases of cremation. The instruction reiterated the long held view that the Church is not opposed to the practice of cremation, though it continues to recommend that the bodies of the deceased be buried in cemeteries or other sacred places. However, the new document inists that ashes should not be kept in private homes and that the scattering of ashes in the air, on land, or at sea is not permitted. The instruction also insisted that cremains may not be divided among various family members, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry, or other objects. Please contact Father Albert in the Parish Office with any questions. Brochures about the Rite of Christian Funerals are available at the Church entrances.

Family Guide May 2, 2021 5th Sunday of Easter

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: John 15:1-8

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus compares himself to a vine and his followers to the branches on that vine. Branches get their nourishment from the vine. From this Gospel, we understand that we are all one family and that we need and depend on one another. We the branches never want to be separated from the vine that is Jesus Christ.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (**Preschool**): This week, your child learned that we are all connected to Jesus much like branches are connected to a vine. The children also explored how various people, such as doctors and teachers, help other people. Feeling a sense of belonging is important to children of this age. Remind one another that you are all part of the Body of Christ the Church.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week, your child's class shared about being welcoming of others and about how important it is to belong. One of the most important lessons for children is learning that they are welcome in church. Talk about ways your parish makes your family feel welcome. Be sure your child shares the Mass booklet he or she made.

Good News (Grades 2–3): As part of the discussion of Jesus' image of the vine and the branches, your child's class explored ways that people are connected—ways in which they are like others. One of those ways is that we are all part of the Body of Christ, that is the Church. Discuss how we share in the life of Christ. In class, the children also started family trees. See how much more you can add to the family tree and pray for those who have gone before us.

Venture (Grades 4–6): In class this week, your child saw how all the members of the Church are connected like branches to the vine that is Jesus Christ. The class read about how Sister Stephanie Baliga's joked about, then did run a marathon on a treadmill because the Chicago Marathon was canceled during the pandemic. Talk about how your family has had to adapt during the pandemic. Also ask your youngster to tell you about what makes Cardinal Wilton Gregory special.

Visions (Grades 7–9): The class this week explored the Gospel reading about how Jesus nourishes our faith. Your young person learned about Father Eusebio Kino, who took the Good News of Christ, our true vine, to the people of Mexico, California, and Arizona after becoming a priest in 1677. Have your young person tell you about this Cowboy Priest and servant of God. Jesus makes us one, and ecumenism works to unite Christians who all belong to Jesus. Ask your young person to describe how Pope Francis has worked to unite people of faith. Be sure your young person follows up with an interview of a Protestant or Orthodox Christian as described in the lesson.

Pray Together

Each day this week, pray the Lord's Prayer, the Hail Mary, and the Glory Be to the Father together. Members of the Church throughout the world share these three prayers. Praying them together as a family can help you grow in awareness of just how many branches spring from Christ the Vine.

HOW TO MAKE A REPORT OF SEXUAL ABUSE

New Hampshire law requires that anyone who has reason to suspect that a child is being or has been abused or neglected must make a report to the Division for Children, Youth & Families ("DCYF") of the State of New Hampshire, 1-800-894-5533. Any person who suspects or alleges child abuse on the part of a priest, deacon, employee, or volunteer of a parish, school, or institution of the diocese of Manchester is also encouraged to make a report to the Office for Ministerial Conduct, 603-669-3100. Church personnel - clergy, paid employees, and volunteers - have additional reporting requirements if they believe that Church personnel have sexually abused a child. The Vine and the Branches Become One

Jesus himself picked the image of the vine to describe the reality of our being united to him and the Father. And this was not lost on early Christians. One of the first images they used to mark their graves was the vine and the branches.

An amazing thing about a vine and its branches is that you can't tell the difference between them. Look at a grapevine and try to determine which is the branch and which is the vine or trunk. You can't, since it appears as one seamless reality. Jesus invites us to be so

Children, let us love not in word or speech but in deed and truth.

John 15:1-8

[Jesus said,] "I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit." close to him that we appear to be just like him—"other Christs," as our name Christian suggests!

Second, the sap that springs from the vine, runs through the branches, and matures in the fruit is all the same. The life in Jesus and the life in us as Christians are the same. He has given us the same Spirit that animated him, the Holy Spirit.

This is why Jesus can guarantee that, if we remain in him by listening to his word and following his Spirit, we will definitely bear much fruit. His word and Spirit cannot remain sterile in us.

The most important result of being united to Jesus and bearing fruit is that not only will we be united to him in this life, but this friendship will last for all eternity. That's why early Christians put vines on their tombs. +

Jesus guarantees that, if we remain in him by listening to his word and following his Spirit, we will bear much fruit.

Beyond Gun Control

Michael couldn't wait to tell his second-grade friend what had happened to him. "A policeman pointed a gun at my head this morning!" Michael's friend was scared, so he told the teacher, who told the principal, who called Michael's parents. His parents explained that their home had



been raided at 6:00 AM by federal agents, guns drawn. One had pointed a gun at Michael. An uncle living with the family had been arrested and charged with illegal sale of semiautomatic weapons.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops called for gun control in their document Community and Crime: A Statement of the Committee on Social Development and World Peace. That document was followed by Responsibility, Rehabilitation, and Restoration: A Catholic Perspective on Crime and Criminal Justice. It reiterated their support for legislative efforts to protect society from the violence associated with easy access to deadly weapons. Since then, the bishops affirmed their hope that any government action on gun-violence prevention would lead to greater respect for human life.

Like it or not, violence is part of our lives. Violent TV programs, video games, and movies are a source of entertainment for many. War, insurrection, and mob scenes are reported on the news, in newspapers, and across the internet. Veterans are haunted daily by the trauma of battles fought decades ago, and thousands of soldiers continue to fight in conflicts around the world. Domestic violence is a reality for

many, and the tragedies of Littleton, Aurora, Columbine, Newtown, and Las Vegas have left an indelible mark on the American soul.

Even the Word of God is filled with violence—it can be found throughout the Hebrew and Christian Testaments. Prophets, priests, and kings are guilty of it; innocent and God-fearing men, women, and children are victims of it and it's often attributed to God. Even our salvation was won through a horrific and violent act. We can't escape or explain violence away. It's a reality.

Our society encourages and celebrates overindulgence. People overeat, overspend, overwork, overachieve, overcommit, overdose, and overreact. It seems a bit like overkill to say this—but if you can name it, you can indulge in it.

Many turn to gun control as a remedy, and maybe there should be stricter government oversight of the availability and use of firearms. But a deeper problem exists, one much greater than uncontrolled access to weapons. The inability to manage powerful emotions and urges—the absence of self-control—can have life-threatening and life-ending consequences. Selfdiscipline and self-restraint are more than indicators of healthy and mature growth and development; they are imperative to saving lives and building and maintaining true and lasting peace.

As a nation, we've got a gun to our head—it's time to get control of ourselves. +
