Family Guide October 17, 2021 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

James and John ask Jesus a question that reveals common human ambitions—to be special, to be recognized, and to have privilege. They want to know if they can be at Jesus' side in the Kingdom. Jesus' response contains a simple and direct prescription for his followers: If you want to be first, you need to serve others. Jesus came to serve, not to be served, and he wants all of us to do the same.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (**Preschool**): Young children love to be first, sometimes pushing to be first in line or crying if somebody else is served first. At the same time, the child usually responds with enthusiasm when asked to serve—by handing out dessert or helping carry something. This week, set aside a few minutes to talk with your child about who is a helper and how he or she can be a helper. For the young child, helping and sharing are doorways to an attitude of service.

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child learned that the people who are first among those who follow Jesus are those who serve others. Talk with your child about who he or she considers important or "first." Then talk about ways that your family can follow Jesus by serving others. Ask your child to tell you the story of "Touchdown!"

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week's class focused on Jesus' call to his followers to be great by serving others. The class also explored ways to keep the Fourth Commandment—honoring one's parents. Ask your child to share with the family the story, "The Rabbit Food Fight." Then take a moment to praise your child for being obedient and helping around the house. Talk about other ways to honor one's parents and to make living together more pleasant.

Venture (Grades 4–6): This week's lesson helped the class recognize the value of using their gifts for others. Your child also learned the importance of making good moral choices when it comes to respecting and serving others. Discuss ways that your family follows Jesus' example of love and service to others. Talk about what personal or family friends show you about God's love. Take some time practicing the skill of searching the Bible that was introduced in class.

Visions (Grades 7–9): In class, your youngster studied the problems migrant families face and discovered how people of faith are serving them. Ask your son or daughter to tell your whole family about how the Kino Teens (named after the missionary Padre Eusebio Kino) help at the U.S.-Mexican border in Arizona. Discuss the importance of serving others as a sign that we are disciples of Jesus Christ. The class also talked about the common good as one of the principles of Catholic social teaching. What does the common good mean for your family?

Pray Together

Have a "newspaper" prayer session. Find two or three articles in the daily paper or stories on television, radio, or internet news that show a need for the service of others. Say a simple prayer for each of those situations. Invite everyone in the family to look for opportunities to be of service during the coming week.

Gospel Table Talk

- Read this Sunday's Gospel (<u>usccb.org/bible/</u> <u>readings/</u>).
- Give each family member a small gift or a piece of candy, but before they have a chance to enjoy or eat them, take them back and put them away.
- Give everyone a simple task which they will all be able to do quickly, such as writing their name on a piece of paper.
- As each person completes his or her task, give back the candy (treasure). Explain that they had to pay a ransom to get their treasure back. Jesus gave his life as a ransom for our sins. What a great price it was!





CREMATION?

While burial or entombment of the body remains the preference and is encouraged by the Church, cremation may be chosen for sufficient reason. The Revised Code of Canon Law states: "The Church earnestly recommends the pious custom of burial be retained; but it does not forbid cremation, unless this is chosen for reasons which are contrary to Christian teaching." (CIC, c. 1176.3)

When is Cremation Allowed? Cremation may be requested for hygienic, economic or other reasons of a public or private nature. Some examples include: transfer of the remains to a distant place, possible avoidance of considerable expense, a severe psychological fear of burial in the ground or in a tomb. The selection of cremation was the specific choice of the individual before death. When requested by the family of the deceased for what also might be determined as an appropriate pastoral reason.

If a body is to be cremated, is it preferable that cremation take place after the Funeral Liturgy?

It is recommended that priority be given to the celebration of the Eucharistic Liturgy with the body of the deceased present.

Can a body be cremated prior to the Funeral Liturgy? What arrangements are different?

In the Diocese of Manchester, it is permitted to celebrate the funeral liturgy in the presence of the cremated remains. The cremated remains are to be accorded the same respect given to the corporeal remains of a human body. This includes the way they are carried, the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and their final disposition. The container in which the cremated remains are placed should be dignified in nature. The cremated remains are to be positioned on a suitable table in the same place where the casket is usually positioned. They may also be placed near the Paschal Candle during the funeral liturgy. The candle and the cremated remains may be placed in the sanctuary so as to be visible to all.

What is required for the proper and reverent disposition of cremated remains?

Cremated remains are to be buried or inurned. They should not be buried on private land, but are to be buried in a cemetery or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground is not permitted. If burial takes place at sea, according to local custom, the cremated remains are to be kept intact in a solid and durable container, and not scattered.

Keeping the cremated remains in a private home, funeral home or any other place is not considered to be the reverent disposition that the Church requires. **The integrity of the cremated remains is always to be respected.** The cremated remains of one deceased person may not be mixed with the cremated remains of another person. It is not permitted to divide the cremated remains and retain, inter or entomb them in more than one place.

It is also not permitted to divide the cremated remains in such a way that they are contained in lockets or jewelry. Any other practice which violates the integrity of the cremated remains and impedes reverent and proper burial/disposition is prohibited. Whenever possible, appropriate memorialization should be utilized at the place of burial.

Consult your cemetery office for all available options for the respectful burial, disposition and memorialization of cremated remains.

This amazing figure is the one who calls you and loves you! Spend time contemplating the beauty and moral integrity of this Jesus and give thanks that he has set his eyes and heart on you. +

Mountaintop Moments

O "Tis good, Lord, to be here!" Text writer Joseph A. Robinson captured what it must have felt like to witness the transfiguration of Jesus. Peter wanted to build a memorial on the site; Luke, in perhaps the first recorded facepalm in history, simply writes, "But he did not know what he was saying" (Luke 9:33).

We're a lot like Peter, really. We catch a glimpse of the glory of God, and it's so overwhelming that we don't know how to process it properly. It doesn't fit into our neat categories: good, bad, happy, sad. All we know, as Robinson wrote, is that we want to "hold the vision bright and make this hill our own."

Mountaintop moments happen when we're pulled out of our ordinary. We encounter them on retreat, at parish missions, and in moments of fundamental transition: birth, death, an earth-shattering diagnosis. God seems closer. Life seems bathed in the glow of new insight. Everything seems so clear. So simple.

Yet we all know the hard part comes later, when it's time to weave new insight into the well-worn routines—even ruts that comprise our daily existence.

Some days we find ourselves exquisitely aware of God's redeeming love. We understand what that means, and we know just what we must do to reflect that love and redemption out into our small corner of the kingdom.

The next day, the glory that seemed



so all-encompassing gets buried by lack of sleep, cranky kids (or spouses, or students, or bosses!)—even shifting hormones.

Small wonder that we, like the disciples, want to build memorials to the great spiritual highlights of our lives. We hope somehow it will help us hold on to that moment of clarity, a snapshot in time when seeing was believing and discipleship required only that we stand still and be present.

Unfortunately, that's not how it works. Insight might happen on the mountaintops, but growth doesn't. Growth happens when insight encounters resistance. If we enshrine our moments in a sterile place, untouched by the messiness of the real world, they will grow stale and impotent.

Mountaintop experiences become powerful when they butt up against the murky valleys of life and shine some of that sublime glory upon the comfortable, familiar darkness. That is why the last stanza of Joseph Robinson's hymn always moves me to tears:

'Tis good, Lord, to be here. Yet we may not remain; But since thou bidst us leave the mount, Come with us to the plain. +



Lord, I am grateful for your gift of humility. Give me a humble heart so that I may imitate your compassionate ways with all people.
