
continue our earthly journey.

The Gospel at Home

This Sunday's Gospel: Mark 12:28b-34

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus gives us his New Law: Love God and love your neighbor. This Great Commandment sums up Jesus' teaching that love is what connects us to God and all other people. It sounds easy, but living the Law of Love takes great effort and prayer. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we can follow Jesus' Great Commandment.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned about the importance of love. He or she also learned many practical ways to show love to God. Invite your child to share some of the ways we show love for God and others. As a family, recite the prayer titled, "My Thank-You Prayer."

Promise (Grades K–1): This week, your child looked at ways that people show love to each other. They learned about Jesus' Great Commandment of loving God and others. Have your child tell you how Saint Katharine Drexel showed love for God and others in her life. Practice the Lord's Prayer using the booklet made during class.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child's class explored what it means to love with all one's heart, mind, and strength. Ask your child to summarize the story of the "Birthday Box Surprise." Brainstorm ways your family shows love for God and others. Then play "The Love Game" on page 4.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your young person looked at rules before studying Jesus' Great Commandment. Invite your child to tell you who the winners were in the story, "Carrying the Trophy Home." Discuss as a family how love binds you to God and to others. Ask your child about the Jewish creed that we hear echoed in the Gospel of Jesus' Great Commandment to love. Hint: Deuteronomy 6:4–5. Discuss how Mexicans celebrate *Día de los Muertos*, or Days of the Dead.

Visions (Grades 7–9): To learn about Jesus' Great Commandment to love God and others, your youngster heard the story of firefighter Vinny Halloran. Talk about how your family can live out the Great Commandment by living like Vinny did, especially as we just passed the 20th anniversary of Sept. 11. Ask your young person how he or she felt about the two scenarios on page 7.

Pray Together

This Sunday's Gospel is about Jesus' Great Commandment to love God and love our neighbor. In giving the Great Commandment, Jesus cites one of Israel's oldest creeds. Read the passage from Deuteronomy 6:4–5. Pray as a family by praising and thanking God. Be sure that each family member has a chance to contribute to the prayer. Keep the prayer in mind as you show God's love to others in your life this week.

Gospel Table Talk

- Read this Sunday's Gospel (<u>usccb.org/bible/readings/</u>).
- Do you think the scribe was expecting Jesus to answer the question about the commandments with so much wisdom and knowledge?
- Take a few moments in silence to ponder how you would complete each of the following statements: "I try to show how much I love God when I ..." and "I think I could try harder to show I love my neighbor by ...".
- Ask family members to share the thoughts that came to their mind about each statement.

Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist

THEOLOGICAL/HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

In 1971 extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist were first permitted in the United States. At that time the Congregation of the Sacraments responded to a request of the American bishops to allow laypersons to assist priests in giving Holy Communion.

In January 1973, Pope Paul VI, in the instruction "Immensae Cariatis," extended this permission to the universal Church. He wrote: "Present-day conditions demand that greater access to Holy Communion should be made possible so that the faithful, by sharing more fully in the fruits of the sacrifice of the Mass, might dedicate themselves more readily and effectively to God and to the good of the Church. First of all, provision must be made lest reception become impossible or difficult owing to a lack of a sufficient number of ministers."

The institution of this ministry responds to the condition in the Church today whereby Catholics are encouraged to share in communion at every Eucharist in which they participate, and under both species, and the large number of persons who are coming forward to partake of the body and blood of Christ.

In any parish, qualified persons who have been nominated for service as extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist must receive mandate from the Diocesan bishop. The pastor forwards the names of the persons to the bishop asking that they be named for service as extraordinary ministers. This requirement distinguishes the extraordinary minister of the Eucharist from other liturgical ministers and emphasizes the extraordinary nature of this ministry.

Extraordinary ministers are commissioned to function within their own parish for a period of three years. The commission expires after three years or if the person moves away from his or her parish. The commission is

renewable by again requesting the endorsement from the bishop. Commissioning should take place during a parish celebration according to the rite provided in the Book of Blessings. The commission may be revoked by the pastor if the individual no longer fulfills the requirements for this ministry established below.

RESPONSIBILITY/PURPOSE

"Extraordinary ministers may distribute Communion at Eucharistic celebrations only when there are no ordained ministers present or when those ordained ministers present at a liturgical celebration are truly unable to distribute Holy Communion. They may also exercise this function at Eucharistic celebrations where there are particularly large numbers of the faithful and which would be excessively prolonged because of an insufficient number of ordained ministers to distribute Holy Communion." (Instruction on Certain Questions Regarding the Collaboration of the Non-Ordained Faithful in the Sacred Ministry of Priests)

Extraordinary ministers are also used in order that the sick or homebound may receive communion with the frequency recommended in the revised rite for the Pastoral Care of the Sick. Any person who regularly takes communion to the sick is to be trained and commissioned. An individual may be commissioned for only this aspect of the ministry or may perform this service within the Eucharistic assembly. To establish the connection between the Sunday assembly and the homebound and sick of the parish, extraordinary ministers ideally are sent from the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist to take communion to them.

SELECTION/DISCERNMENT

Extraordinary ministers are to be fully initiated Catholics (having received Baptism, Eucharist & Confirmation, be at least 16 years of age, and lead lives in harmony with the undertaking of this ministry including participating in the sacramental life of the Church. If married, a Minister must have been married validly in the Catholic Church. The Pastor, Parish staff, and Pastoral Council assist in discerning parishioners to fulfill this ministry.

God's Greatest Commandments

T oday's first reading recalls the most sacred text in Judaism, the Shema Israel: "Hear [O] Israel." These words are so sacred for Jews, they are prayed in the most important moments of peril or supreme holiness. Jews don't take these words lightly because they express the essence of their religion and relationship to God.

As Catholics, we fully agree with our Jewish brothers and sisters on this matter. Jesus himself answered the question of what was the first, greatest commandment—it was the Shema Israel.

Sunday Readings

Deuteronomy 6:2-6

Hear then, Israel, and be careful to observe [the commandments], that it may go well with you and that you may increase greatly.

Hebrews 7:23-28

He, because he remains forever, has a priesthood that does not pass away.

Mark 12:28b-34

[The scribe said to Jesus,] "'To love your neighbor as yourself' is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices."

Why is it so important? Because it declares the unity of God: "The LORD is our God, the LORD alone!" (Deuteronomy 6:4). He is one supreme God, not a multitude of divinities as in the Greek and Roman polytheistic religions, or even today in Hinduism and Buddhism.

This belief in one God makes the monotheistic religions of Judaism and Christianity unique. Second, this supreme God deserves our love and obedience. "You shall love the Lord your God...." Our role as creatures called and saved by him is to offer loving obedience.

The Second Commandment flows from the first: If we love God above all, then we need to love our brothers, sisters, and ourselves.


What better example is there of this love for God and neighbor than the love of a mother for her child? Our love for God should be reverent, tender, compassionate, and unique. Only you can give him your kind of love. There should be a constant flow of affection and union between us—no separation between him and us. +

Winning, Losing for Jesus

Sometime after St. Teresa of Calcutta died, it became known that she had suffered for many years from spiritual darkness. From the mainstream media, I remember getting the impression that her holiness was somehow lessened because of it.

It was more than a decade before I read *Come Be My Light*, a book compilation of her private reflections. When I did, I was struck by her observation that often those who exude the most joy and peace are hiding great suffering. She recognized this truth years before she began to experience the darkness that characterized the rest of her life.

That darkness, when it arrived, was bewildering for someone who had long experienced great tenderness in her relationship with Jesus. The only time she sensed his presence was when she was serving the poor and marginalized. Eventually she came to realize that the overwhelming feeling of being unwanted and unloved by God was what allowed her to share the experience of people she served day in and day out—those who felt that same rejection from the entire world.

The darkness, in other words, helped her love Jesus better. And because she accepted it without complaint, offering it as a sacrifice of love, she was able to exude a joy that attracted even people who had rejected faith.



I'm not so sure most of us would have the spiritual stamina to hold on to faith under a similar challenge, let alone see it bear such abundant fruit. In my case, I'm sure of it.

We're conditioned to expect our faith to give comfort in hard times—and often, it does. During times of spiritual dryness, though, the common truisms—"God won't give you anything you can't handle," "It's all part of God's plan," and so on—feel baldly inadequate. In fact, they can cause us to blame ourselves. Surely our spiritual desert is our own fault. If our faith were stronger, it would go away.

I think Mother Teresa's solution is a better one. We all suffer every day, and the causes range from the trifling to the profound: drivers who seem determined to annoy us; the boss or coworker who persecutes us; the discomfort caused by an aging body; the pain of loss, broken relationships, or depression. All too often, we take our sufferings out on others.

What would happen if, instead, we offered those sufferings to God as an act of love? What would happen if we, like Mother Teresa, learned through our sufferings to empty ourselves so completely that the only thing the world saw in us was the joy of God?

If we did that, we just might change the world. +

The fruits of service and joy can shine forth even in great spiritual dryness.
