#### **WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS**

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten:

If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. During winter time storms and the clean up associated with major snowfall, access to the campuses in Newton and Plaistow will be restricted. Public notification of the closure will be accomplished through the Office of Religious Education and the Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten as in the past; Parishioners need only to look for indications of Timberlane or Sanborn school districts closure to assume that Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish is also closed.

The Parish Office and Liturgical schedule will typically be observed as usual even if school districts post a delay in their opening times.



# The Gospel at Home

#### This Week's Gospel: Luke 3:1-6

In Sunday's Gospel, John the Baptist urges people to prepare the way of the Lord and to make straight his path. Saint John quotes the prophet Isaiah who also states that the mountains and hills will be made low, the winding roads made straight, and the rough ways smooth. The prophet also says that everyone will see the salvation of God. December 8 is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception—a special holy day to celebrate Mary our Mother. And next Sunday, December 12, is the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe—the patroness of the Americas.

#### **Exploring the Gospel Message**

Seeds (Preschool): Your child learned that the world around us is a gift from God. Ask your child to show the family the prayer pocket created in class. During the week, use little slips of paper to add to the pocket other works of God for which your family is especially grateful. Take time to look at what's in the pocket and talk about God's gifts.

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child's lesson this week is all about preparing for the coming of the Lord. Check out your child's selfie drawing with John the Baptist from the cover of Promise for the week. Ask your child how he or she is preparing his or her heart for Jesus. Share how you are doing the same thing this Advent. Ask your child to tell you the story of Our Lady of Guadalupe, too.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week your child learned how the Old Testament—its events and characters—prepared for the coming of the Messiah. The class heard the promises God made to Noah, Moses, Sarah and

Abraham, and David. They learned, too, the words of John the Baptist echoing the prophet Isaiah asking people to prepare the way of the Lord. Talk about the road your family is taking to prepare for Christmas this year.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your child's class learned the role of prophets who preached about God's faithful love. The class also played a game called, "Advent Is a Journey to Christmas." Play together as a family. Talk about ways your family can be more focused on the coming of Jesus. Ask your child to share with the family the comic page that tells the story of Saint Nicholas.

Visions (Grades 7–8): In class this week, your youngster continued the journey to Christmas by listening to the message of the prophets. The class also discussed ways to respond to John the Baptist's call to turn to God and clear a path for the coming of the Savior. Ask your son or daughter to share with the family the story, "Surfers Make the Way Smooth." How can your family help smooth the way for others?

#### **Pray Together**

To celebrate the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, add the praying of the Hail Mary to your Advent Wreath prayer this week. As a reminder, place a statue or picture of Mary near your wreath.

# Anointing of the Sick I: The Mystery of Illness

We get hurt. We wear out. The lungs, the eyes, the memory, and any of the many limbs and organs that compose us break or ache. Gloom comes over us then: pity for ourselves, sorrow, depression, anger. But hope can come, too, and courage, and sometimes peace.

All of this is marked and celebrated in the rites of our tradition. With a word and a deed, with touch and breath and spit and mud, Jesus heals those who ail. In every place and time, we who are the church remember and tell stories of healing, anoint the sick with oil and share the one bread even with those who cannot assemble for Mass. Thus the sick and the healthy, the homebound and the spry, saints and sinners are made one and remain one, a single body of many parts.

Anyone who is seriously ill can receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, including the elderly who become weaker, even if no illness is present; those waiting for surgery when a serious condition is the reason for the operation; sick children who have sufficient use of reason to be helped by the celebration; and those who are unconscious or who have lost the use of reason, provided that they probably would have asked for the sacrament had they the use of their faculties. Furthermore, many forms of mental illness are now known to be serious. So the mentally ill may be anointed, provided that they will be helped and not harmed by the rite. If you have questions, consult a priest or other parish leader.

The most complete celebration of the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is a communal one, a celebration in which those to be anointed are surrounded and supported by other members of the Christian community, whether at home, or in the house of the church (for those who can leave their beds and come here). In song and in silence, with scriptures and prayers, we strengthen the bonds of love and faith that are stronger than the most lethal disease and more powerful even than death.

# The Time Is Right

Saint Luke loves to be precise in his Gospel, so he documents the exact time and place of the appearance of John the Baptist, the precursor to Jesus. Tiberius was the second emperor of Rome, and the fifteenth year of his reign corresponds to AD 27. Pontius Pilate was prefect from the years 26 to 36. Herod Antipas, son of Herod the Great, ruled in Galilee until his death in the year 39 and is the Herod who had John the Baptist beheaded. On the Jewish side, Caiaphas was high priest, and his influential father—in—law Annas was considered a leader of Jewish religious life.

Jerusalem, take off your robe of mourning and misery; put on forever the splendor of glory from God.

#### Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11

Discern what is of value, so that you may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ.

He went throughout [the] whole region of the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

These historical dates align with Luke's explanation, as well as other events described in his Gospel. Ours is a faith based on real people and events. No doubt there is a great appreciation for the supernatural in our faith, but it is never against nature, just beyond it.


Jesus praised John the Baptist (see Matthew 11:2-9) for his strong will and dedication. Humility, austerity, courage, and a spirit of prayer are also a large part of the testimony John left us. In the Vatican painting, Virgin and Child Surrounded by Saints, the artist Marco Palmezzano dresses John the Baptist in the martyr's red and camel skin to accent his supreme virtue. So dedicated and heroic was he in his fulfillment of the mission entrusted to him, Jesus acclaimed "among those born of women there has been none greater" (Matthew 11:11). "He was a burning and shining lamp" (John 5:35) to illuminate the path toward the true light who was coming into the world. Once that divine light arrived, John receded into the shadows. +

# Keeping Christ in Christianity

I f only Christmas came when all the stores were less crowded! 'Tis the season for banners, billboards, and bumper stickers to remind us to avoid commercialism and "Keep Christ in Christmas." What if there was also a perennial campaign to keep Christ in Christianity? Is Christ's gospel message easily recognizable all year long in those of us who call ourselves

Christian?

In Flannery O'Connor's novel *Wise Blood*, a street evangelist preaches his own gospel from his so-called Church Without Christ. But is truth stranger than O'Connor's fiction when Christian televangelists preach a "prosperity" gospel that claims God rewards true believers with material wealth? How does one reconcile such a gospel with Christ's humble birth in a stable?

Moreover, how is such a gospel consistent with the heart of Christ's preaching—the Beatitudes? "The Beatitudes confront us with decisive choices concerning earthly goods; they purify our hearts in order to teach us to love God above all things" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1728).

"Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven," Jesus says concerning the poor in spirit and the pure of heart; the meek, merciful, and mournful; the righteous and those persecuted for their righteousness; the peacemakers and those who are reviled because of their belief in him (see Matthew 5:3–12).



"The Beatitudes reveal the goal of human existence, the ultimate end of human acts: God calls us to his own beatitude" (CCC 1719). This beatitude "teaches us that true happiness is not found in riches or well-being, in human fame or power, or in any human achievement...but in God alone" (1723). According to John Henry Cardinal Newman, "All bow down before wealth. Wealth is that to which [most] men pay an instinctive homage....resulting from a profound faith...that with wealth he may do all things."

Because of Christ's total obedience to the Father, our reward is everlasting, unlike material wealth: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life" (John 3:16). "The beatitude of eternal life is a gratuitous gift of God" (*CCC* 1727). For this treasure, all bow down and. Pay instinctive homage! The reward for true believers is not earthly prosperity but heavenly posterity!

Mark Twain said, "If you pick up a starving dog and make him prosperous, he will not bite you. This is the principal difference between a dog and a man." Feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, visiting the sick and imprisoned, assisting the poor—and expecting no reward—together comprise the fundamental difference between keeping Christ in Christianity and belonging to a Church Without Christ. +
