

COME, O COME....

Yes, you read the title right. That's "O" - the letter of the alphabet that most reminds us of breakfast cereal, inner tubes, doughnuts, hula hoops, no hitters... and Advent. In many parishes, "O" is the first word said in the new church year. We sing it in Advent's most popular song, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." It announces the season which anticipates the coming of Christ at Christmas.

This hymn, which is almost synonymous with the whole season of Advent was first composed and sung to announce that Advent was ending. The last eight days of Advent (beginning on December 17 and ending on December 24) form a little season all by themselves. As the church prepares to celebrate the nativity of Christ, the Liturgy gets more intense. At daily Mass, the Gospels relate the events leading up to the first Christmas. At evening prayer, the Church prays a special series of antiphons that beckon the Messiah to come. Each night gives him a new name, drawn from the Old Testament tradition. "O Wisdom," "O Sacred Lord," "O Flower of Jesse's Stem," "O Key of David," "O Radiant Dawn," "O King of All Nations," and, on Christmas eve, the greatest of them all, "O Emmanuel," a name that means "God is with us."

For the reasons which will be immediately obvious, we call that group of refrains the "O Antiphons." They are a hallmark of late Advent, and a collection of music our church has treasured for centuries. The Mass now includes a version of them as the alleluia verses for the same eight days before Christmas.



In the Middle Ages, those seven antiphons got strung together into a popular hymn. The last one became verse one and "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" was born. Thus, the antiphon originally established for the last evening before Christmas Eve is now often sung to begin Advent. That "O" of course, simply tells us that we're talking to someone. It is like saying, "Hey, you," only more politely. But "O" reminds us of much more. It makes us think of something having no beginning and no end, like God's love or an Advent wreath. It resembles the shape of our mouth and the sound we make when we face a mystery we cannot fully comprehend.

O come, Thou **Wisdom** from on high, Who orders all things mightily; To us the path of knowledge show, And teach us in her ways to go.

O come, Thou **Rod of Jesse**, free Thine own from Satan's tyranny; From depths of hell Thy people save, And give them victory over the grave.

O come, Thou **Day-spring**, come and cheer Our spirits by Thine advent here; O Disperse the gloomy clouds of night, And death's dark shadows put to flight.

O come, Thou **Key of David**, come, And open wide our heavenly home; Make safe the way that leads on high, And close the path to misery. O come, great **Lord of might**, Who to Thy tribes on Sinai's height In ancient times once gave the law In cloud and majesty and awe.

O come, Thou **Root of Jesse's tree**, An ensign of Thy people be; Before Thee rulers silent fall; All peoples on Thy mercy call.

O come, **Desire of nations**, bind In one the hearts of all mankind; Bid Thou our sad divisions cease, And be Thyself our King of Peace.

O come, O come, **Emmanuel**, And ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here Until the Son of God appear.





CHRISTMAS IS COMING!!! Or hadn't you heard?......

With the Christmas holiday feast upon us, a few planning reminders for the "big day..."

Please note that the last opportunity for the **Sacrament of Reconciliation** before Christmas is Sunday, December 19 following 6 PM Evening Prayer at Newton.

The Parish Office will be closed at noon December 23 and on December 24, 27, and 31. Parish Offices will re-open for business on Monday, January 3 at 8:30 am.

The Liturgies for the **Solemnity of Christmas** are on **Friday, December 24** at **4:00 PM in Plaistow** and at **6:30 PM in Newton**. On **Saturday, December 25**, Christmas Day, we will celebrate Liturgy at **9:00 am in Newton**. Christmas is a Solemnity and is <u>always</u> a holy day of obligation for all Catholics. Please note that there is no 4 PM Liturgy on December 25, nor is there public Evening Prayer.

Liturgies for the Feast of the Holy Family on Sunday, December 26 are at 8 am in Newton and 10 am in Plaistow. Evening Prayer on December 26 is at 6 PM in Newton. There is no celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation on December 26.

The Octave Day of Christmas and the Solemnity of Mary, Θεοτόκος - the Mother of God - a holy day of obligation — will be celebrated at a Vigil Liturgy at Plaistow at 4:00 PM on Friday, December 31, and on Saturday, January 1 at 9:00 am in Newton.

January 2 is the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. We will follow our usual Sunday Liturgy schedule, 4 PM on January 1 at Plaistow, on January 2 at 8 am in Newton and 10 am in Plaistow, and we will gather for Evening Prayer at 6:00 PM in Newton. There is no celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation on that evening.



January 9 is the **Feast of the Baptism of the Lord**. We will follow our usual Sunday Liturgy schedule, and we will gather to sing Christmas Evening Prayer at 6:00 PM in Newton. There is no celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation on that evening.



The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 1:39-45

In Sunday's Gospel, Mary visits her cousin Elizabeth. The two of them demonstrate just how to trust God's word and to rejoice in God's blessings. They both praise God, and Elizabeth gives us the words that are central to the Hail Mary—"Blessed is the fruit of your womb." The mystery of the Incarnation—God taking on human flesh by the Virgin Mary—is the great sign of divine care for us all.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child decorated a Christmas tree with pictures of some of the characters and creatures from the Christmas story. Ask your child to tell you about each of the ornaments on his or her tree. If you decorate a tree this week, be sure to invite your child to help you. It is a good opportunity to talk about Christmas and its meaning for your family.

Promise (Grades K–1): During this week's lesson, the class shared the joy people feel when a favorite relative visits or when a new baby arrives. Ask your child to share with the family the story "Welcome Home, Donnie." Your child will also be happy to share with the family the story of Mary and Elizabeth. He or she can use the picture that was colored. A code from class shows where some of the words for the Hail Mary were first spoken.

Good News (Grades 2–3): During this week's class, your child played a game that dramatizes the journey to Bethlehem. Ask your child to teach the family how to play the game and play it together. Talk about all the people and information in the squares of the game board. Ask your child to tell the family about Saint Francis and the first Christmas crib scene.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Christmas is almost here! Your youngster learned about ways to live and to share the spirit of Christmas. They learned about the custom of Los Posadas (the inns) and how that public celebration spreads the good news of Jesus' coming into the world. What customs does your family or nationality have that help you celebrate the true meaning of Christmas? Let your child share with the family the Scriptural sources for the Hail Mary—based on the angel's greeting to Mary and Elizabeth's welcome when Mary came visiting. From the lesson, look at the story of Saint Stephen together.

Visions (Grades 7–8): This week, your youngster learned that Mary's visit to Elizabeth showed her generous response to God's call as well as her trust in God. Talk together about the family's need for trust and how each member can grow in trust. The readings throughout Advent have been filled with God's promises. A sign of Christmas spirit is trust in those promises. Read together Mary's beautiful response to God's action in her life—the Magnificat (Luke 1:46–55).

Pray Together

One Christmas carol is perfect for the last few days before Christmas—"O Come, O Come Emmanuel." The song contains all the longing, hope, and trust in God's Promise the season provides. G od is often present in the little, hidden things of life. Take for example the small town of Bethlehem. This place barely appeared on the maps of the time. Yet in this dull town, overlooked by all, God wished to be born. God isn't into bling.

Look at the Vatican painting *Annunciation* by Gentile da Fabriano. A ray of light in the painting shines from the upper left window directly down onto Mary's womb. She carries in her the Light of the World, but it happened in a way unbeknownst to anyone. He is

There is a second aspect of the Incarnation to learn here. Christmas was about a real sacrifice. Mary and Jesus offered their very selves. Hebrews says it wasn't an animal or a wheat offering but Jesus' very body and blood. The same for Mary, as it was her life, her virginity, her very intimacy, that she was opening to God when she agreed to be the mother of the Lord. It's easy to be generous when it doesn't touch too close to home.



Let Us Kneel

7e were all packed onto a busy East Harlem street corner when a Puerto Rican man rushed into traffic, catching the attention of all who were waiting to cross. When he reached the other side of a sea of trucks and cars, he knelt down right there in the street at the feet of an old woman pushing a grocery cart. Leaning on her cart, she stood over him and made the sign of the cross on his forehead, shoulders, and chest. Then, holding her crossed fingers up reverently, the man kissed them. He knelt for a blessing from his godmother in the street, a common gesture for children and young people in Latin American countries, but a grand expression for a grown man.

The part of the Good Friday service most people dread is the Universal Prayer. As we pray for everyone in ten different petitions, the deacon or cantor calls out, "Let us kneel....Let us stand." It's tedious and painful for some knees, and tiring to many, so some priests invite people to either remain standing or be seated. Maybe it's because sinking to our knees is too awkward or strange. Some don't like to kneel. I've visited churches where the kneelers have been removed. What might that mean? In prayer, kneeling is an act of adoration and supplication, but it's also a sign of powerlessness and defeat; it can be seen as a way to show humility in a physical way.



A woman told me her mother used to make her kneel on uncooked rice as a form of punishment for backtalking, disobedience, or lying. A common sight in the oft-crowded Mexican sanctuary of Our Lady of Guadalupe is the procession of pilgrims walking on their knees in penance for themselves or loved ones. Remember the horrific scenes of people positioned on their knees before ISIS executioners just moments before they met an untimely death? There's a lot that can bring us to our knees—penance, prayer, punishment, and protest. Kneeling is a powerful statement. It took the publicized kneeling of a pro football player to get us to notice.

Many are offended by those who kneel during the national anthem.

Why? Is it to admit that our nation has been brought to its knees by terrorism and a pandemic; by racism and police brutality; by Harvey, Irma, and Maria; by a killer in Las Vegas; by a broken immigration system; by bipartisan paralysis and self-serving politicians? Much has proven to be beyond our power and ability to change. We've been humbled and humiliated, and the icon of our powerlessness is represented by an NFL player kneeling on the field of play.

When you kneel in church next time, pray that America can rise above the hate. The rhetoric. The prejudice. Let us kneel. +
