# **Communion Call**

As early as the year 150, the martyr Justin, in writing an explanation of Christian worship to the Roman authorities, described the Sunday Eucharist pretty much as we celebrate it today. At the end of the description, he notes that ministers take the eucharist from the Sunday assembly to those who were unable to be present.

Perhaps these included people who were in prison for living according to the Gospel, and those whose work (Sunday was a work day back then) kept them

away. But almost certainly he meant the sick and the infirm, and those who were otherwise homebound. This is our ancient tradition: to love and cherish and to keep connected with those members of this community who cannot be with us on Sunday.

When illness or infirmity keeps you from the Sunday assembly, Special Ministers of Communion will bring a word of scripture and the body of Christ to you. The best time for this is Sunday, when the minister can come straight from the celebration of Mass. But other times can be arranged. Don't worry about fasting before receiving communion: If you are able to, that's fine. But because of your condition, you are not obligated.

The rite of communion for the sick is simple. It can be very brief if you are not feeling up to more. But normally, it consists of some opening prayers and readings (similar to those at Mass). If you are able, you then offer some prayers for the world and the church. Your family, friends and caregivers can (and should!) participate in the rite. If they would normally receive communion at Mass, then they can share in communion at this time, too. Before and after this simple, powerful rite of communion, you can visit with the minister or not, depending on how you feel.

Sick or infirm, homebound or hospitalized, each baptized person is nonetheless part of this parish, a member of the body of Christ. So don't be afraid that you're being a burden, and don't think that we're so busy we wouldn't have time for you. Regularly sharing in communion is an important part of our life together as the church.

# The Gospel at Home

# This Week's Gospels: Luke 2:1-14 and Matthew 2:1-12

Christmas celebrates God's becoming one of us and one with us. Jesus comes as an infant, placed in the care of a struggling but loving family. The Feast of the Epiphany, a word that means "manifestation," celebrates how Jesus was revealed as far more than the king of the Jews. He is revealed as God's Son. Matthew's story of the visit of the Magi from the East makes it clear that Jesus came to all people who seek God.

#### **Exploring the Gospel Message**

**Seeds** (Preschool): Your young child is happy because Christmas is finally here. The cover of their lesson for the week is a picture of the whole Nativity story. Display the picture where everyone can see it. Take time to let your young child tell the story to the whole family.


**Promise** (Grades K–1): Christmas has arrived. Use this week's lesson booklet to connect the classroom with your home. Have your child show you the picture drawn of baby Jesus in the manger on page 1. Your youngster also learned about the Magi and helped them find their way through a maze puzzle. Ask your child what message can we all share at Christmas. Sing "Silent Night" together—or some other familiar carol.

**Good News** (Grades 2–3): The lesson booklet your child brings home this week contains a simple and beautiful rendering of the Christmas story. Before one of the family meals during the Christmas feast, take time as a family to share the story together. Talk together about why the incarnation is so important to Christians and how your family can honor Jesus as the Magi did. **Venture** (Grades 4–6): Because Christmas can be busy and even a bit stressful, it may be difficult to find time to share as a family. Make an extra effort to talk about the Christmas story as a family. Your youngster also spent some time in class looking ahead to 2022. How can your family make the new year one filled with little "epiphanies" that help you learn more about your faith and help you share your faith with others?

**Visions** (Grades 7–8): This week in class, your son or daughter studied all the feasts that are part of the celebration of Christmas. Ask him or her to share with the family what these feasts are. The Epiphany feast celebrates Jesus' revealing himself to all nations as a Savior for all people. Talk together about the journey of the Magi, and why it is such an important part of the Christmas narrative. Ask your young person to share the picture of the Magi by the Chinese artist He Qi (Woo Chee). Talk about how the artist gives a clear vision of the event.

#### **Pray Together**

Pick one of the feast days during the season to attend Mass together as a family. Use the opportunity to pay a visit to the manger scene at your parish church and pray together in your own words that God will help you always trust in his promises and care for those in need. In that way your family will keep the Christmas spirit alive all year long.

Programs used through the years include 2005 Safe and Sound All Around, Circles of Care, and Netsmartz. 2006 Safe Environment Office of the diocese is established to assist parishes and schools in implementing safe environment policies and procedures. Training of adults moves to an online format. Programs used through the years include Not on My 2011 Watch, Shield the Vulnerable, and Safe Haven by Catholic Mutual Group. Diocese begins to emphasize appropriate boundaries as a means of prevention. Develops lessons, 2015 workshops, and materials for parents and adults in ministry.

### Today by the Numbers: **Working Together**

It takes many people working together to maintain strong safe environment programs. At any given time, there are more than 4,000 employees and volunteers working with minors in our parishes, schools, and camps. In addition to our pastors, principals, and camp directors, the following people are instrumental in working to ensure the safety of children and youth in our diocese:

- More than 100 Safe Environment Coordinators
- 7 Diocesan Review Board members
- 2 trained investigators
- 1 Victim Assistance & Pastoral Care Coordinator
- 1 Delegate for Ministerial Conduct
- 3 Safe Environment Office Staff

### Lessons Learned

- 1. Victims of abuse often take years to come forward
- 2. Training everyone who works around minors helps to prevent abuse
- 3. Conducting initial screening serves as a deterrent to those who wish to harm minors
- 4. One of the most helpful things we can do for victims is to listen
- 5. Healthy relationships are fostered when adults model good boundaries
- 6. Working together we can prevent abuse from happening
- 7. Healing is possible



His royal hall is the hillside, his scepter a baby finger, his royal family is Joseph and Mary.

These Gentile kings were the first to do what all of creation and all of history have been doing since then—bending their knee to the King of the Universe. Herod was right to worry. +

# The Richness of God's Vision

A s a child, my sisters and I used to pray this prayer every night: "I love you, Jesus, Infant Jesus, meek and mild; make me a good, obedient child."

The word *obedience* rubs most modern audiences the wrong way. We tend to associate it with a lack of critical thinking—with the creation of blind, unquestioning automatons. If we don't understand why we believe what we believe, our faith has no foundation. We risk being derailed by the slightest challenge.

It's true that an unquestioned faith is an immature faith. On the other hand, not everything can be understood. What are the words "thy will be done" if not an acknowledgment that forces are at work beyond our comprehension? "Thy will be done" is our assent—our prayer of obedience. By living through the things we don't understand, we often gain wisdom and insight illuminating what once seemed incomprehensible.

I think about myself during the first few years of my marriage. We had followed the rules and never questioned the Church's teachings on sexuality. We were doing everything "right," and yet we could not conceive. Yes, there were medical issues, but they weren't severe enough to explain why God "allowed" the frustration of the desire he had placed within us to continue. Obedience left a bad taste in our mouths.

We spent several thousand dollars to adopt, only to be further delayed by



international politics. We prayed, we grieved, we wrestled with the words "thy will be done." Only when we reached the top of the waiting list did we conceive at last.

It didn't make sense. Why would God put us through so much if he intended all along to give us biological children?

When our second child was born, finally, everything fell into place. She has Down syndrome. And the reality is that no matter what we said in public, neither of us were truly open to parenting a child with a disability. But we had spent seven years learning to accept God's will for us. We had continued to be faithful and, yes, obedient, even when it didn't make sense. All that suffering prepared us to accept and even embrace a different future than we had envisioned for our family. That vision, it turns out, is richer than ours ever was. We understand God and Christian discipleship in a way we never would have otherwise.

Obedience shouldn't be blind. We can and should wrestle with difficult questions, just as Jacob wrestled with the angel. Still, not everything has to make sense. Our job is to follow, even though we can't always see where we're going... yet. +
