It is about prayer! Today we begin with prayer as our 2022 Lenten Journey program gets underway. Begin to pray in an active way about the upcoming Lenten season. Ask for the Spirit's guidance as you consider your involvement; pray that our Parish's Lenten Journey through the desert be blessed.

Consider a small group! Groups meet during Lent to discuss the upcoming Lenten Sunday Readings, and to share member's experiences of discipleship. We will use a text that follows the Sunday Lenten readings published by the Office of Catechetical Ministry of the Diocese of Victoria, TX. Adults, Families and Youth will learn more about Scripture, participate in interesting discussions, meet some wonderful people, and have the opportunity to build up the Body of Christ.

What else? During Lent, special *Paschal Mission* inserts in the weekly bulletin will focus on the Lenten Scriptures and on discipleship in the real world. Sunday Homilies will touch on living Jesus' Gospel and on the questions discussed at Group meetings.

Family Guide January 30, 2022 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 4:21-30

The Gospel for this Sunday is a summary of Luke's whole Gospel. Jesus tells the Good News of God's favor and kindness toward all people. But Jesus' message is rejected because he is just the son of a carpenter. Everyone faces rejection at one time or another. Children can be deeply hurt by rejection. The lesson of today's Gospel is to avoid rejecting others or prejudging them.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (**Preschool**): Your child learned that when Jesus told Good News about himself, not everyone listened. Your child learned that to listen is a way to show love and respect. Have your child show you the words he or she learned in sign language. Be especially attentive to what your young child has to offer.

Promise (Grades K–1): In class, your child learned that when we have problems, we can help each other make it better. Talk together as a family about how it feels to have a problem. Talk, too, about how to settle arguments and disagreements—ways to make difficult situations better. Ask your child to tell your family about the Forgiveness Prayer from this week's lesson.

Good News (Grades 2–3): The class learned to appreciate the people who believe in them. They recognized why some people didn't believe in Jesus. The class also talked about ways to show that they believe in Jesus. Ask your child to share the "I Believe in Jesus" booklet with the family. Then talk about ways your family shows that you believe in Jesus and his Good News. **Venture** (Grades 4–6): Your youngster's class learned how the people of Jesus' hometown rejected him. Have a family examination of conscience to see what evidence there is in your household of prejudice or the rejection of others. Your child also learned about the role of prophets. Ask your child to share what he or she learned about Saint Maximilian Kolbe. Also, your child can explain how to play the Accept and Reject Game. Talk about other times when your family members felt rejected and accepted.

Visions (Grades 7–8): This week's Gospel showed the class that Jesus' own friends and neighbors rejected his teaching. They also learned about the true meaning of love from 1 Corinthians 13:4–7. Read that passage and talk about it together. The class also talked about how to confront one's own prejudices. Talk about any prejudices your family might have. Ask your youngster to tell the family about World Day of the Sick. Talk about ways you can care for those who are sick.

Pray Together

When you complete your conversation about the week's Gospel lesson, gather in a comfortable spot in your home. Let each person in the family ask in his or her own words for God's help in accepting people and not rejecting them. Pray for people who feel rejected, alone, or afraid.





Developing the Strength of a Prophet

T he consoling words from the prophet Jeremiah give comfort to all of us. God told him that he, like each of us, was known even in his mother's womb. It was the knowledge of being known and loved that gave Jeremiah the strength to stand before his people and prophesy some very strong and harsh words. He was set as a strong pillar, a wall of brass, a fortified city. He was rooted in love, because he needed to be so as not to be crushed by the anger and


Jesus faces the same ire when visiting his hometown. At first the Nazarenes praise him, but soon, as if they had some entitlement, they presumptuously demand that he perform miracles to satisfy their vanity—not to change their hearts. When Jesus challenges them, their response is to want to throw him off a cliff!

As Christians, we all have a prophetic mission. We're called to preach the truths of the gospel, and at times this isn't popular. In the public square, the Church and Christians are often praised for their charitable work but asked to silence their religious voice when morality is discussed. We need the strength and conviction of prophets as well as the love that drives them. +

We Need a Real Open-Door Policy

S everal years ago, my hometown of Columbia, MO, was rocked by racial protests. We even made the national news. It was hard for me to judge who was "right" and who was "wrong." The issues seemed too complex and nuanced.

So, I found it very disturbing when some people dismissed the protesters out of hand. I had never really thought through what "white privilege" meant. Nor had I, until then, ever examined my conscience for unintended bias in my worldview.

Guess what? I found it—a lot of it. We tend to view the world through the lens of our own experiences. We assume that the realities that define our worldview are the same ones that define everyone else's, even though a look at the news every night tells us that isn't the reality. Most of us surround ourselves with people who look and think like us, and gradually we forget to empathize with those whose experiences are much different.

Christians have historically been separated not only by denomination but by skin color and, later, by style of worship. This isn't as big a problem among Catholics because in smaller towns there's often only one parish. We have no option but to worship together.

Still, the issues that get the most attention in Catholic liturgical circles focus on white European concerns: How much Latin is enough? How much



is too much? Is the organ really more conducive to communal song than piano and guitar? Are hymns better than styles influenced by popular music?

The American Church is beautifully diverse: Latino, African American, African immigrant, Filipino, Vietnamese, Korean. Frequently, though, our worship doesn't reflect that richness. How often do we include the languages, voices, and music of nonwhite cultures in our liturgies?

In the civic sphere, it's common to hear people argue that those who come to America should assimilate, but that view has no place in the Church. We are called to be a neighbor. To do so means to honor and accept, to welcome and support. Isn't it possible that if races and cultures were more open to each other inside the church doors, it might spill out onto the streets as well?

I often ponder this: Despite a largely Eurocentric worship, the power of what we celebrate attracts people from many races and cultures. If we open our hearts and our worship to the beauty that they have to offer us, how many more might enter into the faith? +
