

WHO ARE THE MEN OF ST. JOSEPH?





SPECIAL MINISTER OF THE EUCHARIST

The primary mission of the St. Luke the Evangelist Special Ministers of the Eucharist is to assist at Liturgy in distributing the Body and Blood of Christ to the faithful. Additionally, Eucharistic Ministers may bring Communion to the sick and homebound.

To serve as a Eucharistic Minister one must be at least 16 years old and a Confirmed, practicing Catholic. If married, a Minister must have been married in the Church as required by Church Law. Applicants for this ministry must be approved by the Pastor.

This role in the Church is different from other volunteer opportunities because it requires a mandate (or permission) from the Diocesan Bishop in order to function as a Special Minister in a particular community. With such a special status come requirements. The Diocese of Manchester asks that Special Ministers receive formation and training as to the theology of the Eucharist and their specific roles as ministers in their respective parishes.

Family Guide February 20, 2022 7th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 6:27-38

Jesus continues his teaching following the Beatitudes. He tells us to love our enemies, pray for those who hurt us, and give of ourselves to anyone who asks. We learn the great Golden Rule: Do to others as you would have them do to you. Offer a prayer of praise as we cannot hear these words often enough.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (**Preschool**): This week, your child learned that Jesus simply wants us to love and forgive others. Ask your child how he or she shares, exercises, learns, pretends, helps, laughs, and plays with others. Share with your child your own ideas on how to do these things.

Promise (Grades K–1): Jesus taught us to be kind. Your child learned about the Golden Rule to treat others as we want to be treated. Ask your child about times this week when he or she was kind to others. Share when you felt someone was kind to you. Accept your child's Kindness Coupons with love. Thank the Lord for your child, so they can hear your love for them.

Good News (Grades 2–3): What is the hard thing that Jesus asks us to do? Your child talked about such things during class this week. Ask your child why Brendan Groehl's story was a good one for this week's lesson on kindness. Talk about the class activity to make the four story problems better or worse. **Venture** (Grades 4–6): Talk with your child about where he or she sees injustice in the world. Ask your child why the story of Fannie Lou Hamer was a good one for this week's lesson on justice. Have a family discussion on why it is so contrary to society to love our enemies as Jesus taught. Pray for people who have hurt you or who oppress others in the world. Pray, too, that your family remains loving to everyone.

Visions (Grades 7–8): How were Medgar and Myrlie Evers able to learn not to hate people who hurt them? Your youngster read the sad story of Medgar Evers this week. Pray that people have learned from Medgar's sacrifice. Pray, too, that we can learn to love our enemies as Jesus taught. Discuss how peace begins with each of us, and how far that peace might go if we are successful. Play a round of the "Push, Pass, or Peace" game from this week's lesson.

Pray Together

Pray that you and your family can be instruments of peace in the world. Be sure to mention this idea during mealtime or other daily prayers. Pray for the Holy Spirit to give us the strength to be kind when others are not, and to seek forgiveness when we fail to do so.

GLUTEN INTOLERANT?

PARISH POLICY ON GROUPS SEEKING SUPPORT

After consultation with the Parish Pastoral Council, and taking into account the many groups that desire the community's support, it has been decided that the following policy be put into place:

- 1. Only Parish groups will be allowed to solicit support for their projects in our churches. This includes groups from within the Parish itself or groups which are based within our Parish.
- 2. Groups from outside the Parish community will be allowed to solicit support from the community *only by rare exception* and with the express consent of the Pastor and Parish Council.
- 3. No group of any kind will be allowed to solicit until the conclusion of the Liturgy. Publicity and other materials may be displayed in the entrances of the Church, but no actual solicitation may occur until after Mass has ended.
- 4. No more than one (1) Parish group may seek the support of the community at one time. This means that there are not to be multiple support efforts on the same weekend.

The Pastor will be the sole arbitrator of scheduling for Parish groups seeking community support. Parish groups should contact the Parish Office to determine availability for scheduling any support event. Thank you for your continuing support for the mission of St. Luke the Evangelist Parish.



Our Souls as Journals

"Why am I still here?"

The question wasn't existential; it had to do with location. I was a twenty-twoyear-old student in the seminary who posed the question to myself in a journal after the news that two classmates were departing the school.

Decades later, I stumbled upon this journal. While it contains a fair amount of honesty and soul-searching, it unravels few mysteries of the human condition. (The publishers of Anne Frank's insightful diary have nothing to worry about!)

Writing helps give meaning to our experiences. It's quest for self-discovery and a search for answers in life. This discovery—seldom revealed in tweets and texts—is more likely found in ancient art forms like letter writing, journaling, and more extensive versions of creative written expression.

Shelby Foote, American historian and novelist, once told his author friend Walker Percy that many people have the mistaken notion that writers know what they want to say and say it. Foote said that if he knew what he wanted to say, he wouldn't write at all. He said writers seek and find answers in the telling of a story in all forms of writing, during which they explore themselves and find clues to reality.

It has been said that a person who writes thinks twice. Perhaps, then, the person who writes reflectively prays



twice. Some people keep a travelogue on pilgrimages and imagine what it's like to trace their hallowed steps with Christ or an apostle at their side. Others who write about painful episodes in their past imagine what it's like to relive the situation in the Lord's company. Still others insert themselves into a biblical scene with Christ and write about that experience. For instance, a writer friend of mine imagines what it's like to be the mother in the Prodigal Son story. How did she react to her wayward son's return?

Recall the beginning and ending of John's Gospel: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1); "There are...many other things that Jesus did, but if these were to be described individually, I do not think the whole world would contain the books that would be written" (John 21:25). I think we're those books! Christ reveals himself in our search for meaning through his word and in the ways that we become living testaments to the Logos.

Benjamin Franklin's self-written epitaph offers cleverly crafted insights to the human condition when our final chapter approaches:

The Body of Ben Franklin, Printer, Like the Cover of an old book, Its contents worn out and Stript of its Lettering & Gilding, Lies here, food for the worms,

yet the work shall not be Lost; for it will, as he believes, appear once more

In a new & more beautifull Edition, Corrected & amended by the Author. +
