#### **COVID UPDATE**



# **WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS**

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn Kindergarten: regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses. In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.



# **LENTEN REGULATIONS**

# **FASTING**

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned

meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

# **ABSTINENCE**

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

# EASTER PRECEPT

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist. Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

# PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING


All the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praiseworthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.

# Lenten Prayer and Liturgy

The Church invites all people to special moments of prayer during the season of Lent. It is a common custom for people to make room in their schedule for daily Eucharist, which we celebrate as follows during the Lenten season:

Monday	8 am	Newton
Tuesday	8 am	<b>Plaistow</b>
Wednesday	6:30 PM	<b>Plaistow</b>
Thursday	8 am	Newton

Another Lenten custom involves taking a journey... to the Holy Land! Going on pilgrimage has always been an important part of our Christian tradition. By visiting a place where a religious event occurred, a pilgrim hoped to share in the experience associated with that place. The desire to visit Jerusalem and




Praying the Stations of the cross

the Holy Land was very important to Christians long ago, but because of the danger and expense of travel, and the political climate of Palestine, such a journey was not always feasible. When the Friars of the Franciscan Order took over the care of the Holy Places in Jerusalem in 1342, they began to erect "Stations" in Churches back home in Europe. It was a way to "go" to the Holy Land without ever leaving home. The custom of the Stations quickly spread to parish Churches, and the devotion of the Stations of the Cross was born.

We walk the **Stations of the Cross each Friday of Lent at 6:30 at NEWTON** Using various versions and forms of the Stations, and led by various groups in the Parish, we make Jesus' journey to the Cross our own.

# **Baptismal Font and Holy Water Font**

During Lent, we pray and prepare to renew our own Baptismal promises even as we pray as a community for those to be Baptized. Following ancient custom, the Sacrament of Baptism is not ordinarily celebrated during Lent, and the Baptismal Font itself is sealed. We also "fast" from the Baptismal water usually present at the doors of the Church. The entire Church waits with Jesus in the desert, praying for the Living Waters of Easter.



# Lenten Space, Silence, & Music

During Lent, the Church's lighting is dimmed so as to encourage an atmosphere of prayer and introspection. Our Assembly's music is more meditative and somber.

We leave at the end of Mass in silence.

reflecting on our mission as Disciples to pray, fast, and to give of ourselves in the coming week.



# **Archdiocese of Boston Eucharistic Congress**

Saturday, June 18, 2022 8:30 AM - 6:00 PM TSONGAS CENTER, LOWELL, MA

Cardinal Sean O'Malley invites all the Catholic faithful in the Archdiocese of Boston and surrounding dioceses to join him in closing the Year of the Eucharist with a day-long **Eucharistic Congress**, **Jesus is Here**.

A core tenet of the Catholic faith is that the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ is made truly present in the Eucharist. But belief in the True Presence has waned in recent years, even among Catholics. And that's a concern—because as Cardinal Sean teaches, "It is in the Eucharist where we find our true identity." Jesus is Here is an opportunity for us to deepen our understanding of the mystery of Jesus' presence with us—by listening to powerful talks on the Eucharist, by receiving Jesus in the Eucharist at Mass, and by adoring Him in a time of adoration and worship.

# The Gospel at Home

# This Week's Gospel: Luke 13:1-9

When people told Jesus about a group of Galileans killed by Pilate, he told the people that unless they repent, they will all likewise perish. To help them understand, he tells them a parable about giving a fig tree more time to grow fruit. If not, the tree would be cut down. Jesus teaches that God gives us every opportunity to grow closer to him.

# **Exploring the Gospel Message**

Seeds (Preschool): The class this week learned that Jesus wants us to grow. Your child explored how plants and animals grow. Talk about how your child has grown already. Share a story from when you were young that will show how you grew up. How does your family help plants and pets grow around your home? Reflect on how we can grow closer to God.

Promise (Grades K–1): Ask your child to answer the question: What helps us grow? This week, the class also answered the question: Who gets a second chance? Your child can share the story about a first-grade teacher who brought her baby to meet her students. Take a walk around your neighborhood and make a note of all the things that are growing. Say a prayer of thanks for all the living things that grow around us.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Who gets a second chance? That was the question explored in the *Good News* class this week. Ask your child to share the story about brother and sister, Martin and Maria. Why did the animals ask for a second chance? Ask your child how God is like a gardener. If they need help look at the Gospel reading again. Be sure to talk about reconciliation and why it is so important. Talk as a family about how the Sacrament of Reconciliation works. Thank the Lord for giving us the sacrament and for granting us second chances.

**Venture** (Grades 4–6): Where is the land where Moses walked? Your child's class talked about how God spoke to Moses in the desert. In the Gospel reading this week, Jesus explains in a parable that there is time to change. Discuss the parable with your youngster. Ask, too, why Sam was sorry and whether Brigida forgave Sam in this week's story. The class also studied the Lord's Prayer. Consider adding it to daily prayer times. Ask, too, what Saint Paul did during his lifetime.

Visions (Grades 7–9): The class considered six situations where someone may deserve a second chance. Ask how your youngster decided each of them. Talk about times when you've had a second chance, and how much that meant. Find out the name of the Superhero from a story in class. How does the Superhero save the day? Jesus wants us to turn our hearts to him. Discuss how we need to keep trying because he never gives up on us. What is the name of this kind of change of heart? Your youngster should know. Finally, ask what is the name of God that is shared with Moses. How does that make sense?

# **Pray Together**

Lent is a great time to incorporate the Rosary into prayer time if you don't already do that. Start at the crucifix by making the Sign of the Cross. Pray the Apostle's Creed, then the Lord's Prayer first, then three Hail Marys on the next three beads. The fifth bead is the Glory Be to the Father. Then there are sets of ten beads with one in between each set. You recite one Lord's Prayer, ten Hail Marys, and one Glory Be. At the same time, recall one of the four sets of five mysteries from Jesus life. There are the Joyful, Luminous, Sorrowful, and Glorious mysteries.



# Anointing of the Sick Celebrating the Sacrament

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is a celebration in which those who are seriously ill or infirm are surrounded and supported by other members of the Christian community, whether at home or in the house of the church (for those who can leave their beds and come here). In song and in silence, with scriptures and prayers, we strengthen the bonds of love and faith that are stronger than the most lethal disease and more powerful even than death. The sacrament may be celebrated in the context of a Mass, or on its own, depending on the needs of the person who is sick.

The celebration opens with brief introductory rites that help us remember that God is with us and that we are the body of Christ. Then follows a liturgy of the word, in which we hear scriptures that shed light on the meaning of sickness and suffering and the

compassion of our God, who suffers with us. Depending on the needs of the person who is sick, one brief passage or two or three readings and a psalm may be used.

Then the rite continues. The gathered church surrounds the person who is sick with the prayer of faith. In response to God's word, a litany is prayed. Then, the priest does the laying on of hands, an ancient sign of the moving of the Holy Spirit to heal and save. Others may join in this ancient prayer gesture. This is done in silence. Then a prayer is said over the oil of the sick. Finally, the priest anoints the head and the hands, and sometimes other parts of the body (the feet, for example, or the part of the body that is in pain) of the one who is sick. While anointing the sick person's head, the priest says "Through this holy anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit." And all answer "Amen!" While anointing the hands, the priest says, "May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up." And again, all answer "Amen!" If other parts of the body are anointed, no words are said. A final prayer is then said.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist, or simply the giving of communion, may follow. Or the rite ends with a blessing. If you or someone you know needs the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick anointing, please call the Parish Office at 603 382 8324.

# Appreciating God's Patience

So here we learn that with this revelation of God comes a responsibility. He unveils his mysterious face, but he also desires a loving response and for us to witness about him to others.

Saint Paul makes it clear that God eventually ran out of patience with the Chosen People in the desert. After freeing the Israelites from Egypt with signs and wonders, giving them his law, and feeding them in the desert, they complained against him. Like the fig tree in the Gospel, he gave them ample time and multiple encores of his love and mercy. Yet eventually, his love took the form of tough love—forty years of desert wanderings.



# A Glorious Celebration!

A sk most Catholics about Lent and they'll tell you it lasts forty days. It starts on Ash Wednesday. They'll tell you it's a time to intensify our prayer, fasting, and good works. Some will say it's a time for repentance and reconciliation. There's no meat on Fridays, so the local Knights of Columbus fish fry is popular. It's the time allotted to prepare for Easter. It's about sacrifice....Lent is certainly about all of this, but there's something more, especially when it comes to the RCIA.

Looking for a different take on Lent? Tune in to your parish's RCIA program. In 1972, with the promulgation of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, Lent was resituated in the context of the catechumenal process, reconnecting it to the hard work of getting ready to accept the faith and learning to live it well. Catechumens and candidates journey through a process that embodies catechesis and accompaniment, preparation for the Easter sacraments and encouragement for living daily the mysteries of our Catholic faith.

This Lent, pay attention to and take part in the experience of three moments that are integral to the process of becoming a Catholic Christian through the RCIA: election, scrutinies, and the reception of sacraments. Long before the first Sunday of Lent and the rite of election, the catechumens have been preparing, studying, sharing, and living the faith they long to fully embrace.



They have undergone a conversion and have a clear understanding of what it means to be a follower of Christ. So, they are invited to present their names for enrollment and are called to the Easter sacraments by the local ordinary. It's a dramatic moment that takes place at a cathedral or other convenient location. At the rite of election, we witness the power of God's action in people's lives as so many come forward for enrollment. The catechumens are now called *elect*. The three Sundays of Lent set aside for the scrutinies call the elect to deeper conversion. At a parish Mass, with Scripture reflections on the Samaritan woman, the man born blind, and Lazarus as the backdrop, the elect are

invited to experience what it means to be delivered from sin and its effects.

Washed in baptism, anointed in confirmation, and fed in Eucharist, all in the paschal light of the Easter Vigil, the elect become members of God's family in the Church. This is one of the most glorious celebrations within the Church!

Talk with your pastor or parish's RCIA/faith formation coordinator to find out when these events will take place and how you might prepare for and participate in them. Spending the forty days of Lent with your parish's RCIA members who are on the path to become purified and sanctified can be life-changing, for them and for you. +

One way to grow in faith during these forty days is to take part in your parish's RCIA process.
