

WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn Kindergarten: regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses. In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.







LENTEN REGULATIONS

FASTING

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

ABSTINENCE

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

EASTER PRECEPT

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist. Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All of the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praise worthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

The Parable of the Forgiving Father is one of the most well-known from Jesus. The son does not earn the love of his father. Instead love is what the father gives. God's love and forgiveness are freely given to help us grow close to him. No matter how lost we become, the Lord will find us.

Exploring the Gospel Message

God is our forgiving Father. Your son or daughter can show you the path to find Jesus as he welcomes us home. Have your child tell you how we share happiness. Have the family discuss how you all share happiness with others. Pray that the Lord will grant you all a happy life.

Promise (Grades K–1): God is our forgiving Father. What story do the pictures on the front of this week's *Promise* booklet tell? Have your child tell the Parable of the Forgiving Father using the pictures from this week's *Promise*. Talk about the many ways that God forgives us.

Good News (Grades 2–3): This week, your child's class talked about how to forgive others. Have your child tell you what happened in the story titled, "Ella Leaves Home." He or she should also know what a parable is. The Parable of the Forgiving Father is a good example from this week's Gospel. Talk about the story with your child. This week's lesson included the story of the Exodus when God freed his People from slavery. Ask your child how love and forgiveness factor into the parable and the Exodus story?

Venture (Grades 4–6): Have your child point out some of the places on the cover map in the land where Joshua walked, especially Gilgal. Which ending did your youngster choose for the lesson story? Have he or she explain the choice. Talk about what the Parable of the Forgiving Father teaches us about forgiveness. For Lent, this week's lesson explores the Lord's Prayer. Be sure to add it to family prayer this week.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Ask your young person about the choices he or she made on the What Can I Forgive survey? Why does the mother get so upset in the story titled, "My Brother Part II"? Talk about what this week's Gospel says about the Lord's forgiveness. Allow time at home this week for an examination of conscience in preparation for the times we seek forgiveness. Consider holding the Forgiveness Prayer Service at home. Pray that your family will forgive each other as God forgives us. Find out when your parish celebrates the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation and plan to take part.

Pray Together

In this fourth week of Lent, forgiveness is the theme as presented in the Parable of the Forgiving Father. Add prayers of forgiveness to family prayer, and plan to take part in the celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation if possible. It is important to practice the forgiveness we pray for.



Communion Call

As early as the year 150, the martyr Justin, in writing an explanation of Christian worship to the Roman authorities, described the Sunday Eucharist pretty much as we celebrate it today. At the end of the description, he notes that ministers take the eucharist from the Sunday assembly to those who were unable to be present.

Perhaps these included people who were in prison for living according to the Gospel, and those whose work (Sunday was a work day back then) kept them

away. But almost certainly he meant the sick and the infirm, and those who were otherwise homebound. This is our ancient tradition: to love and cherish and to keep connected with those members of this community who cannot be with us on Sunday.

When illness or infirmity keeps you from the Sunday assembly, Special Ministers of Communion will bring a word of scripture and the body of Christ to you. The best time for this is Sunday, when the minister can come straight from the celebration of Mass. But other times can be arranged. Don't worry about fasting before receiving communion: If you are able to, that's fine. But because of your condition, you are not obligated.

The rite of communion for the sick is simple. It can be very brief if you are not feeling up to more. But normally, it consists of some opening prayers and readings (similar to those at Mass). If you are able, you then offer some prayers for the world and the church. Your family, friends and caregivers can (and should!) participate in the rite. If they would normally receive communion at Mass, then they can share in communion at this time, too. Before and after this simple, powerful rite of communion, you can visit with the minister or not, depending on how you feel.

Sick or infirm, homebound or hospitalized, each baptized person is nonetheless part of this parish, a member of the body of Christ. So don't be afraid that you're being a burden, and don't think that we're so busy we wouldn't have time for you. Regularly sharing in communion is an important part of our life together as the church.

Living, Loving in the Here and Now

I t is good that we are here—joined in community for Sunday worship, here, in this moment of prayer.

Our lives are so hectic and fast-paced that it's often hard to enjoy just being in the present moment with God. It's not just the pressure of work, but the added responsibilities of home. You know the routine...getting the kids to school; getting to work on time; leaving from work; running a few errands; preparing dinner; going back out to pick up the kids from practice; then back home for



onfession time. In my twenty-six years of living, I have never, ever been able to successfully give up something I love for the entirety of Lent.
