

The Paschal Triduum

The Church's holiest days begin with the Liturgy of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, April 14 at 6:30 PM in Newton. At Mass that evening, the holy oils blessed earlier that week by Bishop Peter will be presented to the Parish, Jesus' call to service

and humility is remembered through washing of feet, and the institution of the Eucharist by Jesus at the Last supper is celebrated. Adoration and prayer with the Eucharist will go on that night in church until Night Prayer at 9:00 PM.

Throughout the Triduum, the Church is in almost constant prayer. The **Liturgy of the Hours** will be celebrated beginning on Holy Thursday at 8 am and Noon at Newton. Night prayer will be at 9 PM. The same schedule for Morning and Mid-Day prayer will be kept on Good Friday and Holy Saturday at Plaistow.



The Passion and death of Jesus on the cross is celebrated on Good Friday, April 15. Stations of the Cross will be prayed at 3:00 PM in Newton, and the principal celebration of the day, the Reading of John's Passion, the Veneration of the Cross and Holy Communion will be celebrated at 6:30 PM at Plaistow.

On Holy Saturday, the Church waits in prayer at the Lord's tomb. No Masses are allowed, no sacraments other than communion for the dying are celebrated. We wait for announcement of Easter victory. Morning prayer will be celebrated at Plaistow at 8 am, and Mid-Day prayer at Noon.



The *Great Vigil of Easter* will begin at 8 PM on Saturday, April 16 with the blessing of new fire and the lighting of the Paschal Candle, the principle symbol of the Easter Season. We will then listen to our story of salvation, proclaimed through readings and song. We will proclaim the Easter Gospel and renew our Baptismal Promises. We will then celebrate the solemn Eucharist of Easter.

The Great Vigil of Easter begins from the Parish Hall, where we'll process to the blessing of the new fire, burning just outside the doors of the Church. If you plan on attending the Great Vigil on April 11, plan on gathering in the Hall for <u>7:50 PM</u> on Holy Saturday evening.





SPECIAL MINISTER OF THE EUCHARIST

The primary mission of the St. Luke the Evangelist Special Ministers of the Eucharist is to assist at Liturgy in distributing the Body and Blood of Christ to the faithful. Additionally, Eucharistic Ministers may bring Communion to the sick and homebound.

To serve as a Eucharistic Minister one must be at least 16 years old and a Confirmed, practicing Catholic. If married, a Minister must have been married in the Church as required by Church Law. Applicants for this ministry must be approved by the Pastor.

This role in the Church is different from other volunteer opportunities because it requires a mandate (or permission) from the Diocesan Bishop in order to function as a Special Minister in a particular community. With such a special status come requirements. The Diocese of Manchester asks that Special Ministers receive formation and training as to the theology of the Eucharist and their specific roles as ministers in their respective parishes.

READER

Readers proclaim the Word of God at Liturgy. They also offer the Prayer of the Faithful at weekend Liturgies. A good public speaking voice and attention to the nuances of the Scriptures are needed to be a good Reader. Adults and youth age 14 and up are welcome to serve as Readers. New Readers receive a short training session to review current guidelines and procedures before serving at their first Liturgy. Readers are provided with an annual workbook to help them understand the readings in historical / spiritual / liturgical context.

Readers share the Word of God at weekend Liturgy or weekday Liturgy. Readers are also needed to help at funerals (weekdays and Saturday mornings)

Family Guide April 3, 2022 5th Sunday of Lent

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 8:1-11

In this Sunday's Gospel, teachers of the Law try to trap Jesus into defending a woman caught in adultery thereby breaking the Law. The crowd was prepared to stone the woman. Jesus foils the attempt by suggesting that anyone without sin can cast the first stone. He then refuses to condemn the woman and encourages her to change and grow by not sinning.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (**Preschool**): Your child can understand the blame the woman in the Gospel takes. No child likes to be blamed. This week's lesson showed your child that Jesus is not interested in who is to blame, but in who is growing. Talk about ways your family can stop the blame game and give problem situations a positive spin. Remember that young children respond to encouragement more quickly than to blame.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week your child learned the need to take responsibility for their actions. Ask your child to share the story of the "Glue Mess" with the family. He or she can share the pictures, too. Then talk together about the story "Jesus Doesn't Blame". Talk about ways your family can show forgiveness to one another.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned a variety of ways people need to forgive and to ask forgiveness, and they discovered Jesus' merciful love. Talk about ways the members of your family show mercy to one another. Talk, too, about why it is better to show mercy and forgiveness than it is to try to blame people. Discuss which virtues each member of your family possesses. **Venture** (Grades 4–6): In this week's class, your youngster learned that Jesus forgives rather than condemns. Talk together about ways your family can show mercy and forgiveness to one another. Talk about what it feels like to need forgiveness and to offer forgiveness to others. The class also examined the ABCs of Lent. Choose a letter and have your youngster share the corresponding paragraph. Make sure everyone in your family recognizes that during Mass there are times when we admit our sinfulness and seek forgiveness. If there is time, play a round or two of the Blame Game from this week's lesson.


Visions (Grades 7–9): Your young person discussed the destruction that blame can bring. They also read the play, "Can You Hear ME Now?" It features Jesus. Ask what your youngster learned from the cast of characters. Jesus refuses to condemn the woman from the Gospel story. Talk about how he forgives us today and always supports us. Discuss how God shows his mercy to your family. What kind of music did your youngster list among the three favorite songs? Be sure to ask who are The Priests from the lesson. Call up a video from online to hear what The Priests sound like.

Pray Together

Prayer gives us the kind of divine intervention that can achieve great things, including the power of forgiveness and mercy. During prayer this week, be sure to look inward and become aware of ways we can forgive ourselves and others as God has done for us. Is there a person who needs forgiveness? Pray for that person and follow the prompting of the Holy Spirit to dispense necessary mercy.



Medicine for the Soul

W hy should we receive the sacrament of reconciliation? Almost every Catholic has to answer this question at some point. Many people don't understand why Catholics must confess their sins to a priest, and many people believe we need to only acknowledge our sins to God.

So how do we answer this important question? Perhaps the place to begin is with an understanding of the damage done by sin. Every sin damages our relationship with God. If the sin is venial, we've damaged the relationship, but it is not broken. If the sin is mortal, we've broken it. Sin also damages our relationship with the Church. To some degree, we've violated truths the Church holds, and our communion with our brothers and sisters in Christ is weakened—or perhaps broken, depending on the sin. Finally, sin damages our relationship with humanity. Sinning hurts our fellow human beings and ourselves.

If we're to apologize and attempt to change our behavior, who deserves to receive that apology? We owe an apology to God, everyone in the Church, and every human being. These are the relationships that need to be healed. Yet this would be next to impossible.

This is where the priest comes in. A priest is a mediator between God and his people. By his ordination, he is God's representative or ambassador on earth. The Church gives him the power



to speak on its behalf, and he represents humanity before God. In a special way, a priest has the faculty to speak on behalf of all the parties who deserve an apology. So, the priest receives our confession on behalf of God, the Church, and all of humanity.

But the priest goes beyond accepting the apology. He helps us fulfill the requirement of contrition. Contrition exceeds an apology. It's a desire not to repeat the offense. This may be difficult, so we always ask for God's grace to avoid sin. But even hearts that don't want to sin need help knowing how to avoid it. Thus, the priest offers advice and a penance. Penance is like medicine for the soul. If we understand the purpose of penance, we begin a practice that can help us avoid a particular sin. While the penance may be specific, the idea is that we've at least started on the right path to avoid sin, and now we may freely choose to continue on that path. Finally, Christ forgives our sins through the priest and doesn't hold us guilty.
