END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. *Three Beliefs* explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. *Three Beliefs* contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.

Copies of *Three Beliefs* are available at the church entrance.







SPECIAL MINISTER OF THE EUCHARIST

The primary mission of the St. Luke the Evangelist Special Ministers of the Eucharist is to assist at Liturgy in distributing the Body and Blood of Christ to the faithful. Additionally, Eucharistic Ministers may bring Communion to the sick and homebound.

To serve as a Eucharistic Minister one must be at least 16 years old and a Confirmed, practicing Catholic. If married, a Minister must have been married in the Church as required by Church Law. Applicants for this ministry must be approved by the Pastor.

This role in the Church is different from other volunteer opportunities because it requires a mandate (or permission) from the Diocesan Bishop in order to function as a Special Minister in a particular community. With such a special status come requirements. The Diocese of Manchester asks that Special Ministers receive formation and training as to the theology of the Eucharist and their specific roles as ministers in their respective parishes.

Family Guide October 2, 2022 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 17:5-10

In Sunday's Gospel, Jesus' disciples ask him to increase their faith. Jesus uses the example of a mustard seed to tell them that even a little bit of faith is powerful. Faith in Jesus gives the power to perform miracles and to recognize those we witness.

In Jesus' time, masters didn't sit down to eat with servants or reward them for doing their jobs. Jesus used this reality to make a point. His parable is critical of disciples who want to become masters of their fate or to lord it over others. Service is the ordinary duty of all Jesus' followers.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child has learned to recognize the growth he or she sees all around. The lesson also taught that we can all trust Jesus. Talk with your child about the story of the tiny seed. Ask to see your child's "I'm growing inside and out" booklet, and let the child explain the booklet to you. Consider taking a walk to see what things are growing in your neighborhood.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week's lesson centered on the trust children have in people they know and love. The lesson also showed that we can all trust Jesus. Ask your child to tell you the story of the tiny seed in the Gospel story. Ask your child why Layna needed to trust people on her first day of school. Encourage your child to show you the four images of people he or she can trust. Let him or her tell you why these people were chosen. **Good News** (Grades 2–3): This lesson focused on recognizing signs of faith in God. Ask your child what lesson Abby learned by taking part in the play. Tell him or her what it was like when God gave your child the gift of faith at Baptism. Ask your child to tell you what a Creed is. Brainstorm with your child ideas of how your family faith can grow like the mustard seed.

Venture (Grades 4–6): A discussion of faith is at the heart of this week's session. Discuss how your young person felt while reading the story titled, "From Soldier to Saint." Use this opportunity to talk about what faith is like for your family. Discuss what do you do as a family to nourish the "mustard seed" of faith and make it grow? What more could you do? Work together to write a statement of faith for your family. Ask your youngster to tell you why Saint Mary MacKillop is the Patroness of Australia.

Visions (Grades 7–9): This week your young person discussed the importance of faith and believing. The class performed a skit titled, "Francis, Knight for God." Talk with your youngster about the faith activity and interview that he or she did during class. Share what faith means to you and to your family. Talk about the ways we use the word *faith*—knowing, thinking, and trusting. Discuss which of these ways best describes faith in God.

Pray Together

After your conversation, sit quietly for a moment. Then let each member of the family ask God in his or her own words to help the family grow in faith.







Anointing of the Sick Celebrating the Sacrament

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is a celebration in which those who are seriously ill or infirm are surrounded and supported by other members of the Christian community, whether at home or in the house of the church (for those who can leave their beds and come here). In song and in silence, with scriptures and prayers, we strengthen the bonds of love and faith that are stronger than the most lethal disease and more powerful even than death. The sacrament may be celebrated in the context of a Mass, or on its own, depending on the needs of the person who is sick.

The celebration opens with brief introductory rites that help us remember that God is with us and that we are the body of Christ. Then follows a liturgy of the word, in which we hear scriptures that shed light on the meaning of sickness and suffering and the

compassion of our God, who suffers with us. Depending on the needs of the person who is sick, one brief passage or two or three readings and a psalm may be used.

Then the rite continues. The gathered church surrounds the person who is sick with the prayer of faith. In response to God's word, a litany is prayed. Then, the priest does the laying on of hands, an ancient sign of the moving of the Holy Spirit to heal and save. Others may join in this ancient prayer gesture. This is done in silence. Then a prayer is said over the oil of the sick. Finally, the priest anoints the head and the hands, and sometimes other parts of the body (the feet, for example, or the part of the body that is in pain) of the one who is sick. While anointing the sick person's head, the priest says "Through this holy anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit." And all answer "Amen!" While anointing the hands, the priest says, "May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up." And again, all answer "Amen!" If other parts of the body are anointed, no words are said. A final prayer is then said.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist, or simply the giving of communion, may follow. Or the rite ends with a blessing. If you or someone you know needs the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick anointing, please call the Parish Office at 603 382 8324.

W hat's the difference between a believer and an atheist? What separates one who is indifferent to religion from a religious person? Faith! To believe is no small thing and a huge gift. "Father, you're lucky you have faith!" an atheist friend once told me. "I have tried, but I can't believe."

We believers are indeed lucky, because having faith in Jesus opens us up to heaven, to life after death, to finding hope and meaning in suffering. Faith allows us to trust

Faith and acceptance is the difference between interior harmony and frustration.

All Lives Are Sacred, Even the Guilty Ones

ctober is Respect Life Month. What does it mean to be prolife? Some people would move heaven and earth to convince a desperate, frightened mother not to kill her unborn baby but would not consider trying to convince a court to spare the life of a convicted murderer. The reasoning goes something like this: An unborn child is innocent; a convicted murderer is guilty. But aren't we missing a key teaching of the Catholic faith? Each life may not be innocent, but each life is sacred (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2258).

During his 1999 visit to St. Louis, Pope John Paul II called for us to be pro-life in *all* issues, including the death penalty, which he called "cruel and unnecessary." And in 2018, in a letter to the bishops of the Church, Pope Francis explained his approval of the revision of the *Catechism*: "The death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person."

Yet when I speak against the death penalty, someone inevitably asks, "But what if someone in your family were murdered? How would you feel then?" In the heat of the moment, my personal and emotional response would probably be to get revenge.

But the death penalty is not the



emotional, personal, or impulsive response of a distraught victim; it's the measured and calculated response of the state. The state doesn't lose its temper; the state doesn't act on impulse. The state is supposed to embody the ideal, to represent the best of us. Granted, the state has the responsibility to protect its citizens and maintain peace, but it is possible to separate dangerous people from the rest of the population without putting them to death. And in some cases, science and faith make it possible for us to transform their hearts and give them the hope of rehabilitation and redemption.

Maybe if we could protect the guilty, defense of the innocent would follow. After all, even a murderer was once an unborn child. Does life cease to be sacred once we're born? Does sin erase the fact that God created that life and sent his Son to redeem that person? Didn't Jesus die for that person's sins as well?

God said, "I am the LORD your God....You shall not kill" (Exodus 20:2a, 13). We quickly added exceptions (see Exodus 21—22). But Jesus proclaimed if we are angry with others, we "will be liable to judgment" (Matthew 5:22).

For our words to have validity when we speak in defense of the unborn, we must speak in defense of all life. +

But what if someone in your family is murdered?



Gracious God, enlighten our minds and open our hearts so we may humbly receive the message of your truth. We pray in Jesus' name. Amen.
