THE BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD

Throughout November, a special Book of the Names of the Dead will be open near the Baptismal Font & Paschal Candle for parishioners to record the names of the faithful departed. It is a visible sign that the faithful departed remain with us as part of the Church. You are welcome to record names of loved ones and the dates of their death.



END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. Three Beliefs explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. Three Beliefs contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.

Copies of *Three Beliefs* are available at the church entrance.

CREMATION AND THE CHURCH

On October 25, 2016, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith published a new instruction on the burial of the dead and on the conservation of the ashes in cases of cremation. The instruction reiterated the longheld view that the Church is not opposed to the practice of cremation, though it continues to recommend that the bodies of the deceased be buried in cemeteries or other sacred places. However, the new document insists that ashes should not be kept in private homes, and that the scattering of ashes in the air, on land, or at sea is not permitted. The instruction also insisted that cremains may not be divided among various family members, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry, or other objects.



ALL SOULS INTENTIONS

The month of November is a time when the Church traditionally prays in a special way for the faithful departed. The celebration of All Souls Day on November 2 is a joyful and poignant reminder that we worship and live in communion with those who have gone before us in faith.

All Souls envelopes are available at the entrance of both Churches. Any intentions listed on the envelopes will be remembered at Liturgies offered as "All Souls Intentions" throughout the coming liturgical year. All Souls envelopes can be deposited in the regular collection basket at your convenience.

The Holy Liturgy can be offered for any deceased Catholic person. Please contact the Parish Office at 603-382-8324 to inquire about scheduling. Exact dates cannot always be accommodated, so calling early for the coming year is advised. The suggested donation for an announced commemoration is \$10.00 payable to Saint Luke Parish.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospels: Luke 19:1-10

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus enters the life and home of Zacchaeus. Although Zacchaeus' neighbors see him as an outsider, Jesus knows him to be a human being deserving of love and dignity. Zacchaeus' story reminds us that all people are worthy of God's love. We imitate Jesus by opening up our lives to people in the community, and the wider world, and to those who may be hungry or feel isolated.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child has learned about one of Jesus' friends, named Zacchaeus. Friends are very important to children, and this week's lesson is all about friendship. Ask your child to tell you the story of Zacchaeus in his or her own words. Talk about family friends and how important they are to you. Look together at the meal table activity your child has made and discuss how friends share meals together.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week, your child shared experiences of friendship in class and learned that Jesus wants to be friends with all people. Ask your child to use the picture page to tell you the story of Zacchaeus. Because your child prayed the Our Father in class this week, be sure to say that prayer together at least once a day.

Good News (Grades 2–3): The story of Zacchaeus helped your child recognize the value of friendship. Talk about how Zacchaeus felt when Jesus invited himself to the tax collector's house for dinner. Ask your child to show you the Mass booklet the class put together. Talk about the two parts of the Mass—the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Share how your family can show friendship to others.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your youngster has learned that Jesus invites all people to his table. Ask your young person to share some of his or her favorite meal stories from the Gospel of Luke with your family. Have your son or daughter recount some of the things they learned about homelessness from the interview they read in class. Review the story of Zacchaeus and discuss how your family can grow to be more like Jesus. Ask your youngster why Saint Martin de Porres is so important to the people of Peru.

Visions (Grades 7–9): This week's lesson uses the story of Jesus and Zacchaeus to explain the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The moments in their meeting are parallel to the four steps in the Sacrament—invitation, confession, satisfaction, and forgiveness, or absolution. Share how important the Sacrament of Reconciliation is for your family. Talk about ways you can make frequent Confession part of your family's routine. Take a moment to ask forgiveness from one another, too.

Pray Together

This Sunday falls right before the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls. As a family, take a few moments to talk about your favorite saints and loved ones in Heaven. Then thank God for the witness of these saints and loved ones. You can make your own Litany of the Saints by having each family member in turn say the name of a saint and all can answer: "Pray for us!"

cannot be so consumed with our plans that we miss opportunities to attend to those on our path.

Zacchaeus was a public sinner, a publican, a man among the hated tax collectors and collaborators of the Romans. Rather than a person to visit he was, for the Jews, someone to be shunned. Not for Jesus! He came to seek and save the lost. And Zacchaeus wanted to be found. He was so driven to see Jesus, he made himself look ridiculous by climbing a tree, admitting to his short stature and curiosity.



O, When the Saints...

D o teachers in Catholic elementary schools still invite children to come to school on Halloween dressed as their favorite saint or Bible character? They did in my children's school. My youngest once chose Zacchaeus—an easy choice for this shortest boy in the class.

Kids like this story we hear in today's Gospel. Zacchaeus is easy to picture: a short guy so eager to see Jesus that he climbs a tree. He's the "chief tax collector," which means he's good at his job—collecting taxes from the Jews to pay the Romans. And he's wealthy, which means he's been skimming off the top. That's how tax collectors made their living—they were not paid a salary but instead kept whatever they could collect above what was owed. So he was probably not a real popular fellow, either. Imagine when it's time to pay your taxes if, instead of an impersonal form to fill out, there is an actual person knocking on your door and holding out a hand for your money. And because taxes have always been confusing, and no one knows what they really owe, you would have to give Zacchaeus whatever he told you to pay. No, he would not have been well-liked.

Zacchaeus wanted to see Jesus, but what happened is that Jesus saw him.



Really saw him: a lonely man; a rich man who isn't too proud to climb a tree; curious and eager; a man ready for conversion. Jesus does not ignore him as others do but invites himself to dinner. Maybe that's something else children like about this story: we all long to be noticed, to be seen not only as we are, but especially as we long to be.

This simple act of Jesus prompts the well-off Zacchaeus to become generous. And that's another thing we like about the Zacchaeus story—the quick finish. He hears the message of Jesus and applies it to himself immediately.

Isn't that the difference between

most of us and the great saints? Most of us hear the gospel truth about being poor in spirit and loving one another and taking up our cross and that camel/needle thing and we respond, "OK, sounds good...you go first." Not Zacchaeus and not those who get to use the title "Saint" before their name; those whose lives we celebrate this week on All Saints' Day. If we want to live in the company of the saints, then we had best be about applying the gospel truth to our own lives... immediately. +

The story of Zacchaeus the repentant tax collector is the story of the salvific mission of Jesus.



Merciful God, help us to be like Zacchaeus, who was eager to know Jesus; and like Jesus, who noticed those whom others shunned. We pray in Jesus' name. Amen.
