ALL SOULS INTENTIONS

The month of November is a time when the Church traditionally prays in a special way for the faithful departed. The celebration of All Souls Day on November 2 is a joyful and poignant reminder that we worship and live in communion with those who have gone before us in faith.

All Souls envelopes are available at the entrance of both Churches. Any intentions listed on the envelopes will be remembered at Liturgies offered as "All Souls Intentions" throughout the coming liturgical year. All Souls envelopes can be deposited in the regular collection basket at your convenience.

The Holy Liturgy can be offered for any deceased Catholic person. Please contact the Parish Office at 603-382-8324 to inquire about scheduling. Exact dates cannot always be accommodated, so calling early for the coming year is advised. The suggested donation for an announced commemoration is \$10.00 payable to Saint Luke Parish.

THE BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD

Throughout November, a special Book of the Names of the Dead will be open near the Baptismal Font & Paschal Candle for parishioners to record the names of the faithful departed. It is a visible sign that the faithful departed remain with us as part of the Church. You are welcome to record names of loved ones and the dates of their death.

END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. Three Beliefs explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. Three Beliefs contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.

Copies of *Three Beliefs* are available at the church entrance.

WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry, and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten: If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.



The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 21:5-19

Jews connected the very spirit of their faith to the Temple with its incense-filled, prayerful inner courts and its shaded outer courts where people met and talked. They celebrated their holy days at the Temple; it was the center of their faith community. But Jesus' assessment of the times in this Sunday's Gospel proved accurate. The Jews' rebellion against Roman occupation that began in A.D. 66 ended in the destruction of the Temple in A.D. 70 by the Roman forces. When Jesus predicts the destruction of the Temple to his disciples in Sunday's Gospel, they are shocked. Jesus both scares and assures his listeners, past and present. He explains that wars, disasters, and persecutions will continue. He assures us that we can endure these and other troubles. He promises to put words in our mouths so no one can put us down. He promises to be with us always.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): The language of this Sunday's Gospel is frightening for small children, so talk about how much God loves all Creation. As the family looks forward to Thanksgiving, talk with your young child about all the good gifts God gives, especially the sun, the soil, and the seeds that grow the food we eat. This is a good time to establish the habit of a prayer before meals.

Promise (Grades K–1): This Sunday's Gospel is a difficult one for children, and so in class, children shared stories of their fears and worries. You may want to ask your child what he or she worries about. Stress that Jesus tells us not to be afraid because he is with us. Have your child tell you the story, "Lost in the Mall." Make a plan with your child so you both know what to do if he or she becomes lost like Jessica. The class learned and practiced the Our Father in class. Consider adding this prayer taught by Jesus into family prayers this week.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Although this Sunday's Gospel speaks of the end of the world, the class learned about the wonderful world God creates with love. Ask your child to show you the Creation Spiral he or she completed in class. Discuss some of the ways that your child learned to care for the world, and brainstorm others that your family can do. Jesus asks us not to worry when there are bad things happening in the world. Talk with your child about concerns he or she has for the world. Discuss how you deal with problems and how your faith plays a role.


Venture (Grades 4–6): In class, your young person learned from the experiences of people who stood up for what they believed. Ask your son or daughter to share these experiences, especially Saint Elizabeth of Hungary. Ask what the Second Coming of Jesus means and share his promise to be with us in the last days. Spend some time talking about how your family can stand up for what you believe. Ask your young person how the Sacrament of Confirmation gives us what we need to respond to God's call in our lives.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Your youngster's class began with a discussion of hopes for the world. Talk about what hopes your family has for the world. What hopes do you have for your family? Read the Sunday Gospel together and discuss what world events may make your family anxious or afraid. Then talk about Jesus' promise. How do Jesus' words concern or comfort you? The class also talked about resolving conflict. Discuss how you and other family members can work on solving arguments that come up.

Pray Together

Make a litany prayer of all the things your family is grateful for—life, health, friends, a good home, etc. After each is mentioned, the whole family can say together: "Thanks be to God!"

Keeping the End in Mind

A s we approach the end of the liturgical year, the readings prepare us for the conclusion of our earthly pilgrimage. Jesus describes the end times in today's Gospel. He warns us not to follow false prophets who will arise and claim to come in his name. He prophesies a time of war, natural disasters, famines, and plagues. Persecution will fall upon his followers, allowing them the chance to give testimony—martyrion in Greek.

Jesus' monitions for that time are simple: do not follow false prophets

Sunday Readings

Malachi 3:19-20a

For you who fear my name, the sun of justice will arise with healing in its wings.

2 Thessalonians 3:7-12

We wanted to present ourselves as a model for you, so that you might imitate us.

Luke 21:5-19

[Jesus] said, "All that you see here the days will come when there will not be left a stone upon another stone...." or prepare a defense, but persevere instead. In the section "I Believe in Life Everlasting," the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* also speaks to us about the last times (1020–1029). We believe in heaven, hell, and a personal, universal judgment. These last things await us all, and Jesus doesn't keep us in the dark about these realities.

We don't know when the end times may come. But regardless, our call is to live prepared by fulfilling God's will and trusting in him. Jesus clearly wants us to be aware of the coming of the end of the world and the eventual end of our lives on this earth, but he doesn't want us to be overly anxious. If we are in Christ, we are already a new creation. The old has passed away. Behold the new has come. Be not afraid! +

hen Zechariah and his wife, Elizabeth, were very old, the angel Gabriel appeared and announced that their prayers had finally been answered: they are going to have a baby. But Zechariah questioned the angel.

Sometimes it is difficult to recognize when our prayers have been answered. In some instances, we can imagine one, and only one, solution to our problem. The lonely don't recognize the opportunities for companionship. The envious don't appreciate their many blessings. The bored don't perceive their prospects for meaningful work, or potential to learn something new, or the possibility of an adventure. With our eyes fixed on some "prize," we miss the blessing offered us, or worse, we turn that blessing into a burden.

Zechariah and Elizabeth's baby grows up to be John the Baptist, the one who announces that the long-awaited Messiah is here, and that it's his cousin, Jesus. But even John doubted. After he was arrested, John sent two of his disciples to ask Jesus, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?"



Imagine John in jail—mistreated, hungry, scared, and wondering if he could have made a mistake. If Jesus is the Messiah, why isn't he busting John out of prison? Why is he letting him suffer? Jesus knows exactly what John needs to hear. He reminds John of the prophecies and what kind of Messiah he is—one who will manifest his mission in humble acts of service.

The blind regain their sight. Not only those physically blind but the spiritually blind who had been unable to see the good.

The lame walk. Not just the weak or disabled but those who are emotionally stuck, unable to make a change, to leave behind what is holding them back from being the people they were meant to be.

Lepers are cleansed. Not only those who ache with physical ailments but those who are rejected by society, those thought to be unclean and therefore unwelcome.

The deaf hear. Not only those physically deaf but those unable to hear the truth of God's love.

The dead are raised. All who know Jesus are invited to emerge from tombs where they live a half-life and walk into the light of the gospel.

And the poor have the good news proclaimed to them. This as much as any miracle is what drew the masses to Jesus. To hear the Good News, to be given a reason to hope—this is the One they have been waiting for. They believed! +
