ALL SOULS INTENTIONS

The month of November is a time when the Church traditionally prays in a special way for the faithful departed. The celebration of All Souls Day on November 2 is a joyful and poignant reminder that we worship and live in communion with those who have gone before us in faith.

Any intentions listed on the envelopes will be remembered at Liturgies offered as "All Souls Intentions" throughout the coming liturgical year. All Souls envelopes can be deposited in the regular collection basket at your convenience.

The Holy Liturgy can be offered for any deceased Catholic person. Please contact the Parish Office at 603-382-8324 to inquire about scheduling. Exact dates cannot always be accommodated, so calling early for the coming year is advised. The suggested donation for an announced commemoration is \$10.00 payable to Saint Luke Parish.

THE BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD

Throughout November, a special Book of the Names of the Dead will be open near the Baptismal Font & Paschal Candle for parishioners to record the names of the faithful departed. It is a visible sign that the faithful departed remain with us as part of the Church. You are welcome to record names of loved ones and the dates of their death.

END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. Three Beliefs explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. Three Beliefs contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.

Copies of *Three Beliefs* are available at the church entrance.

WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry, and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten: If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.

The Solemnity of Christ the King is a the liturgical relative latecomer to calendar of the Roman Church. Solemnity was instituted in 1925 by Pope Pius XI, and was specifically designated to be a "spiritual weapon" against what the Pope saw as two forces destructive of that time: secularism and atheism. The early 1900's were a time where industrial development saw people living tenement housing and other inhuman conditions without hope (remember the Child Labor Laws of the U.S. and other social reforms are all products of the post-depression years). The Church also recognized that the world was still reeling from the awful reality of the "war to end all wars,"(!) and the consequences of the rise of national and political movements such as communism, nazism, fascism which were gaining popularity in Europe. The Church saw a great need to point to another reality - the reality and power of Christ as King and Savior of the world.



The notion of Christ as King refers to Jesus' human royalty as a Son of David and to his royalty as the divine Son of God. Matthew, who's Gospel we have heard all this year, implicitly unfolds Jesus' Kingship as he describes the Kingdom of God and those faithful disciples who act in the world to bring that Kingdom to fulfillment.

This day also marks the end of the liturgical year in the Church. The Solemnity of Christ the King, capping the whole year, encourages us to look back to find signs of God's grace and power, while looking forward to his coming again in glory, while at the same time looking around to see where Christ's Kingship shows itself in the world today.

Join us at 6 PM tonight, Sunday, November 20 in Newton For Evening Prayer and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament as we honor Christ our King.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 23:35-43

For the Solemnity of Christ the King, the *Lectionary* chooses a short passage from Luke's account of Jesus' Passion. The Passion depicts Jesus without physical or military power, yet he is dangerous enough to be put to death. As his opponents tease and taunt him, Jesus shows his divine power in forgiving a criminal on a cross near him. This man recognizes his own wrongdoing and truly believes that Jesus can help him get to Heaven. By this action of faith, Jesus transforms the Cross from a place of death to a place of life and forgiveness.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): This week your child's class learned to identify ways they lead and follow. They celebrated being followers of Jesus. Have your child tell you the story of the man that Jesus forgave. Ask your child to share what he or she learned and to show you the Follower-of-Jesus crown made in class. Remind your child that followers of Jesus forgave one another.

Promise (Grades K-1): The Gospel lesson this week is about forgiveness. Your child learned that Jesus is a leader—a king—who loves and forgives. Ask your child to tell you the story of the good thief. The class also learned that there are times when everyone needs to forgive and to be forgiven. Ask your child to show you the chain and medallion he or she made in class, and to share the loving words with you.

Good News (Grades 2-3): The short Gospel for this Sunday shows that forgiveness is a cornerstone of Jesus' Kingdom. Children of this age can be deeply hurt by teasing. Ask your child to share Mari's story with you, and discuss whether your child would be able to forgive

those who tease him or her as Mari did. Invite your child to tell you the Gospel story in his or her own words. Talk about ways your family can show forgiveness to one another.

Venture (Grades 4-6): This week's lesson focuses on forgiveness. Ask your young person to tell you how we can recognize the need for forgiveness, and how we know that forgiveness has been given. Remind one another of the ways you ask for forgiveness every time you go to Mass. Discuss times when you needed both words and actions to show sorrow or forgiveness within your family. Encourage your young person to tell you what he or she has learned about the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Make plans as a family to receive this Sacrament during Advent.

Visions (Grades 7-9): In class this week, your young person explored the human experience of suffering and forgiveness. Ask your youngster to share with the family what he or she learned about suffering and forgiveness in the world. Talk about how Jesus showed what kind of a king he is when he forgave the thief on the cross. Talk together about how easy or how hard it is for each of you to show love and forgiveness.

Pray Together

Every family experiences the need for forgiveness. Spend a few moments together sharing things for which each member of the family is sorry. Then ask God for forgiveness and ask one another for forgiveness as well. In your family prayer, remember all those who suffer injustice throughout the world. End by praying the Our Father together.

The Cross: Altar and Throne

In his Gospel, St. Luke, the good doctor, often brings in kingly themes related to Christ's crucifixion. He does this to highlight that Jesus fulfilled the Jewish belief that the Messiah would unite the three important leadership roles—priest, prophet, and king. The inscription the Romans nailed to the cross above Jesus' head inadvertently supports the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy—he was indeed the King of the Jews.

He was also the priest who offered his body as a sacrifice for the Chosen People: "It was Caiaphas who had counseled the Jews that it was better that one man should die rather than

the people" (John 18:14). He is both the priest offering obedience to the Father, and he is also the victim who is offered on the altar of the cross. The cross is altar and throne because, as well as priest and victim, Jesus is also the king reuniting his kingdom under God the Father. In so doing, he undoes the sin of Adam, which had been the cause of this division.

Jesus' prophetic words, "It is finished," means he has fulfilled his mission as priest, prophet, and king from the throne of the cross. *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* (1047) sums it up when it says that as king and high priest, his sacrifice is total, universal, and definitive. Now all of God's creatures, man and beast, both natural and in the heavens, can return to the one from whom they came forth and who declared each one good. +

A Word from Pope Francis

Jesus' promise to the good thief gives us great hope: it tells us that God's grace is always greater than the prayer which sought it. The Lord...is so generous, he always gives more than what he has been asked: you ask him to remember you, and he brings you into his kingdom!

Ministers and Priests of God

Remember the old TV sitcom Maude? That saucy character, portrayed by Bea Arthur, had a standard reply whenever someone insulted her or revealed an unpleasant truth about her. "God'll get you for that," she'd snap (cue audience laughter).

As hilarious as that comeback is, it reveals how we sometimes think of God: as a transcendent disciplinarian who watches people closely and punishes them when they do not toe the line. This is not the God Jesus came to reveal, this is not the God Jesus called "Abba." When he was crucified, did Jesus say to his executioners, "God will get you for this"? On the contrary, from the cross Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34).

Advent, which begins next Sunday, presents us with an opportunity to grow in a spirit of compassion and forgiveness, to remember God's mercy. If we stop to remember how we have been forgiven, we may find it easier to forgive others. If we remember the undeserved gifts we have received, we may find it easier to be generous. If we remember our failures to love, we might more easily forgive those who don't love us as we long for them to do. These shifts can culminate in a grace-filled Christmas and a grace-filled life—one where we extend hospitality



to those we find difficult to welcome, embrace those we struggle to love, and open ourselves to the embrace of others.

And isn't this how believers are called to live? Saint Peter writes to the Christian communities—and to us: "You are 'a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own..." (1 Peter 2:9).

Saint Peter doesn't ask us to change our station in life to be God's priests and ministers. We are to live out this calling within our families and communities, at school or at work, while shopping or waiting in line.

Just as we prepare what we hope will be the right gift for someone we love, so too, as priests and ministers of the Lord, we prepare to give the gift of our faith in the way it is needed.

Exercising this ministry might mean something as simple as pausing to acknowledge the other person, listening, encouraging, calming, affirming. Whatever we do during our day, we can do it ministerially and in a way that makes people feel attended to when they are with us. As priests and ministers, we are always and everywhere witnesses to the Good News of a merciful and loving God, revealed to the world by Jesus, who was and is "God-with-us." +
