WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry, and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten: If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.

MARRIAGE IN THE CHURCH

Did you know that all Catholics are required to be married in the Church as a condition of the validity of their marriage? Any Catholic married in a civil ceremony (JP) or in any religious ceremony other that a Catholic one (unless specifically excepted by the Bishop) is not living out the Sacrament of Marriage in its fullness according to the teaching of the Church. THE GOD MINUTE

Every morning a small group of priests, religious, and lay people start their day in prayer. Soft music, sacred scripture, and a thoughtful reflection are weaved into a 10-minute prayer called "The God Minute." It's then uploaded for you to access and pray along with us on your own time. END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. Three Beliefs explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. Three Beliefs contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.

Copies of *Three Beliefs* are available at the church entrance.

Do Something for Lent. Renew your faith.

What is the Lenten Journey all about? Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are called the "three pillars" of the Christian way of life. They help support a full and healthy life of discipleship. During Lent we try to repair and strengthen these three pillars, which also are called the "three disciplines" because they help people become better disciples of the Lord.

The Lenten Journey is about PRAYER. Prayer is conversation with God. Make a good habit of daily prayer. Read the Psalms; and each Lent try and learn one or two by heart. Try to sing your prayer at home, and make every effort to sing well

when you worship with others.



The Lenten Journey is about FASTING. To prepare himself for his life's work, Jesus fasted in the wilderness. As Christians grow up, they need to learn traditional, healthy ways to fast. When we fast, we deny ourselves some food or other good things. We remind ourselves of how dependent we are on God's gifts, which always must be shared fairly and never taken for granted.

The Lenten Journey is about GIVING. Almsgiving means "sharing compassion." Almsgiving means more than giving away the things we don't need. It means giving away some of the things we do need because someone else also needs them. It means giving of ourselves.

Our Lenten Journey is about faith sharing during the Lenten season. It is a way to learn more about your faith and grow as a disciple of the Lord; it is a way to meet fellow parishioners, and to contribute to the life of our Parish.

All are welcome!



Today we invite sign-ups for small group Scripture sharing during Lent. We continue to pray together as our 2023 Lenten Journey gets underway. Ask for the Spirit's guidance as you consider your involvement; pray that our Parish's Lenten Journey be blessed.

Join a small group! Groups meet six times during the Lenten season to discuss the upcoming Sunday Lectionary readings. You will learn more about Scripture through the resources provided, participate in interesting discussions, meet some wonderful people, and have the opportunity to build up the Body of Christ.

The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Matthew 5:1-12a

In the Gospel, Jesus climbs on a mountainside to teach the Beatitudes. Those who live by these eight principles will learn about how to live like Jesus. The Sermon on the Mount will show us how to experience happiness even in the most trying times. The lowly are uplifted by these teachings. God gives us life and wants us all to be happy.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Jesus' teachings will bring us happiness. Ask your child about the Beatitudes, which Jesus taught during the Sermon on the Mount. Together as a family, try to make a list of what the teachings are. If you need help, go to this week's Gospel reading. Talk about how to live the Beatitudes as a family.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child explored Jesus' teachings that will help us be happy. Discuss what makes each person in your family happy and how that might fit into the Beatitudes. What are some of the times you have celebrated with each member of the family? Could be birthday, Baptisms, or some other milestone. Pray for continued happiness for your family and others in the community.

Good News (Grades 2-3): What kind of blessings has your family experienced that makes you all happy? Those are the kind of things your child's class discussed this week. Talk about your faith, family and friends, and life in general. Ask your child to summarize the story from this week's lesson titled, "A Colorful Gift." Talk about the Beatitudes and include them in your weekly prayers. How do the Beatitudes help us find true happiness?

Venture (Grades 4-6): This week your youngster's class learned about God's Law and Jesus' new law. Ask your son or daughter to describe what happened in the story, "Sadako and the 1,000 Cranes." The Gospel reading about the Beatitudes teaches us how to be happy. See how many beatitudes your young person can remember. Discuss as a family what the Liturgy of the Word means to you. Have your young person describe who Saint John Bosco is. Besides the Beatitudes, discuss the other teachings from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. End with the Lord's Prayer.

Visions (Grades 7-9): How much do Moses and Jesus have in common? Your young person should be able to answer that. Plus, talk about what happened in this week's story about Martin Luther King Jr. called "When Even the Children Can Lead." How did the people from the 1950s account fit into Jesus' teaching on the Beatitudes? How do the Beatitudes teach us to think like God? Discuss these questions with your young person. What other teachings from the Sermon on the Mount can your youngster share with the family?

Pray Together

Gather the family at the kitchen table. In the center of the table, place the family Bible and a lighted candle. Let each person in the family ask for God's help in spreading the happiness of the Beatitudes.. After each person has a say, all can respond with the words, "Jesus you are the source of all happiness." End with the Lord's Prayer.

The Beautiful Beatitudes

To follow Christ is to seek lowliness, humility, mercy, and righteousness. The Ten Commandments summarize God's teaching to his people. Jesus gives us a new law that builds on the old. Before it was "You shall not..."; now it is, "Blessed are you when..." He calls us to greater happiness, greater blessing, but it comes with a challenge. Saint Augustine says that Jesus went up the mountain to preach the Beatitudes because he was preaching a higher moral doctrine: "greater precepts of righteousness."

The new law contradicts what our wounded human nature tends to think and feel. We are challenged to believe blessings can come from tears, meekness,

God chose the weak of the world to shame the strong.

[Jesus said,] "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." and poverty; that living meekly leads to strength and security. Appreciating these truths requires transforming our minds and hearts. Faith is required. Deeply desiring and living in the right does bring satisfaction. There is consolation in mourning the things that sadden Christ's heart.

If we live by the Beatitudes, many will treat us more generously. We know people who are merciful, and we are quick to show them mercy. When our hearts are clean, we can see God more clearly. Those who seek and create peace are considered by all to be children of God. They are not without trials and suffering, but they are blessed and happy.


Christ calls us to store up treasures in heaven, spiritual blessings that cannot be taken away. Even if we experience difficulty, we will still receive the highest and greatest gift: the kingdom of heaven. +

A Word from Pope Francis

What does...blessed mean? Softening Christianity


I f we are to judge by the Sermon on the Mount, even Jesus, who is God with us, has a view of human affairs thoroughly at odds with our own. If we have to tune out the prophets' mistrust of humankind, imagine the skills of repression we must employ to ignore Christ's rejection of our every human impulse.

The benighted Nietzsche was clever enough to see the terrible truth in the Sermon on the Mount. What Jesus proposes is a bald reversal of human nature. Nietzsche knew that every last one of us wants wealth abounding and a full stomach. We dread suffering and tears. Being hated, ostracized, and insulted by others is among our greatest nightmares.

But Jesus deemed such conditions blessed. We are to rejoice if we are poor and hungry. We are to take delight in our tears and accept gladly our rejection by the powers of the age. This outright rejection of natural wisdom and desire so infuriated Nietzsche that he raged at those who might dare to follow Christ.

Perhaps the most constant failure of Christians is our reluctance to take our own gospels seriously and accept them in their entirety. We have an uncanny ability to block out those portions of Scripture that challenge our prejudices and to magnify those that confirm our own advantage.

A question much ignored these days is whether our faith has anything to do with justice, economics, poverty, or other



sociopolitical issues. We have pried open a yawning gap between the world of faith and the world of "real" issues. As a result, we never have to worry about changing our behavior or confronting our culture. This is quite strange for a people that contends that its way is the way of the Lord Jesus.

Nietzsche realized that there is something in Christianity dreadfully at odds with our natural impulse. He would never settle for some watered-down, feel-good Jesus who pals along with us in our strutting.

Unfortunately, Christians have done just that. Rather than rejecting outright Christ's teachings, we soften and suffocate them with the pillows of our more realistic wisdom. As the great English writer and theologian Dorothy Sayers observed, we have snared the lion of Judah, trimmed his claws, and turned him into a domesticated kitten. +
