#### WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS

All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.



# 2ND WEEK

# An Attitude of Gratitude

rdinary days are filled with rituals. The word "ritual" means "repeated action." Most rituals come at the beginning and end of the day, in the morning when we wake up and at night when we go to sleep.

What are your morning and bedtime rituals?


Doing the same things over and over might sound boring, but we would quickly make ourselves sick if we skipped sleeping, eating, washing and showing kindness to one another. We can't have a healthy life unless we are careful about life's daily rituals.

That's one reason why every morning and evening is a time of prayer. Prayer keeps us healthy. Every day we give thanks to God. Every day we ask God to bless the world and all who live in it. Thankfulness and a concern for others are two "symptoms" of a healthy attitude.

If you can imagine this, we try to make every bedtime a rehearsal for our death and our judgment by God. And we make each morning a rehearsal for the day of resurrection.

During these weeks of Lent, Christians try to get back into the healthy habit of daily prayer. Talk this over in your family. Maybe you can sing your praise in the shower or while tying your shoelaces. Pray the Lord's Prayer when you make your bed each morning or when you turn the covers down each night. Your good-morning and good-night kisses can be acts of thanksgiving for the love that surrounds you.

Decide on some simple way to pray every morning and every bedtime, and then stick to it.



# **Experiencing Hunger**

In fasting we voluntarily accept a state of hunger which millions of our brothers and sisters are forced to accept every day of their often all too brief lives. Fasting is thus a privileged entry into the experience of a vast portion of the human family with whom we seldom associate. In sharing their experience we come to an understanding of their plight unavailable to those who simply think about the sufferings of the poor. We might even say that this experiential knowledge makes all other knowledge seem like blindness about their world.

The season of Lent is a time of coming to fresh clarity about the responsibilities which we accept at baptism. The man born blind and given vision by Jesus almost


immediately found himself in trouble as a result of his new sight and its source. Those who willingly accept the hungers of the poor will undoubtedly be led to address the needs of their brothers and sisters. Thus the connection between fasting and alms.

Fasting, however, is not just a way to raise social consciousness. It is a trigger which brings us to new thankfulness for the gifts God has given us and which Christ asks us to share that we might embody our communion with all God's children.

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# LENTEN REGULATIONS

### **FASTING**

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

#### **ABSTINENCE**

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

# **EASTER PRECEPT**

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist. Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

#### PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All of the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praise worthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.



# The Gospel at Home

#### This Week's Gospel: Matthew 17:1-9

Sunday's Gospel shows both Jesus' future and our own future. The Gospel sets our sight on Easter, just as Peter, James, and John glimpse the risen Jesus for a passing moment in the Transfiguration. Lent invites us to join Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem where he will be crucified, but also where he will rise victorious over death.

#### **Exploring the Gospel Message**

Seeds (Preschool): This week's lesson helps children reflect on how they grow and change, and how nature around them is continually changing. Ask your child to recount how a caterpillar turns into a butterfly. Make it a practice to compliment your child every day for a way he or she is growing, especially in learning loving ways to act toward others.

**Promise** (Grades K-1): Lent is a time for growth in loving, sharing, and forgiving. Your child is learning how the world changes with the seasons and age. Talk to your child about what an adventure it is to grow as a loving person when we listen to Jesus. Praise your child when he or she shows love, sharing, or forgiveness.

**Good News** (Grades 2-3): Your child learned to recognize that Jesus is God's Son and learned how prayer is a way to change one's life. Ask your child to share with the family ways of praying—blessing, asking, thanksgiving, and praise. Discuss the meaning of the Transfiguration from the lesson. Talk about various ways your family prays together, and make a plan to try at least one new kind of prayer this week.

**Venture** (Grades 4-6): Your young person learned more about who Jesus is as told in Scripture. God's Son and our Savior gave a glimpse of who he is. Ask your child to tell the family in his or her own words about Queen Esther, Abraham and Sarah, and Saint Hilda of Whitby. Tell your child about his or her Baptism. Share why you decided to baptize your child, and about the promises you made at the Baptism.

Visions (Grades 7-9): Your youngster learned that, painful as it may be, change and transformation is possible. Ask your son or daughter to share the story "A.J.'s Secret" with the family. Talk about what A.J. learned from the experience, and how he received understanding and help by sharing his troubles. Talk about Jesus' Transfiguration on the mountain. What did this event show Peter, James, and John? What is the promise this event has for all of us? Share together what changes you would like to see in your family.

#### **Pray Together**

As a special devotion, try to have a brief family prayer each of the remaining days of Lent. Use a favorite family prayer, pray in your own words, or say one decade of the Rosary. Be sure to set a definite time for your daily prayer. Try to join in a morning prayer or an evening prayer together each day for a week. Begin and end your prayer times with the Sign of the Cross.

While God's marvelous blessings are free gifts, we are expected to respond to them appropriately, to accept them and use them for the common good. Abram's blessings were not simply for him and his family. "All the families of the earth will find blessing in you" (Genesis 12:3). His blessings would open a door to others—other nations, other ethnic groups, other religious communities. Abram was not simply chosen by God. He was chosen so that others might be blessed through him.

Timothy was instructed to "bear your share of hardship for the gospel" (2 Timothy 1:8). The blessing might be a gift, but it carried the responsibilities of discipleship. The voice from heaven told the disciples, "Listen to him" (Matthew 17:5). Being chosen by God or having seen the glory of Jesus calls for a change of mind and heart. This change isn't easy to accomplish. It is the reason for penance. #



# Share the Mission

n March 24, 1980, Archbishop Óscar Romero of San Salvador was assassinated by those who wished to silence him for preaching the good news of justice and peace to his people who were being abused and oppressed

by the government of El Salvador and the oligarchic class that supported it. Romero was not always such a courageous preacher, one unafraid to call out the injustices and crimes in his midst, but over time he became increasingly aware of the hardship that the gospel demanded in living an authentic Christian life—especially as the leader of the Church in San Salvador.

The hardship that the Second Letter to Timothy is talking about here is not reserved simply for official leaders in the Church like Archbishop Romero, but is instead a reality that all the baptized are called to embrace. Jesus says as much in the Gospels when he tells us that part of discipleship requires us to

"take up [your] cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24) and that we may even have to "lay down [our] life" (John 15:13).

Archbishop Romero understood this and, in a homily a year before his martyrdom, said: "Because it is God's work, we don't fear the prophetic mission the Lord has entrusted to us...every baptized person has received a share in the prophetic mission of Christ" (July 8, 1979). He said we don't do the difficult work of the gospel by living alone but with the strength that relies on the power of God. \*#

# Run the Race

A s a longtime competitive runner, I really appreciate St. Paul's metaphor about the Christian life of discipleship being like a race (1 Corinthians 9:24). Whereas St. Paul likely had in mind Greek athletics (think of the ancient Olympic

Games) where there is indeed a greater sense of competition— "the award goes to one person"—I would invite us to think of those community fun runs or even major modern events like the Boston Marathon instead. Indeed, some people run the race to win, but that is a comparatively small percentage of the population. Most people are out not to win an award but to enjoy the event itself.

The nice thing about road races as a metaphor for Christian living is that they include all people—fast runners, slow runners, walkers, spectators, and volunteers. Races are activities that involve all women and men moving as one community in the same direction toward a shared finish line.

Furthermore, they often involve many people cheering the participants from the sidelines. One might even think of this group as similar to the saints that intercede for us, cheer us on, and coach us toward our goal.

May this Lent be a time for us to consider where we are and how we participate in the race of Christian discipleship, moving with the community, and cheering one another onward toward the kingdom of God. #
