WINTER WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry, and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten: If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.



Spring Cleaning

he word "Lent" comes from "lengthen." In the Northern Hemisphere, the days get longer and the nights get shorter each day of Lent.

The extra sunlight warms the earth and cheers people up. But it also exposes dirt. It stirs the wind and blows dust and trash around. Sometimes the wind gets so strong that it breaks trees and damages buildings. It's no wonder that the month of March is named after Mars, the Roman god of battles.

Lent is spring cleaning time, and cleaning is an art! It takes a number of skills to learn how to clean something properly. Also, cleaning often takes teamwork and cooperation. We try to put aside our own selfish concerns. We try to work alongside others.

Before we clean a room, it is necessary to put things in their places. Start with your own things. You probably know better than anyone else where they go. And if you don't, ask someone. Figure out a system for keeping your things where they belong.

Washing windows is an art in itself, and it takes cooperation to do it safely. But nothing is more effective in brightening the home.

Clean outside, too. Pick up garbage, put clutter away, rake the yard and hose down the sidewalk. This is hard work. Maybe this spring you can help out a neighbor or a relative. Maybe you can be part of a group that cleans the outdoors.

This Lent you can help the sun, the wind and the rain give the earth its spring cleaning.



Spiritual Direction

One of the more positive developments of our times is the rebirth of the tradition of spiritual direction. Wise and holy men and women agree to become "soul friends" to other Christians discerning God's will in their lives. One of the most important questions in this spiritual walk is this: "What is the deepest desire of your heart?" The question is not so easily answered. What first pops to mind is invariably found to be a secondary or tertiary desire rooted in a deeper and more fundamental one.

The Samaritan woman at the well was having an intense experience of spiritual direction. Jesus was helping her to become aware of the deepest desires of her hearts. Serial husbands were simply a symptom of something more basic.

Fasting connected to prayer is a traditional discipline of spiritual direction. Willingness to reflect on my insatiable desire for a pizza before bedtime can become a moment of deeper revelation. Perhaps the insight will be as seemingly embarrassing as coming to know that food is a temporary relief from loneliness. Living without that easy relief may help me to see my disconnectedness from friends, family, parish and the master who waits for me at the well.

From what does your use of food and drink give you temporary relief? What might you do about these deeper desires?

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LENTEN REGULATIONS

FASTING

Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned

meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

ABSTINENCE

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

EASTER PRECEPT

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist. Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praiseworthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.



The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 4:5-42

In this Sunday's Gospel, a Samaritan woman visiting the village well becomes the bearer of Jesus' Good News to her townspeople. Jesus chose a woman and a Samaritan to spread his message. He offers her living water, which brings a realization that Jesus is the Messiah and his new community will include Samaritans. We are first given living water at Baptism. Through our Baptism we become part of the community and given the grace to live as Jesus did.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Keep track for a day of how your family uses water. Make a chart where each can check off what they did—shower, cook, drink, water the garden—and how the water made them feel—clean, happy, refreshed, relaxed. Use holy water to bless your family at the end of the day.

Promise (Grades K–1): Your child is learning that God's presence in creation inspires delight and gratitude. God's presence in your child inspires him or her to follow Jesus. Ask your child about their experience of acting out the story slips to demonstrate how Jesus' followers act. Be sure to notice what delights your child and, as a family, talk about God's presence in these experiences.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned more about the Bible and dramatized the story of the woman at the well. Decide how your family will give living water to others by sharing your treasures, your time, or your talents with people in need. Ask your child to share the story of Mother Katharine Drexel with the family.

Venture (Grades 4–6): Your youngster's class learned how important it is to speak up for what is right. Share examples of people who speak up for others. Talk about the woman Jesus met at the well, and what it meant that she was a Samaritan. How did she stand up for Jesus and for the message he gave her? Ask your young person to tell you about his or her scavenger hunt for believers and share the stories of how believers have helped you. Consider a discussion about Saint Patrick from the week's lesson.

Visions (Grades 7–9): Your young person's class learned how Dorothy Day witnessed Christ's love by helping people in her community. Just as the Samaritan woman was the first to hear directly from Jesus that he was the Messiah, people could learn a lot about Jesus from the way your family lives your Christian life. Talk together about what Jesus means to you and why you want to be his disciple. How can you bring living water to the people in your lives?

Pray Together

As an evening prayer, children often use the simple litany form of "God bless" followed by the name of a person the child wants God to watch over. Some evening before bed, gather together to create a litany of people who gave you living water by sponsoring you for Baptism or Confirmation, by teaching you about Jesus, by giving you good examples, or the like. Say a few words about the person and all can respond with a hearty "God bless (name)."

Water for Living, or Living Water?

Water flows through this Sunday's readings. In the passage from Exodus, the Hebrews cry out for the water so necessary for life. In the Gospel, Jesus speaks of living water that provides eternal life.

The exchange between the Hebrews and Moses is straightforward and startling. Physical thirst led them to question the divine care that miraculously delivered them from the hands of Egyptian oppressors. We shouldn't be too quick to shake our fingers at them. How many times have we

looked past blessings we take for granted, only to focus on lesser immediate needs? These desert people are our ancestors in more ways than one.

The Gospel of John is most interesting. Jesus is in Samaria, a land hated by the Jews. There he initiates a conversation with an inhabitant of the town of Sychar, someone who is an outcast in three major ways. She is a woman—no self-respecting man would be alone with a woman he didn't know. She is a Samaritan—Jews considered Samaritans unclean. And she is promiscuous—his own honor might be at risk. The woman's questionable social status does not prevent Jesus from engaging her, first in social etiquette ("Give me a drink" [4:7]), then in a theological exchange ("Whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst" [4:14]).

The Hebrews experienced God's saving action in their exodus, but they lacked trust. The woman, hated by the Jews, was an outcast of her own people, yet she believed. How do we respond to the water? †

How many times have we looked past blessings we take for granted, only to focus on lesser immediate needs?

Like the Samaritan woman, whoever personally encounters the living Jesus feels the need to talk about him to others, so that everyone might reach the point of proclaiming that Jesus "is truly the savior of the world" (Jn 4:42), as the woman's fellow townspeople later said....[W]e too are called to witness the life and hope that are within us.

Y 'all mind sharing a table with these folks?" asked the attendant as we wandered into a dueling piano bar in the French Quarter. Our group was one or two years past the legal drinking age; they were elderly couples who were one or

two drinks past the legal alcohol limit. The couples were from California visiting New Orleans for an Elks Convention. My Cajun friends and I had limited experience with elks—or their conventions—but thirst knew no boundaries, and lasting friendships with these strangers was formed.

In John's Gospel, two strangers meet at a well on the outskirts of town. Their peoples—the Jews and the Samaritans—had been estranged from each other for generations. Thirst, however, knows no boundaries.

"The woman is taken aback that a Jew, no matter how thirsty, would ask a Samaritan for a drink," writes Denis McBride, CSsR. Yet, she "has a thirst for meeting Mr. Right" that hadn't been satisfied after five husbands and the man she's living with. Then the buckets are turned, when Jesus tells her he is the Christ, and "at long"

Finding Redemption

As John narrates the encounter of Jesus with the Samaritan woman at the well, we witness one more fascinating conversation that seems circuitous, but by the end, homes in on the truth.

It begins in the heat of the day, the point at which the light is strongest, and into this light steps a woman. An ordinary chat turns into a moment of profound self-knowledge. She is confronted with her flaws and comes away with understanding. How instructive that, faced with embarrassing and awkward news about her life, she experiences it as good. Good news. She meets Jesus as she is, and in that truthful, painful space she finds redemption.

A friend fought cancer for years. At some point between her diagnosis and her death she said to me with complete conviction, "Thank God for my cancer."

Cancer had ravaged her body and was cutting her physical life short, but my friend felt strongly that cancer had also stripped

her of pretense and forced her to confront herself and God on spare, honest terms. There, in that bright, painful light, she was brought face to face with Jesus through a winding, wandering path. She saw herself as she really was, flawed, yes, but most of all, loved. †
