NEW HAMPSHIRE CATHOLIC APPEAL

Next week begins the annual New Hampshire Catholic Appeal: Future of Our Faith II, Many Parts, One Body (NHCA), an initiative designed to strengthen our ministries for the Church in New Hampshire and to reduce the number of annual second collections at parishes. Last year, 41 parishes participated in the appeal and raised over \$1.4M. This year all 88 parishes in NH will participate, including our parish. The Appeal will take place over the next two weekends at Mass. The NHCA supports the care for our retired and elderly priests, seminarian education and vocations, Catholic education, evangelization through Parable magazine, Catholic Charities NH, and more. END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. Three Beliefs explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. Three Beliefs contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.

Copies of *Three Beliefs* are available at the church entrance.

CREMATION AND THE CHURCH

On October 25, 2016, the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith published a new instruction on the burial of the dead and on the conservation of the ashes in cases of cremation. The instruction reiterated the long held view that the Church is not opposed to the practice of cremation, though it continues to recommend that the bodies of the deceased be buried in cemeteries or other sacred places. However, the new document insists that ashes should not be kept in private homes, and that the scattering of ashes in the air, on land, or at sea is not permitted. The instruction also insisted that cremains may not be divided among various family members, nor may they be preserved in mementos, pieces of jewelry, or other objects.



owadays we use oil mostly for cooking. We fry with it. We drizzle it on salads. We add it to dough to make baked goods light and flaky. Check out a supermarket to discover some of the many plants that produce edible oils. One oil-producing plant is the olive. Next time you eat an olive, notice that it's a bit greasy. That's olive oil.

Sometimes athletes are given a rubdown with oil to limber up their muscles. In the old days, oil was used to help heal burns and other injuries. Jesus' famous parable about the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37) mentions how oil was used as medicine.

The church uses two different oils—one is to help heal the sick and the other is to rub on the catechumens, who are the people getting ready to be baptized. Catechumens are a bit like athletes, except that their struggle is to enter into the Christian way of life.

Besides the two oils, the church also uses a mixture of oil and perfume called chrism. Ask to smell your parish's sacred chrism. What other great fragrances does this Easter season bring to your neighborhood?

The word "christ" means someone who is anointed with chrism. We are anointed when we are baptized and confirmed. We become a new Christ. The holy name of Jesus becomes our family name.

Why is the perfume added? In his second letter to the church of Corinth, Saint Paul says that since dead things stink, a good smell can remind us of God's Spirit, the giver of life. People who are christened can share this life-giving aroma with everyone they meet.



The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: Luke 24:13-35

This Sunday's Gospel tells the classic story of the presence of the Risen Jesus in the lives of his followers. Two discouraged disciples walk home to Emmaus after Jesus' Death in Jerusalem. A stranger falls in step and helps them see that the Messiah was not to be a triumphant king, but a suffering servant. At supper they recognize the stranger as Jesus in the breaking of the bread. At Mass we listen to the Scripture and we recognize the Risen Christ in the community and in the breaking of the Eucharistic bread.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): The story of the Risen Jesus meeting two followers on the road is full of details your child will remember. Help your child understand that every time you go to Mass you recognize Jesus in the breaking of the bread.

Promise (Grades K–1): This week's lesson helped your child understand how Jesus is with us today at Mass—in the Eucharist, in the priest, in the people who come together to celebrate the breaking of the bread, and in the Word of God. Share with your child how important Sunday Mass is to you. Ask your child to show and tell about the happy heart medallion he or she made in class.

Good News (Grades 2–3): Your child learned the importance of making loving choices. Ask your child to tell the family the story of Paul and how he changed. In your own words, tell the Gospel story of Jesus and the two disciples at Emmaus and talk about how you all recognize Jesus in the breaking of the bread at Mass every Sunday. Talk about what is meant by the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

Venture (Grades 4–6): The class focused on the story of Jesus and his disciples on the road to Emmaus, and discussed how we can recognize Jesus in our midst. Allow your child to have an opportunity to tell you about his or her own Emmaus Walk, and to share what was learned about the different characters met along the journey. Ask your young person to tell you about how our faith practices and traditions are similar to the disciples' in the Gospel.

Visions (Grades 7–9): When the two disciples in the Gospel story walk with Jesus to Emmaus, they began to understand why Jesus had to suffer. They also recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread. Make a list of questions each of you would want to ask Jesus if you had the chance to take a long walk with him. Share the questions with one another. Talk, too, about ways you can make Mass a more important part of your life. Your family may want to go to weekday Mass during the Easter season. Talk, too, about Saint Paul's missionary travels from the week's lesson, including the map provided to see where the locations are.

Pray Together

Each day this week, pray the Lord's Prayer, the Hail Mary, and the Glory Be together. These three prayers weave together many of the great mysteries of the Easter feast.


Some of our many successful events



The Problem of Evil and God's "Silence"

hy doesn't God make things easier? Perhaps the most vexing faith question of all time is the problem of God's silence and his seeming indifference. Why does God allow evil? Why do bad things happen to good people?

The presence of evil in the world poses a deeper question. Why does God seem to be hidden? If God is so massively real, why do so many people not recognize, acknowledge, or care about his existence? Why do believers have to live, almost always it seems, on the edges of doubt? Why doesn't God make his existence clear, a fact beyond doubt? Why doesn't God silence his critics?

Evil exists because God respects freedom, both in nature and in human beings. When we are confronted with the problem of evil in the world, the conclusion we might draw is not that God doesn't exist or doesn't care, but rather that God respects and values freedom in a way that we don't.

God doesn't make things easier because God can't make things easier, at least not without making us and the world into something far less than we are. When God made us, he gave us as much freedom, creativity, and spunk as was possible. He

In the resurrection we are assured that there are no doors that are eternally closed. Every time we close a door, or one is closed on us, God opens another for us. The resurrection assures us that God never gives up on us, even if we give up on ourselves, that God writes straight with the crooked lines of our lives, that we can forever revirginize, regain lost innocence, and move beyond bitterness.

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didn't play it safe but gave us as much godliness as he could without making us into gods ourselves. Simply put, in making us, God went so far as to give us a freedom that even he won't tamper with. That's risky, but as a parent, it seems God would

rather risk than control, allow creativity outside of his influence than limit ingenuity, and tolerate the misuse of freedom than relate to robots. God is perceived as silent because he allows human freedom and ingenuity to be precisely what they are meant to be: noncoerced, even by God. God is not a frightened parent who needs to control, nor a threatened creator who kept what was best back for himself. God allows evil because God respects the freedom and ingenuity of creation and, as we know from our faith, can ultimately redeem whatever goes wrong.

Things could only be simpler if God had made us Swiss clocks—wonderfully tuned to preset rhythms, with no mess, no sin, no evil,

and the beauty of perfect crystal. But then there wouldn't be any love, freedom, creativity, or meaning. No. God built us on a razor's edge, so full of godly fire that we are capable of both martyrdom and murder. †
