END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. Three Beliefs explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. Three Beliefs contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.

Copies of *Three Beliefs* are available at the church entrance.

ave you ever seen good incense? It looks like chunks of rock or beads of glass. Some incense looks like jewels.

What is incense? Certain kinds of bushes and trees have thick, gooey, sap-like substances called resins that drip from cut branches. Drops of resin dry and harden. Many resins have strong aromas, and some release their aromas when heated. These are used as incense.

You don't set fire to incense. Instead, you gently heat it until it melts, usually on top of burning charcoal. First the incense melts, and then it starts to smoke. Ask someone to show you the church's incense and how it is used.

For Christians, the smoke has many meanings. It rises heavenward, like prayer. It smells weird and wonderful. It surrounds us with mysteriousness, like the cloud that filled God's Temple. This cloud was so thick that the priests couldn't see what they were doing! Read about this cloud in the Bible's First Book of Kings, 8:1–30. Why do you think that something as fleeting as a cloud is a good symbol for something as eternal as the presence of God?

Most church-supply stores sell incense, or perhaps you can buy some from the parish. At your next family barbecue, give thanks to God by tossing some incense on the charcoal. Watch how the incense melts and smokes. Watch how the smoke curls and billows as it rises into the sky.



The Gospel at Home

This Week's Gospel: John 14:1-12

Jesus directs us to not let our hearts be troubled. Our faith in Jesus can keep us filled with God's peace. In this week's Gospel, Jesus promises that he is preparing a place for each of us in heaven. We will get there through following Jesus, who is the way, the truth, and the life. As Jesus tells his Apostles, whoever has seen him has seen the Father.

Exploring the Gospel Message

Seeds (Preschool): Your child concluded this week that Jesus is not just someone we follow, but also a friend. Talk with your child about how we follow Jesus. Then discuss how Jesus is our friend. Consider placing the drawing your child did in class in a prominent place. Each time you see it, repeat the message from Jesus.

Promise (Grades K-1): Your child created a church from cutouts in the lesson. Take a look at it together, then talk about how your own church is set up. How are the pews lined up? What does the art look like? Is there stained glass? Describe the altar and other special areas of the church.

Good News (Grades 2-3): Your child learned about Jesus' Way. He healed people. He made friends, and he taught people how to live a holy life. Ask your child what happens when we receive the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Confirmation. Explain how you understand the Holy Spirit's action in your life. How does your family share Jesus' Good News in the world?

Venture (Grades 4-6): Ask your son or daughter how Chief Seattle's quote describes our relationship with God and each other. In this week's Gospel, Jesus tells the disciples that whoever believes in him will do his work on Earth. Discuss ways that you already do this and talk about how you might do even greater things. A discussion about things that your child worries about may be timely this week as Jesus tells his friends to have faith to calm their troubled hearts. Talk about how the Second Vatican Council opened the Church to the modern world. Is there anyone in your family who remembers the time before the Council?

Visions (Grades 7-9): Your youngster discussed the work that Christians do. Talk about how your son or daughter does that work today. Jesus says in the Gospel this week that he is going to prepare a place for each of us in heaven. Make sure your young person understands how to get there through Jesus. Ask your youngster why we are all "living stones." What ministries are members of your family involved with, and what are some that you might consider exploring? Adopt the Living Stones Prayer Service for home this week.

Pray Together

Pray that each member of the family will use his or her feet, hands, voice, head, and heart to help us build the living temple of God's house. During family prayer, make the Sign of the Cross on each other's heads and hands. Bless each other to do God's work this week and on into the rest of your lives. Pray to the Holy Spirit for guidance and courage.

What Is God Really Like?

That is a very profound question, asked by children and adults alike. Answers range from the image of an old man in a white robe with a beard; the all-seeing eye on the back of the dollar bill; "the big guy up there." Such answers seem frivolous when we think about the dynamic force behind the Big Bang from which evolved everything in the billions of galaxies that we know exist. What is such a God really like?

The disciples were probably not thinking of astrophysics when they asked Jesus about God. Their questions

John 14:1-12

Jesus said to him, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." flowed from Jesus' constant reference to God as "Father." That title in itself tells us something about God. It tells us that God, like a father, is the source of Jesus' being and existence.

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells the disciples that he is about to return to his Father. He also assures them that they also will have a place with the Father. However, like us, they still are not sure what this Father is like. Jesus responds to their lack of understanding and suggests: "Look at me!" His life is lived for others. He is one who cares for those in need rather than walks past them, who forgives rather than condemns, who endures misunderstanding without retaliating, who tolerates the pettiness of others without being snide. Why is it so hard for us to realize that this is what God is really like?

The disciples want to know what God is like. Jesus says, "Look at me!" #



Ministries Grew from Needs of People

"As the number of disciples continued to grow, the Hellenists complained against the Hebrews because their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution."

Acts 6:1

The Acts of the Apostles is the story of the early church struggling to survive its infancy. Jesus didn't leave instructions about what to do when there were Greek members and Hebrew members who came from cultures so different that communication was painfully difficult. Greek meets Jew was as much of a clash of cultures as Midwest meets Mayan. But they were all believers, all on fire with the Spirit, all filled with the excitement of participating in something new, something right and just.

Jesus' plan for us? Pray. Discern. Act.

"So the twelve called together the community of the disciples



and said, 'It is not right for us to neglect the word of God to serve at table. Select from among you seven reputable men, filled with the Spirit and wisdom, whom we shall appoint to the task....'"

Acts 6:2

The first deacons (Diakonos: Greek for "service")

For a while, the ministry of deacon died out and became only a rank or stopping place on the way to priesthood.

We still have vestiges of this in the title transitional deacon. Vatican II restored the diaconate, and those we now call permanent deacons are not "minipriests," but men with their own unique call to service.

As the Church grew, so did the need for people with different gifts to minister to the community. While the early Church was a small group of outlaws, worshiping in secret for fear of their lives, there wasn't much need for ministries like lector, catechist, cantor, minister of the Eucharist, greeter, or usher. Nor were there pastoral councils or commissions for finance, liturgy, social services, and education. These ministries all arose out of need as the Church grew.

The Spirit's work within the Church continues, calling men and women to ministries never imagined in the infancy of the Church. The plan remains: PRAY—fervently! DISCERN—carefully! ACT—courageously! †



Lord Jesus, when there is conflict within our family or community, send your Spirit to guide us to reconciliation and unity, we pray. Amen! Alleluia!

The Redemptorists
