END OF LIFE PLANNING

Three Beliefs is a document from the Diocese of Manchester that gives valuable assistance to Catholics and others on end-of-life issues. *Three Beliefs* explains Catholic teaching on life-sustaining treatment and care and includes the New Hampshire Advance Directive form modified in such a way to make it consistent with both Catholic teaching and New Hampshire law. *Three Beliefs* contains a helpful FAQ section and wallet cards that include important information for healthcare providers.

The New Hampshire Advance Directive form was revised by a law that is consistent with Catholic teaching and the changes to the New Hampshire form. If you completed an advance directive before 2021 and your intentions for your end-of-life care have not changed, you do not need to complete a new form as long as your advance directive was valid when it was executed. For example, if you completed the October 2007 version of *Three Beliefs* and signed the document before two witnesses or a notary public or justice of the peace, you do not need to complete a new advance directive form.



Bread

he word "companion" means "someone we share bread with." In communion, when we share the sacred bread and wine, Christ becomes our companion.

E ASTE

6TH WEEK

Have you ever made bread? If not, give it a try. But be warned: Making a yeast-raised bread will take many hours of waiting for the dough to rise. Yeast is a kind of fungus that slowly grows throughout the dough. Like any living thing, yeast gives off carbon dioxide. The gas expands the dough.

In the old days, people would keep a small lump of yeast alive in their kitchens by feeding it flour and water. Whenever bread was made, a bit was taken from the lump to add to the dough. But every so often other kinds of funguses would contaminate the lump and make it stink. When that happened, people threw it out and borrowed some uncontaminated yeast from a neighbor.

As a sign of new beginnings, every year at Passover the Jewish people get rid of anything yeasty in their homes. Passover bread is flat and "unleavened" (made without yeast). Our communion bread is unleavened, like the bread of Passover. Saint Paul said that stinky, contaminated yeast is like the rotten things we do. We should throw those things out and start fresh, like unleavened dough.

Christian poets have compared the Holy Spirit to fresh, pure yeast, but not the kind that makes dough rise. We're waiting for the day that the Holy Spirit makes the whole world rise!



BAPTISM

Baptism is the first of seven sacraments and the way in which a person becomes a member of the Catholic Church.

WHO CAN RECEIVE A CATHOLIC BAPTISM?

Anyone who has not already been baptized can receive the sacrament of Baptism in the Catholic Church. Baptism leaves an *indelible* (permanent) mark on the soul and there is no way nor any reason that one could be or should be re-baptized. There are no age restrictions for baptism; one can be baptized as an infant, or as an adult. In other words, nobody is ever too old or too young to be baptized.



In the Catholic Church today, people are usually baptized as infants by a priest or deacon. There are extreme cases, however, when even an unbaptized person can baptize someone. All that is required is the will to do what the Church does, and to apply the Trinitarian Baptismal formula which is "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The Catholic Church recognizes any baptism that uses water and in which the person baptized was baptized with the Trinitarian formula. Some churches do not use the Trinitarian formula for baptism and thus their baptisms are not valid.

THE GIFT OF BAPTISM

When it comes down to it, baptism is a gift from God to humanity. Baptism initiates us into the family of God and cleanses us of sin. We do not need to earn this gift. God gives it freely to all who are open to it. For someone who is baptized as an infant, the personal response of faith comes as the child grows to respond to the graces given in baptism.

Baptism is connected to faith, and this connection is not lost when an infant is baptized. The *Apostolic Tradition* (usually attributed to St. Hippolytus) was written in the early third century. It states: "Baptize first the children, and if they can speak for themselves let them do so. Otherwise, let their parents or other relatives speak for them." Today, the Church still recognizes the connection between faith and baptism. When a child is baptized, the parents' faith speaks for the child who is too young to have explicit faith on his or her own. This is why the Church requires a reasonable hope that the parents will raise the child in the Catholic faith before a child is baptized.

WHAT DOES THE GRACE OF BAPTISM ACCOMPLISH?

Baptism forgives all sins that may have been committed prior to a person's baptism including original sin, mortal sins, and venial sins, and it relieves the punishment for those sins. It makes the newly baptized person "a new creature," transforming the person into an adopted child of God and a member of Christ. Baptism incorporates a person into the Church, which is the body of Christ. It brings someone into the flock of the faithful and brings them to share in the royal priesthood of Christ (1 Pet. 2:9-10). Catholic baptism gives a share in the common priesthood of all believers, and it also brings about the sacramental bond of the unity of Christians. Last, but certainly not least, baptism leaves an indelible spiritual mark (character) of belonging to Christ on the soul. Nothing anyone can do in terms of sin can erase this mark. Sin may prevent one from being open to the salvation God offers through baptism, but a baptized person will always carry the mark of a Christian on their soul.

What Is Your Hope?

W e have hopes for ourselves and others. We hope for good health, for fulfilling work, for settled lives for our children. As valuable as such hope might be, that is not what Peter is referring to in today's second reading. He is talking about religious hope: not hope that, but hope in. Not hope that God will give us what we ask, that God will supply what we cannot accomplish, that God will reward our faithfulness. That is also valid hope, but it is still not religious hope.

Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope.

John 14:15–21

[Jesus said,] "I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always, the Spirit of truth...You know it, because it remains with you." Genuine hope for those who believe in God is hope or trust in God. Period. Trust in God when we have no idea what the future might bring. Trust in God when all our best plans crumble before us. Trust in God when we face the terrors of illness and death. This is a trust or hope for which we do not provide God plans to follow so our needs get met as we think they should be. It is a hope that enables us to place ourselves into the hands of God.

This kind of hope asks for nothing and expects everything. Why? Because we are convinced that God loves us with a passion we can't possibly imagine and, therefore, wants what is best for us. This might seem like an impossible hope, but the reading goes on to list reasons to hope. God's love is exemplified by Jesus Christ, who "suffered for sins...that he might lead you to God" (1 Peter 3:18). Who could ask for more?


