

# FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD

Because of the fortunes of the calendar, we gather today as a family to celebrate one of the principal feasts of Jesus' life, the Transfiguration on Mount Tabor. The Transfiguration feast on August 6 gives us a chance to consider and pray over a reading that appears in the Lectionary cycle each year during Lent.

The Transfiguration of Jesus gives the disciples with him on the mountain - and all of the disciples who followed throughout history a glimpse of the glory that is Jesus' from the beginning of time. During the Lenten season, the Transfiguration is contrasted with the

temptations of Jesus in the wilderness. On the one hand we have glory and exaltation; on the other we have the reality of temptation and human weaknesses. Jesus stands firmly between those two opposites as promise and fellow traveler on the journey of life.

What can this paradox of Paschal living tell us about our gathering together as a family of faith?

No one ever said we are perfect! Lucky for us in a way. If we were only able to come to Mass on Sunday (or Saturday night) perfectly clean, perfectly at peace, perfectly at prayer, most of us would never get from the couch!

The reality for many is that we spend the hour before Sunday Eucharist (or hours) looking for something to wear, changing the baby's diaper, ironing the only clean shirt or blouse in the closet, wiping up after the kids' breakfast, trying to remember if we took our medication, arguing with teenagers who have just discovered they don't need to go to church anymore, struggling behind another car who just can't see fit to move a little faster, and scrambling to get the last spot to park in the lot.

Yet after all of those very ordinary (and admittedly sometimes very frustrating) things, we are called to climb a mountain and experience the risen Jesus alive among us and bask in his glory.

Is that reality?

To put it in the words of a young Mom, "I am just happy if we arrive at Church and I have a minute or two to sit down."

The reality of our lives together as Christians promises that human existence and Godly things can come together when we gather together. We come to Sunday Liturgy prepared as best we can – accepting that our preparation will be imperfect.

This is not an excuse, but an opportunity.

We greet one another – we begin to leave a little of our recent past behind. We sing together – we hear other voices, perfect and imperfect. We make the sign of the cross, a visible sign that we are the body of Christ, broken and risen again. And we pray – we make the transition from the world of desert temptations and human weaknesses and "should be" to the world of God's welcome and to the reality of Christ present in the gathered Church.

How will Liturgy change you today...? How will the glory of the Lord change you this week?

# THE STORY OF THE TRANSFIGURATION OF THE LORD

All three Synoptic Gospels tell the story of the Transfiguration (Matthew 17:1-8; Mark 9:2-9; Luke 9:28-36). With remarkable agreement, all three place the event shortly after Peter's confession of faith that Jesus is the Messiah and Jesus' first prediction of his passion and death. Peter's eagerness to erect tents or booths on the spot suggests it occurred during the week-long Jewish Feast of Booths in the fall.

According to Scripture scholars, despite the texts' agreement it is difficult to reconstruct the disciples' experience, because the Gospels draw heavily on Old Testament descriptions of the Sinai encounter with God, and prophetic visions of the Son of Man. Certainly Peter, James, and John had a glimpse of Jesus' divinity strong enough to strike fear into their hearts. Such an experience defies description, so they drew on familiar religious language to describe it. And certainly, Jesus warned them that his glory and his suffering were to be inextricably connected—a theme John highlights throughout his Gospel.

Tradition names Mount Tabor as the site of the revelation. A church first raised there in the fourth century was dedicated on August 6. A feast in honor of the Transfiguration was celebrated in the Eastern Church from about that time. Western observance began in some localities about the eighth century.



# THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO MARK

This shortest of all New Testament gospels is likely the first to have been written, yet it often tells of Jesus' ministry in more detail than either Matthew or Luke (for example, the miracle stories at Mk 5:1–20 or Mk 9:14–29). Mark recounts the ministry of Jesus of Nazareth in a rapid, almost breathless style, where one incident follows directly upon another. In this narrative, Mark stresses Jesus' message about the kingdom of God now breaking into human life as good news (Mk 1:14–15) and Jesus himself as the gospel of God (Mk 1:1; 8:35; 10:29). Jesus is the Son whom God has sent to rescue humanity by serving and by sacrificing his life (Mk 10:45).

The opening verse about good news in Mark (Mk 1:1) serves as a title for the entire book. The action begins with the appearance of John the Baptist, a messenger of God attested by scripture. But John points to a mightier one, Jesus, at whose baptism God speaks from heaven, declaring Jesus his Son. The Spirit descends upon Jesus, who eventually, it is promised, will baptize "with the Holy Spirit." This presentation of who Jesus really is (Mk 1:1–13) is rounded out with a brief reference to the temptation of Jesus and how Satan's attack fails. Jesus as Son of God will be victorious, a point to be remembered as one reads of Jesus' death and the enigmatic ending to Mark's Gospel.

The Gospel of Mark ends in the most ancient manuscripts with an abrupt scene at Jesus' tomb, which the women find empty (Mk 16:1–8). His own prophecy of Mk 14:28 is reiterated, that Jesus goes before the disciples into Galilee; "there you will see him." These words may imply resurrection appearances there, or Jesus' parousia there, or the start of Christian mission, or a return to the roots depicted in Mk 1:9, 14–15 in Galilee. Other ancient authors have attached additional endings after Mk 16:8, providing Mark's text with as many as six additional endings.

Traditionally, the Gospel of Mark is said to have been written shortly before A.D. 70 in Rome, at a time of impending persecution and when destruction loomed over Jerusalem. Its audience seems to have been Gentile, unfamiliar with Jewish customs (hence Mk 7:3-4, 11). The book aimed to equip such Christians to stand faithful in the face of persecution (Mk 13:9-13), while going on with the proclamation of the gospel begun in Galilee (Mk 13:10; 14:9). Modern research often proposes as the author an unknown Hellenistic Jewish Christian, possibly in Syria, and perhaps shortly after the year 70.



# Would I Have Known Him?

T have been surprised to encounter a number of people over the years who share that they've stopped going to Mass or participating in the sacramental life of the Church because they felt unworthy to do so. For some reason they came to believe that the sacraments were only for the righteous, the sinless in the eyes of God, the saints. Whether by their own accord or on account of what another person said to them, these individuals announced with no sense of false humility that they were not worthy for the Lord to enter into their lives, so they would save Christ the trouble of rejecting them by, in practice if not by intention, rejecting him first.

No one is worthy to receive the gifts God has given to us...yet the generosity of God's love, mercy, and forgiveness exceeds our imagining. The barrier we face in inviting Jesus into our lives isn't that he would never come, it's that we are too often afraid or ashamed to ask.



I wonder whether I would have really recognized Jesus for who he was if I were around during his earthly ministry. Likewise, even as a Franciscan friar today, I have my doubts about whether I would have joined St. Francis of Assisi in the thirteenth century or whether I would have—like many of his peers—simply thought he was crazy and kept my distance from him.

I find these thoughts both comforting and unsettling. They're comforting in that I know there were many people at both times who had this experience of doubt or outright lacked the ability to recognize how God was at work before them. We see that implied in Jesus' words to his disciples in Luke's Gospel. Their eyes are blessed because they are seeing what has long been expected, that for which so many people longed to see. And still they so often didn't get it. Even the disciples deny, betray, and abandon him. They sometimes mistake Jesus for a civil or military leader. They seek positions of influence or power. They exclude others from drawing near.

These thoughts are also unsettling because we know so much more than those early followers....We should know better. I should know better. And I should follow Jesus without reservations. How slow I can be to trust God. #
