#### **WELCOME IN CHRIST!**

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish invites all to a deeper love of Jesus and to a fullness of communion with the Church. The RITES OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION FOR ADULTS (RCIA) is a process where adults and older children are welcomed into the Catholic Church. Some have never been Baptized, others never received Eucharist or

Confirmation, and others arrive at our door after a long faith journey.

Do you know someone who is thinking about becoming part of our Catholic community? Are you the non-Catholic spouse of a parishioner who is wondering about full communion with the Church? Are you an adult Catholic who for whatever reason, "missed" one or more of the sacraments of initiation while growing up? Do you have children over 7 years of age who were never Baptized, or older children who "missed" sacraments?

The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (and its adapted form for children) welcomes all kinds of people into the Catholic family. The RCIA is for any adult who is: unbaptized and recognizes a need for spirituality in their life, or Baptized and raised in another Christian tradition but interested in learning about the Catholic faith, or Baptized in the Catholic faith, but never received any formal religious training.

Children of all ages are welcome and participate in age appropriate meetings for their RCIA experience.

#### WHAT EVERY CATHOLIC SHOULD KNOW ABOUT CHURCH TEACHING ON CARE AT THE END OF LIFE

When we think about end-of-life decisions, there are three fundamental Catholic beliefs:

- 1. Each one of us has been created in the image and likeness of God. We are called to protect human life and be good stewards of this gift.
- 2. Stewardship of life should avoid the opposite extremes of the deliberate hastening of death and the overzealous use of medical treatment to extend life artificially and prolong the dying process.
- **3.** The suffering that comes from illness and death is a way of being deeply united with the death and resurrection of Our Lord, Jesus Christ. Death is not the end; it is the doorway to eternal life.

# Anointing of the Sick Celebrating the Sacrament

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is a celebration in which those who are seriously ill or infirm are surrounded and supported by other members of the Christian community, whether at home or in the house of the church (for those who can leave their beds and come here). In song and in silence, with scriptures and prayers, we strengthen the bonds of love and faith that are stronger than the most lethal disease and more powerful even than death. The sacrament may be celebrated in the context of a Mass, or on its own, depending on the needs of the person who is sick.

The celebration opens with brief introductory rites that help us remember that God is with us and that we are the body of Christ. Then follows a liturgy of the word, in which we hear scriptures that shed light on the meaning of sickness and suffering and the

compassion of our God, who suffers with us. Depending on the needs of the person who is sick, one brief passage or two or three readings and a psalm may be used.

Then the rite continues. The gathered church surrounds the person who is sick with the prayer of faith. In response to God's word, a litany is prayed. Then, the priest does the laying on of hands, an ancient sign of the moving of the Holy Spirit to heal and save. Others may join in this ancient prayer gesture. This is done in silence. Then a prayer is said over the oil of the sick. Finally, the priest anoints the head and the hands, and sometimes other parts of the body (the feet, for example, or the part of the body that is in pain) of the one who is sick. While anointing the sick person's head, the priest says "Through this holy anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit." And all answer "Amen!" While anointing the hands, the priest says, "May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up." And again, all answer "Amen!" If other parts of the body are anointed, no words are said. A final prayer is then said.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist, or simply the giving of communion, may follow. Or the rite ends with a blessing. If you or someone you know needs the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick anointing, please call the Parish Office at 603 382 8324.

# He Emptied Himself

In the Gospels, Jesus seldom teaches doctrine. Rather, the stories themselves provide examples of how we are to model our lives after him. He was a man for others, a compassionate healer, an understanding friend. As clear as such stories might be, because we can be selfish people, the example they offer us is difficult to follow. If it is hard to follow a man who lived a human life with others, how are we to follow the example sketched by Paul in today's second reading?

Paul writes to the Christians in Philippi: "Have among yourselves the same attitude that is also yours in Christ

Do nothing out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather, humbly regard others as more important than yourselves.

#### Matthew 21:28-32

[Jesus said,] "Tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you."

Jesus" (2:5). What attitude is he talking about? Jesus emptied himself of the preeminence that was rightly his as possessing "equality with God" (2:6). He did not demand that they treat him with the reverence and veneration that was due him. Rather, "he emptied himself... he humbled himself" (2:7, 8).

Why does Paul insist on this? It seems the Philippians were having internal problems that were threatening their unity. Various forms of arrogance were tearing them apart: Don't you know who I am? I am a celebrity. I have more money. I know the right people. And who are you? Who do you know? What can you do? These attitudes of arrogance infect our communities today. To this Paul proclaims: If Jesus, who, "though he was in the form of God" (2:6), could empty himself of such dignity for the sake of others, you certainly should be able to put aside your trivial vainglory and be "united in heart" (2:2). Can we? #



## We Choose Life!

Ctober is Respect Life Month.
Respecting life begins with the understanding that life is good and that it's a gift directly from God—not our parents or the government which should help to protect and nurture it, but from God.

Life is good when it feels good and when it doesn't. Life is good when we're young and feel great and when we're old and sick. Life is good because it is God's gift. All life: the child in the womb, the criminal waiting for execution, the terminally ill hoping for heaven, the soldier on the battlefield, the person you see in the mirror when you are grieving or depressed or just plain tired. All life is gift and all life is good.

Catholic Church leaders have said this clearly, many times. In an address to the participants at the twelfth general assembly of the pontifical academy



for life in 2006, Pope Benedict XVI said, "God's love does not differentiate between the newly conceived infant still in his or her mother's womb and the child or young person, or the adult and the elderly person. God does not distinguish between them because he sees an impression of his own image and likeness (Genesis 1:26) in each one."

This is part of the secret of respecting

all life. To see every human being as precious because they are an impression of God, a facet of God's image that no one else has ever or will ever reflect. As I love my grandchildren and see in them my sons when they were little, so does God see in each of us his son. And we are called to see as God sees.

Politics seems to force a demonic choice about whose life we protect and whose we take with legal sanction. Do you side with those who would protect the unborn and the terminally ill or with those who would seek alternatives to war and the death penalty? Is this not a peculiar choice, fashioned by the Evil One? Our Church leaders have been consistent in speaking out for all life, but sadly, we Catholics have too often presented an inconsistent and divided rhetoric. We thus lose our credibility and our power to influence.

What does the Church teach about abortion, euthanasia, war, and the death penalty? Read the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 2258–2330 and many statements from the bishops of the United States, such as the one at left. †

# Living the Gospel of Life: A Message to American Catholics from the Bishops of the United States

A dopting a consistent ethic of life, the Catholic Church promotes a broad spectrum of issues "seeking to protect human life and promote human dignity from the inception of life to its final moment." Opposition to abortion and euthanasia does not excuse indifference to those who suffer from poverty, violence and injustice. Any politics of human life must work to resist the violence of war and the scandal of capital punishment. Any politics of human dignity must seriously address issues of racism, poverty, hunger, employment, education, housing, and health care. Therefore, Catholics should eagerly involve themselves as advocates for the weak and marginalized in all these areas.(22) \*\*
