SAFETY AND SECURITY

Our Parish properties are active places, where traffic and parked vehicles are a constant presence in the ebb and flow of a busy week. It is important to remember that because of the activity on both campuses, it is easy for someone looking for a quick deed to find a vehicle. Please be sure to lock and secure your vehicle when you are parked on either campus. If possible, secure valuables out of sight or make sure valuables in an open bed truck are secure. We have requested extra police presence in our lots during Masses, but patrols can only do so much. Each of us are responsible for making sure, as best we as are able, that our vehicles are safe and secure. Anvone seeing something or someone unusual in the lots is welcome to contact the local police.

INCLEMENT WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry, and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten: If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. All activities by any Parish or non-Parish groups will be cancelled for that day/evening on both campuses.

In the event of a weather related closing, the scheduled weekday Liturgy will not be held and the intention (if any) will be moved to a conveniently available date.

Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.



THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT

Why roses and joyful music on the third Sunday of Advent? It all starts with a golden rose. Long ago, the third Sunday of Advent was sort of a "break" in the fasting that was taking place before the celebration of Christmas. The third Sunday of Advent's chants and songs talked about "looking up," being "joy-filled and full of hope" at the nearness of the Savior. In church, the story of the Annunciation was common as the Gospel of the third Sunday of Advent.

The German name for the third Sunday of Advent was Rosensonntag, or the "Sunday of the Roses." That name came as a result of 15th century German pilgrim's witnessing Mass in Rome, where the Pope, after Mass on the third Sunday of Advent, would carry a golden rose in procession out of the church. The rose itself would be sent to an exemplary Christian after Mass that day as a gift.



This custom was in use at Rome as far back as the 11th century, where the Pope would present bouquets of roses to people in the church on the third Sunday of Advent. Over the years, the real roses were replaced by golden roses, often encrusted with jewels. In churches all over Christendom in the West, the custom of presenting roses to exemplary Christians of a particular place caught on. From there, the liturgical color for the day was changed to reflect the joy of the liturgy and the custom of presenting roses – the Church wore "old rose" as a way to signal the nearness of the Christmas festival.

Today, we sing joyful songs and meditate on the image of the rose – whose purity and beauty are reflected in the person of the Blessed Mother Mary, and whose fragrance and loveliness are reflected in the coming "rose of the winter night" – Jesus, Immanuel.





La Fiesta!

The fiesta was an important part of our ministry at Casa San Alfonso. One of our padrinos said of Mexicans, "Somos fiesteros" (We are party people). When we began the Casa ministry, we celebrated birthdays, patron saint days, and all the feasts of the communities that our young people came from. We celebrated Church holy days and especially the feasts of Mary, Posadas, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. If there was no reason for a party, one would be created. Casa San Alfonso was a welcoming community for young people seeking a better life in Denver. What better way to receive the youth than to have a celebration—a fiesta?

Some Church ministers wondered if we would ever develop a serious ministry. We opened our doors to young people without families in the area. Many young men arrived in the United States to seek work to help their families back home. They could come to the Casa and find friends who knew their journey. These young people knew the Redemptorists in the Casa simply welcomed them as they were and did not push them into an unfamiliar religiosity.

To witness good news, we had to celebrate fiestas at Casa San Alfonso. One of the joys of my life as a missionary is to party with the poor. Often, when visiting a home unannounced, the woman of the house says, "Padre, come and eat." Soon children, cousins, aunts, uncles, and neighbors arrive. The fiesta begins. People celebrate the arrival of a guest, especially if the guest is a priest or religious. If you walk with my people, always be ready for the fiesta.

Bellitto Whenever and wherever the gospel was spread, first in the Mediterranean area and then throughout Europe in the first millennium of the faith, preachers and bishops often deferred to local customs. They adapted the people's inclination to believe in the supernatural, cleverly redirecting it to Christian ideas. This process, known as enculturation, has a long history in the Church. The Christian celebration of Christmas, then, is a mixture of cultures— secular and sacred, ancient and modern—and it spans the entire planet. Some of our traditions are not rooted in Christianity, but that needn't trouble us. Those traditions have, in a sense, been baptized, which is in line with Christianity's goal to convert the world. As long as our rituals and traditions point to the essential truth of the Christmas feast—that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us—we can hardly go wrong.
