DOXOLOGY AND CREED AT MASS

Winter Ordinary Time begins on January 19. As we gather on that weekend, we will have ended our Christmas celebrations and continue to praise God in Ordinary Time until the beginning of Lent on March 5. During Ordinary Time, we will begin reciting the Doxology prayer that is sung in the Christmas and Easter Season - "Glory to God in the highest." The praver is fitting for Sundays as we honor God and God's blessings in our lives. It is recited after the Penitential Rite at the beginning of Mass. There will be colored cards in the pews to help us get used to the prayer so that nobody need shuffle through the missalettes. We will use the prayer until Lent begins, when the Church suspends it until Easter. The same colored card will also have a reprint of the Nicene Creed - 1700 years old in 2025! We will also begin reciting the text of the Creed at Sunday Masses on January 19.



Taking Up Christ's Ministry

B efore the Second Vatican Council, *ministry* was considered by many to be a Protestant word, and the religious leader who did it was called a *minister*. The council turned our understanding of Church ministry inside out. We've come to realize that with baptism—not ordination or religious profession—comes the responsibility of ministry. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him.

[John said,] "I am baptizing you with water, but...he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire." commitment to justice and peace is a genuine ministry that seeks to establish God's reign in our world.

Many interpreters believe that the account of Jesus' baptism points to the inauguration of his own ministry. The theology expressed is certainly Trinitarian (the Voice, Jesus identified as Son, and the Dove). However, the revelation of his true identity occurs as he begins preaching and healing. Some say his baptism was meant to strengthen him as he began his public life. Others believe it was meant to strengthen his disciples.

Today, we maintain that by baptism, we are all children of God. Vatican II has enlightened us as to what this really means. Pope Francis has reminded us that by virtue of our baptism, we are missionary disciples (see *Evangelii Gaudium*, 120). In other words, as disciples, we follow Jesus, learning from him. As missionaries, we go out to spread his Good News to others. It is now for us to take up the ministry where he left off, to be faithful servants with whom God is well pleased. **†**
