

CENTERING PRAYER FOR LENT

Lent is a time to follow Jesus more closely and learn from him how to pray in silence, spending time placing God at the center of your life, opening yourself to a loving Father, surrendering your will, and in trust allowing God to transform you. This interior prayer is how we pray as we Center. Centering Prayer is an ancient Christian practice available to all who seek transformation through a more intimate relationship with God. This daily practice deepens our faith as we come to better know our God as one who loves us unconditionally, just as we are, and trust God has plans to give us a future of hope. Centering Prayer helps us say to the Father, "Not my will but yours be done" (Lk. 22: 42). Please consider joining us and let God move you closer to him. All are welcome as we gather Wednesday evenings from 6:00-7:00 p.m. via Zoom. Following 30 minutes of Centering Prayer, we practice Lectio Divina. We listen to God's words in scripture, ponder, and share what we hear the Lord saying to us here and now and contemplate for the following week God's message to us and let it guide our choices and actions. Both practices strengthen our faith and reliance on God and deepen our personal relationship with God.

INCLEMENT WEATHER CLOSINGS

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish Office, Holy Angels Cemetery Office, Saint Luke Food Pantry, and the Parish Liturgical schedule complies with the longstanding inclement weather policy of Saint Luke Religious Education Program and Holy Angels Pre-School-Kindergarten: If the Timberlane and/or Sanborn regional school districts close because of inclement weather, ALL Parish Offices and Parish programs will be closed or suspended. Sunday (or Saturday evening) liturgies can never be cancelled, but all are advised to use prudence when deciding to travel to Church during winter storms.

THE THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

This Sunday's gospel reading leaves a lot of room to fill in some blanks. We know nothing about the two tragic events mentioned in the text. Jesus gives no additional information — in fact he uses the recent events to offer a "teachable moment."

These events involve tragedy, and Jesus uses these tragedies to get a dire point across: unless we repent, we also will die. In telling the parable of the fig tree, Jesus reveals God's patience, despite our hardheadedness and unwillingness to repent.



God's merciful work in our lives challenges death and darkness at every turn, always coaxing new life and new possibilities. Our work of repentance is to respond to God's coaxing and to turn from sinfulness toward God's transforming mercy.


Jesus redirects people from idle speculation about the meaning of the tragic fate of others to the serious work of our own repentance. Bad things happen, yet those things should not be occasions for spectator sport (have you ever passed an accident on the highway!?). The real problems and tragedies of others are a way for all of us to show compassion and concern while at the same time talking a sober account of our own lives and mistakes.

We all are challenged to "cultivate" and to "fertilize" our own faith perspectives. We act as if other people's problems are of no concern to us, we stare blankly at screens that reveal nothing except the depth of our curiosity. Jesus is quite clear in his message — we must each live up to our Baptismal commitment and to take the call to conversion and repentance seriously. Only then can we "stand secure" before the temptations that drag us down. Only then can we "stand secure" before the gracious love of God calling us to live a new and different kind of life.

he Church asks us to give ourselves to prayer and to the reading of Scripture, to fasting and to giving of alms during the Lenten season. The fasting that all do together on Fridays is but a sign of the daily Lenten discipline of individuals and households: fasting for certain periods of time, fasting from certain foods, but also fasting from other things and activities.

Likewise, the giving of alms is some effort to share this world equally not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and possessions and through work of many kinds for a just world.

FASTING means that anyone between the ages of 18 and 59 may eat only one full meal (with the other 2 meals being distinctly smaller). One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any meals at all. One fasts for a spiritual reason - (an end to sin, a reconciliation in one's life or family, an end to war or other disturbance, or for the spread of the Gospel



personal/corporate conversion) than for a personal dietary goal. The Church requires all between the ages of 18 and 59 to observe the fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fridays and Wednesdays are also traditional fast days, but are not mandatory.

ABSTINENCE is the discipline for those age 14 or older to forego the eating of any meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays of Lent.

The EASTER DUTY is the obligation to receive Holy Eucharist between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is an obligation for all those who are conscious of grave sin. A frequent celebration of Reconciliation is encouraged for all, especially during the Lenten Season.

Reconciliation is celebrated at Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish on Saturdays at 3:00 at Plaistow, and on the Sundays of Lent following 6:00 PM Evening Prayer at Newton. There is a communal Lenten Reconciliation Services at St. Michael, Exeter on Sunday, April 6 at 3 PM. Other area services will be announced as they are listed.

f you have ever tried to explain a profound experience of love, fear, or excitement; of music, nature, or life itself, you know that no words can adequately capture the essence of that experience. If it is thus with a human experience, what must it be like with an experience of God?

Such was the situation with Moses. He came upon a bush that was burning, yet not burning up. He probably thought that this was an unfamiliar natural phenomenon. It was only as he got closer and a voice spoke to him that he realized

it was not natural at all. It was a sacred event unfolding at a sacred place. There, God said, "I am the God of your father" (Exodus 3:6). This was an identification, but not a name. It was only later, when Moses asks for God's personal name, that God's real identity was revealed. Or was it?

Scholars agree that the name given is some form of the verb "to be," but they are not in agreement as to which form. Is it "I am who I am," "I will be who I will be," or "I cause to be what has come to be"? The name indicates that God is the power of existence, but it is not clear what this means or how it works. Some commentators maintain that God is telling Moses and us, This is as close to my full identity as you can come. You wouldn't understand it anyway. Be satisfied knowing that "I Am." \mathbb{*}

Why Do Good People Do Bad Things?

good thing.

hen we do something bad the first time, we feel bad about it. But the next time, it's a little easier, and,

after that, doing something bad gets easier and easier. Feeling bad about doing bad things is a good thing. If we didn't, it would mean that our conscience is pretty sluggish, and our soul would really be in danger. One way to keep your conscience in good shape is the "examination of conscience." Every night before you go to bed, ask God to help you remember your day. Then,

if you remember doing, saying, or thinking something you shouldn't have, tell God you're sorry and ask for help to do better the next day. I can't think of a better practice for busy folks who want to be good parents and for children who are being raised to be good Christians.

Why do good people do bad things? Even St. Paul wrote about this problem in his letter to the Christians in Rome: "What I do, I do not understand. For I do not do what I want,

but I do what I hate" (Romans 7:15). Sin is real. But, you know what? Forgiveness is real, too. As Catholics, we have the sacrament of penance and reconciliation, commonly known as confession. Many Catholics celebrate this sacrament regularly

and can't imagine being without it. Others are hesitant—some out of fear, some out of shame. Let me tell you: there's no reason to be afraid. If your pastor is not someone with a good "bedside manner," go to a different priest. As for shame—fuhgeddaboudit. Seriously, it's unlikely that you could tell a priest something he hasn't heard before, and we are all sinners. All! Remember

the prayer we say before we receive holy Communion? "Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul shall be healed." None of us is worthy, but all of us are loved. #
