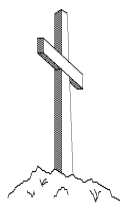

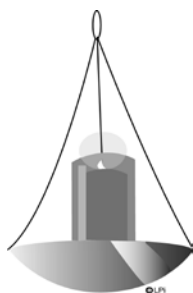

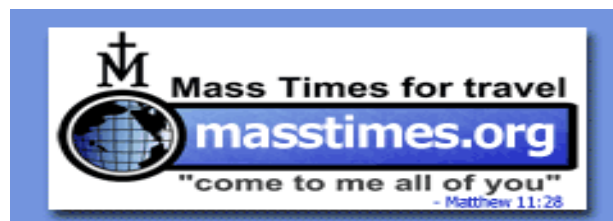

CENTERING PRAYER FOR LENT

Lent is a time to follow Jesus more closely and learn from him how to pray in silence, spending time placing God at the center of your life, opening yourself to a loving Father, surrendering your will, and in trust allowing God to transform you. This interior prayer is how we pray as we Center. Centering Prayer is an ancient Christian practice available to all who seek transformation through a more intimate relationship with God. This daily practice deepens our faith as we come to better know our God as one who loves us unconditionally, just as we are, and trust God has plans to give us a future of hope. Centering Prayer helps us say to the Father, "Not my will but yours be done" (Lk. 22: 42). Please consider joining us and let God move you closer to him. All are welcome as we gather **Wednesday evenings from 6:00–7:00 p.m. via Zoom**. Following 30 minutes of Centering Prayer, we practice Lectio Divina. We listen to God's words in scripture, ponder, and share what we hear the Lord saying to us here and now and contemplate for the following week God's message to us and let it guide our choices and actions. Both practices strengthen our faith and reliance on God and deepen our personal relationship with God.

ASSISTED SUICIDE LEGISLATION RETURNS

A new bill to legalize assisted suicide has been tabled in the New Hampshire Legislature for 2025 (HB 254). The Diocese of Manchester continues to work alongside a coalition of advocates for people with disabilities, veterans, young people, and seniors to prevent the ghastly practice of assisted suicide from ever being allowed in New Hampshire. FOURTH SUNDAY IN LENT

Young adults are usually happy to leave home and go out on their own. Their thinking so often focuses on being their own boss or making decisions on their own. And so often those same wide-eyed adventurers are sobered by the sheer cost of living, the complexities of housing and the dizzying array of adult situations that face them. Some, a little chagrined, are forced to move home again to make ends meet. Others must reevaluate their lifestyles to fit into the demands of the adult world. We can all identify with the son in the gospel story, who is chomping at the bit to get out into the world and do it all on his own. He is so eager and self-assured, he even demands his inheritance while his father is still alive!

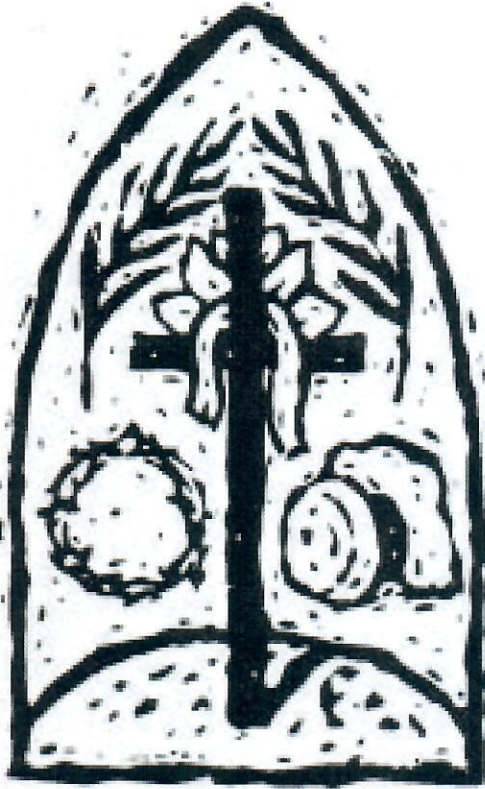
The gospel begins with the Pharisees and scribes complaining that Jesus welcomes and actually eats with sinners and others outside of the law. Jesus' answer is to tell a story – and what a story it is! When the prodigal (wasteful) son comes to his senses and returns home, he is met by a father who is equally prodigal – wasteful- with his mercy and compassion. The son schemes to gain only a servant's place back home, but he is welcomed as a long-lost wanderer and a full member of the family by his gracious father.

Sinners and wanderers that we are, our merciful Father longs to embrace us and to restore us to our rightful place as beloved sons and daughters. The point to the story: Jesus' welcome of sinners and those outside of the law makes visible the love and mercy of God our Father, a love and mercy which we all need. The "ministry of reconciliation" given us by God places each of us in the role of the prodigal father, reminding us of not only the value but also of the necessity of forgiveness. Forgiveness invites – even forces us - to accept others as sinners and to accept ourselves as weak humans who often cause further hurt by our own lack of forgiveness. We are like the prodigal father when we choose compassion and forgiveness toward those who harm us.

Our human tendency is to think we can make a go of life totally independent from others. Our human foibles force us to realize that our own efforts and wants do not always make life happen. This parable of the prodigal son reminds us that God offers us each so much more.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

FASTING



Fasting for anyone between 21 and 59 years of age means having only one full meal to maintain one's strength. Two smaller meatless and penitential meals are permitted according to one's needs, but should not equal the one full meal. One may, however, enter more into the spiritual element of fasting and not partake of any of the above-mentioned meals. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and juices are allowed. Days of fasting are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Wednesdays and Fridays are also traditional fast days; however, one may fast on any day of the week.

ABSTINENCE

Abstinence is the observance for all those 14 years of age or older to forego the eating of meat on: Ash Wednesday; all Fridays in Lent and on Good Friday. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, this discipline does not apply.

EASTER PRECEPT

The Easter Precept – or Easter Duty is the decree for all the faithful to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter Season (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2042). The faithful must celebrate the Sacrament of Penance at least once a year in preparation for the reception of Holy Eucharist. Traditionally, the Church has marked the time in which one may fulfill the Easter Duty between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday. A monthly celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation is encouraged for all.

PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

All of the faithful are encouraged to spend additional time in prayer during the Lenten season, and to participate in the devotional practices of the Parish. It is also praise worthy for the faithful to give generously to charities and to their Church during this Season of Sacrifice.

offering to God in gratitude the fruits of their own harvest. The people who once were landless have now been made anew. This is surely a reason to rejoice.

Paul's words to the Corinthians were reason for great rejoicing. He assured them that, because of the death and resurrection of Jesus, their sinfulness was not held against them. Instead, they were now reconciled with God. They were a new creation. This, too, is reason to rejoice.

Jesus' story about the merciful father touches every life. The young son turned away from his home and his family, yet it was the father's actions that brought about the reconciliation. The story did not explicitly say that he simply forgave his son. More than that, it says that he was filled with deep compassion for him—a compassion that restored the bond between them. This compassion brought the son who was dead back to life. There is no greater reason for rejoicing.

God has brought us into a new land, has made each of us a new creation, has brought us back to the embrace of our Father. And so, we rejoice. †

Things Are Not Always As They Seem

I made a collage inspired by a quote from William Morris: “Have nothing in your homes that you do not know to be useful or believe to be beautiful.” I took pictures of a couple dozen ordinary household objects, but from different angles than we usually see them. There is a close-up of a glass doorknob, the back of a rocker made of lovely wood, the wicker top of a hamper, one patch on a quilt. It turned out pretty nice and hangs in our living room. A favorite game of my grandchildren is to ask guests to find those objects in the house. Children are better than adults at this game. They see with their fresh eyes what we don’t expect to see with our mature eyes.

Sometimes things are not as they seem. There’s the story of a man who was riding on the subway in New York City when another man got on with his three children. The kids were just wild—running around the car, jumping on the seats, disturbing the other passengers. The first man was getting more and more irritated and finally approached the father and

asked, “Don’t you see how your children are behaving? They’re bothering everybody. Aren’t you going to do something?” The father of the kids looked up, obviously just noticing what was going on. He apologized and said, “I’m so sorry. We just came from the funeral home where we’re making arrangements.

My wife died yesterday. I guess the kids are just confused by it all.” Then he called his kids over, and they sat down quietly. The first man felt awful, and all his irritation melted away, to be replaced by concern. “I’m so sorry for your loss,” he said. “Is there anything I can do?”

We often find ourselves irritated by the behavior of others. Try this exercise the next time someone’s behavior irritates you: list five reasons why that person may have behaved that way. And then say a quick prayer for him or her and for anyone you may have irritated that day.

Life can be grossly unfair. It’s been suggested that violence can come from someone not knowing what to do with his or her suffering.
