



Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ

The question of exactly when the eucharistic gifts become Christ's Body and Blood has commanded attention and debate for centuries.

From the supper at Emmaus, disciples have cherished the Eucharist as the clearest sign of the Risen Lord's abiding presence.

Yet, beginning in the Middle Ages, and for nearly a thousand years laypeople in the West seldom received Communion, and even then only under the form of bread. For that reason, knowing when Christ became present at Mass was a key to spiritual life, since the ordinary way of worship was looking at the consecrated Host raised high over the priest's head rather than eating it. Medieval scholars, who were all members of the clergy, naturally looked at the Eucharistic Prayer and the cherished memory of the words and deeds of Jesus at the Last Supper, called the "Institution Narrative." The winning answer in the debate was keyed to the words of the priest: "This is my body."

Today, the answer can be found in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, but also by observing the liturgy. The Catechism says that as soon as the Institution Narrative begins, the Lord is present in the elements of bread and wine. That is why the universal law of the church directs the assembly to kneel for this part of the Eucharistic Prayer, even though in the United States we are already kneeling at that point.

The ritual direction in the Missal says that after the Institution Narrative, the "priest holds the consecrated host and shows it to the congregation." The postures and gestures and texts of the liturgy are clear that the transformation is already complete midway through the Eucharistic Prayer.

The same question never captured the attention of the Eastern Catholic and Orthodox traditions. For them, the critical moment has always been the epiclesis, or the calling down of the Holy Spirit on the gifts of bread and wine and the assembly. The priest extends his hands over the gifts and asks the Holy Spirit to "change them for us into the Body and Blood of Christ." For an Eastern Christian, that's the critical moment.

But there is a deeper, more personal question. At what point do we become the Body and Blood of Christ? The bread and wine are not consecrated for their own sake, after all, but for the good of the Church and for the world. The question is worth thinking over. Maybe knowing the answer to "when" the bread and wine are transformed will lead to the more critical and personal question as to "why" the Lord comes to us in Holy Communion.



CATHOLIC COMMUNION

Non-Catholic visitors to Catholic parishes often complain that they may not join in communion at Mass. Many other

denominations welcome all who profess faith in Christ to the communion table, but Catholics have always restricted who shares the meal. For those who practice hospitality at home by setting an extra place at the table for visitors, the Catholic custom gives offense.




Many groups use a symbol to identify their members. Students wear school jackets. Scouts earn medals. These customs give groups signs of association. When a new member joins the group, the symbol frequently becomes part of the rite of initiation, a sign of transition and a source of pride. Those baptized in other communions who make a profession of faith with us may be received into the full communion of the Catholic church. Their communion becomes the high point of their transition into membership.

Ordinarily, Catholics do not share communion at other churches nor do other believers share communion in Catholic churches. *Exceptions exist but they are rare.* In danger of death, for example, or in some grave necessity, non-Catholics might receive permission from a Catholic bishop to receive communion. If they do not have regular access to their own minister, ask for Catholic communion on their own and express a Catholic faith in the Eucharist, they may obtain permission to receive communion.

Theologians debate the possibilities for full communion, while ordinary families find themselves separated by what often appears to them as small differences in their beliefs. The more unity we find among ourselves, the closer all Christian churches will come to resolving the differences.

SAINT LUKE PARISH NEW HAMPSHIRE CATHOLIC APPEAL FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the New Hampshire Catholic Appeal: Future of our Faith II?

The New Hampshire Catholic Appeal (NHCA) is a combined campaign and fundraising effort with the parishes and ministries of the Church in New Hampshire.

What ministries and needs will be included in the New Hampshire Catholic Appeal?

The following will be funded by the NHCA:

- Catholic Education and Catholic Schools
- Seminarians, Deacons, and Vocations
- Priest Retirement
- Parable magazine
- Parish needs (Parish to Parish Support Fund and individual parish support)
- Missionaries abroad and multicultural ministry in N.H.
- Catholic University of America and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops
- Catholic Charities NH

Many of these needs and ministries were previously funded through second collections. These second collections have been eliminated or consolidated into the NHCA. Parishioners can still give to any of these causes and programs separately, though it does not count towards the overall NHCA Parish goal.

→ Gifts to Catholic Charities NH separately <u>do not</u> count toward the Catholic Appeal Parish Goal.

Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish 2025 goal is \$47,579.00

How are the goals for each parish determined?

The parish NHCA goal is calculated as 10% of the parish average assessable income over the last three fiscal years.

If the parish goal is exceeded, does the parish get to keep the amount raised over the goal?

Yes. The NHCA will allow parishes to keep 90% of their revenue over their set goal for the first three years of the appeal.

What happens if a parish does not make their goal?

If a parish does not reach its goal, it will be assessed (billed) the remainder.

Why should I give to the New Hampshire Catholic Appeal if I already give to my parish?

Your participation helps the entire Church in New Hampshire where the needs are the greatest – recruiting new priests, evangelization, the vulnerable, and more. Your support makes these ministries possible that no one parish could support on its own. Your gift demonstrates your commitment to the greater Church. We are many parts in the Diocese of Manchester but one body in Christ with a common mission.

Does my parish have to support the NHCA?

Yes. Each parish in the diocese has a set goal which represents the parish share of the total Appeal. A good faith effort is requested of all parishes. Additionally, individual parishes can benefit significantly by retaining any funds raised over their set goal; administering fewer second collections; and parishes will see a reduction in fees and administrative costs (assessments) paid to the Diocese.

How much should I give?

Charitable giving reflects our Christian stewardship of treasure. Giving back to God, either through contributions to your parish, the New Hampshire Catholic Appeal, or other worthwhile charities, should require a sacrifice, one that recognizes God's generosity to us individually. Therefore, your gift is a personal decision between you and God and should be made after careful reflection. Please consider the dollars you have donated in the past to the six discontinued 2nd collections plus the Catholic Charities NH special collection and the *Parable* magazine drive to help you determine how much to give. The pledge and recurring gift option may make this amount feasible.

Should I make a pledge, recurring gift, or a one-time gift?

Making a pledge or a recurring gift allows you to spread your gift over several months, which may make it easier for you to budget, and may also allow you to give a larger gift.

How Should I Give?

There are many ways that you can give to the New Hampshire Catholic Appeal.

Can Saint Luke parishioners donate using our online giving platform used for parish offertories?

No. Saint Luke the Evangelist Parish electronic giving is not connected to the NH Catholic Appeal. This is because of the complications of reporting to the Diocese and the tax-deductible reporting that must be done for all donations. One can scan the QR code on the NHCA brochure and immediately access electronic giving opportunities.

B read and wine, the basics for most Mediterranean diets, are featured in the readings for this feast.

They were the gifts that were offered to God Most High by the priest-king Melchizedek, as stated in Genesis.

Because these gifts represent the staples of life, such a sacrifice was offered because it symbolized the offering of life itself. Who was this mysterious man who blessed Abram, when Abram usually blessed others? We have no answer.

In the first reading, the essence of life is offered to God. In the gospel, the essence of life is offered to the people. It is in Paul's letter that we find the high point of the readings and of the feast itself. There, Paul proclaims what was probably one of the earliest eucharistic formulas of the early Church. It ends with an admonition from Christ himself: "Do this in remembrance of me" (1 Corinthians 11:24). Here, the bread and wine that was first offered to God, and then offered to the people, is the very Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus Christ. This remembrance of his death is really a celebration of life. The mystery here is incomprehensible. #



The History of Corpus Christi

round 1209, a group of holy women in Liège, Belgium, established a center dedicated to eucharistic piety. These women were convinced that the Lord desired the celebration of a new feast dedicated to the reserved sacrament of the altar. This feast became known

as Corpus Christi. For this feast, St. Thomas Aquinas composed beautiful hymns that expertly combined dogma with devotion.

With its rich eucharistic liturgy and procession, the feast of Corpus Christi is an occasion of special praise and thanksgiving offered to the Father in the name of all creation,

and of special thanksgiving for the institution of the Eucharist, in which Christ's Body is the bread of life.... The Corpus Christi procession is a solemn act of public adoration and praise.... In many Catholic towns, houses are decorated

for this procession. There are beautiful arrangements of flowers, especially before the four altars where the gospels are chanted and the solemn Benediction is given. Church choirs and musicians also perform.... The Corpus Christi procession is a kind of cosmic liturgy. Symbolically, it invites all creatures to join in the Church's joy, gratitude, and praise. Thus, festivity and solemnity combine in this eucharistic celebration and procession.

Church processions, but particularly the Corpus Christi procession, symbolize our pilgrimage on the road to our final destination, with Christ accompanying us, for he is the Way and our final home. The feast of Corpus Christi is still a major feast in the Church today and reverently celebrated by

Catholic communities around the world. †
