




Apostles Peter and Paul

June 29

One of the oldest saints' days in Rome, June 29 was dedicated to the memory of the apostles Peter and Paul as early as the fourth century. This day the church remembers two disciples who differed greatly in style and background, but who shared a tireless energy in spreading the gospel.

Rough-hewn and impulsive Peter left his fishing nets immediately to answer Jesus' call. Later, during the passion of Jesus, Peter made his denials just as impulsively, though he had pledged his loyalty to Jesus only that evening. Receiving Christ's gracious forgiveness after the resurrection, Peter went on to become the rock-steady and faithful leader of the disciples. Imprisoned three or four times, he eventually was crucified during the reign of Nero. Legend has it that he was hung on the cross head down because he told the soldiers that he was not worthy to die in the same manner as Christ.






Once Paul, who had been a rigid and violent persecutor of Christians, experienced the love of Christ, he grew meek — though never shy. He founded many churches and was able to affirm the fledgling communities of believers even while he was admonishing them. Paul's writings are the first Christian scriptures; they are older than the gospels. After many imprisonments, Paul was executed during the reign of Nero. Since he was a Roman citizen, he was beheaded instead of crucified.

Coastal countries like Chile and Paraguay remember Peter the fisherman with nautical parades. In Hungary and in rural England, people braid straw from the wheat harvest into crosses and crowns to honor the two martyr saints.



NEW HAMPSHIRE CATHOLIC APPEAL

Our Parish 2025 goal is \$47,579.00. The Parish keeps any income raised above our set fundraising goal. Goals are set by the Diocese at 10% of the average of the last three years of our assessable income (excluding the pandemic shut down year of 2020).

Approximately 95%, of the New Hampshire Catholic Appeal (NHCA) revenue will go towards ministry, education, and parishes. The goal is for less than 5% of revenue to be spent on administering the NHCA. The intent of the Diocese is to keep these costs as low as possible. No funds will go towards diocesan administration, the bishop's office, or any clergy abuse settlements/litigation.

Many Diocesan second collections have been eliminated. The second collections eliminated in 2023 are the Seminary Fund, the Catholic education collection, the Parish-to-Parish Support Fund, the NH Missionaries Abroad and Migrant & Refugee Ministry in NH, the Catholic University of America and USCCB, the NH Priest Retirement Fund and the annual drive for *Parable* Magazine. In addition, the annual appeal for Catholic Charities will no longer take place since the Catholic Appeal takes the place of the Catholic Charities Appeal of years past.

Many of these needs and ministries were previously funded through second collections. These second collections have been eliminated or consolidated into the NHCA. Parishioners can still give to any of these causes and programs separately, though it does not count towards the overall NHCA Parish goal.

hat was it like in those years after the crucifixion? What was it like to talk about an experience and a relationship unlike anything ever encountered? What was it like to go to jail for preaching what you described as good news even though it seemed foolish to many of those who were listening? Saint Paul saw it in terms of a race whose finish line was heaven and for which he was willing to spend his last ounce of energy. Saint Peter saw that once he acknowledged who Jesus was, he had no choice but to proclaim the truth of his heart. He knew Jesus was the Messiah because he saw it in

The Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the proclamation might be completed and all the Gentiles might hear it.

He experienced it in the love Christ gave him, even after he denied Jesus at his trial. He saw it in the faces of those whom he healed in Christ's name and who eagerly came to baptism and the outpouring of the Spirit.

What is it like now? How do we know that Jesus is the Messiah in our hearts? And how has that made a difference in our lives? Is this relationship so unlike any other that we are willing to be poured out, to spend our energy, to proclaim the Good News even though it may seem foolish? It's an uncomfortable question for many Catholics today. For many of us, religion and faith are private matters, and sometimes that helps us avoid arguments or endless debate. But the compelling story of our redemption begs to be told, if not in words, then in lives transformed. This is our story and our race to be run full out to the very last. #

It may come as a surprise to some that many of his closest coworkers were women. Priscilla (also referred to as Prisca) and her husband, Aquila, shared a special relationship

with St. Paul. (See 1 Corinthians 16:19; Romans 16:3.) He acknowledged the depth of his gratitude to them: "Greet Prisca and Aquila, my coworkers in Christ Jesus, who risked their necks for my life" (Romans 16:3–4). The term describing them as fellow workers is the same he used to describe Timothy and Titus, who coauthored several of Paul's letters. In another case, Paul commended Phoebe to the Church in Rome; she may have brought the letter to the community on behalf of Paul. (See Romans 16:1–2.) Paul referred to her as "minister" (*diakonoi*) which is the same word he used for himself to mean "one who provides relief to others." (See 1 Corinthians 3:5; 2 Corinthians 3:1–11.)

The Book of the Acts of the Apostles ends with Paul under

house arrest in Rome. While imprisoned, Paul wrote one of his most joyous letters to the Philippians: "I want you to know, brothers, that my situation has turned out rather to advance the gospel, so that my imprisonment has become well known in Christ throughout the whole praetorium and to all the rest,

and so that the majority of the brothers, having taken encouragement in the Lord from my imprisonment, dare more than ever to proclaim the word fearlessly" (Philippians 1:12–14). Only an extraordinary love and a sense of being loved can yield such joy! **†**

The [Book of] the Acts of the Apostles reveals a Church that is a multicultural, universal community. A great hallmark of the Catholic Church has always been its openness to this diversity. Catholic (from the Greek *katholikos*) means "universal." In St. Peter's speech at the conversion of Cornelius and his household, who were Gentiles from Caesarea, he begins: "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation, whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him (Acts 10:34–35). Languages and accents may differ, customs and styles of dress may vary, but the call of Jesus Christ is universal.
